

CONTEXTUAL INFORMATION

Mission:

The College of Education's mission is to offer quality programs and services that prepare educational professionals (teachers, counselors, diagnosticians, leaders, librarians, information specialists, leisure personnel and others) to plan, organize, deliver, assess, support and supervise instruction. Furthermore, the college prepares diverse populations who are intellectually and ethically informed individuals with well-defined skills and knowledge who are capable leaders, creative thinkers, and contributing citizens. All activities in the College are guided by the belief that we **Prepare All Candidates To Succeed**, which translates into the **PACTS** acronym that also represents the strands for the College of Education's Conceptual Framework: Professionalism, Assessment, Content, Technology, & Standards.

Teacher Preparation Programs:

Initial certification programs at the undergraduate, post baccalaureate, and master's levels include the following: Early Childhood Education; Elementary and Middle Grades Education; Bilingual Elementary Education; Special Education (LBS1); Secondary Biology, Career & Technology Education (Business, Marketing & Computer Education; Family Consumer Sciences, and Technology Education), Chemistry Education, English Education, Geography Education, History Education, Mathematics Education, and Physics Education; and K-12 Art Education, Music Education, Physical Education, and Spanish Education.

Student Characteristics:

- Most CSU students are non-traditional or returning students who commute.
- A large percentage is first generation college attendees, married or single parents, who work and/or receive financial aid; approximately 60% are part-time students.
- More than one-third of the CSU student population is between the ages of 25 and 34.
- The student body is ethnically diverse with a majority of African-Americans students.
- CSU's minority students performed equal to or better than their counterparts in the rest of the state on Certification Tests over the last ten years.
- One-third of the candidates in initial certification programs are change-of-career post-baccalaureate students.

Admissions Requirements:

Admission to Teacher Education Program:

- Cumulative GPA of 2.5 in all coursework required in the education program
- Completion of all but 12 credit hours of coursework in general education
- Submission of one letter of recommendation from the department and/or one personal recommendation projecting the student's success as a teacher
- Successful completion of the Illinois Certification Test of Basic Skills, and for undergraduate students, the CSU qualifying examinations in English composition, mathematics, and reading
- Access to a laptop computer
- No unresolved violations of the COE Professional Code of Conduct

Admission to Student Teaching:

- Admission to Teacher Education
- Completion of all course requirements
- Minimum 2.5 GPA in all coursework satisfying program requirements and in each of the two areas of professional education and area of specialization or concentration [Specific programs may have higher GPA requirements]
- Review course for the Illinois Subject Matter Certification Examination
- Successful field-based internship
- Successful completion of Subject Matter Certification Test

Accreditation:

- Accredited by the North Central Association (NCA) of Colleges and Schools
- Accredited by National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE) since 1954
- All programs approved for certification by the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE)
- One of only 22 Illinois institutions (57 total) accredited by NCATE
- All programs, with national professional association standards, are in full compliance
- Ed.D. in Education Leadership approved by IBHE in June 2004 and by NCA in April 2005;
- ISBE approved Superintendent Endorsement on 2/2/07 to add to Type 75 Certificate for Doctoral students

Teacher Education Vision:

- The College of Education sees itself as a hub for educational networking where candidates come knowing that they are part of a learning community whose programs have consistently received NCATE accreditation and reached out to a diverse student community to offer them state-of-the-art degree programs to become highly qualified professionals, achieve their career goals, state licensure and be ready to serve in a global society.
- Long-term strategic plans and short-term action plans guide data-driven accountability measures and decision making to improve programming, student retention and graduation rates, use of resources and quality of services rendered.
- The undergraduate, graduate, and doctoral programs' curricular plans, expansion efforts, delivery of learning experiences and accountability measures are rigorous and develop a depth and breadth of knowledge, skills and dispositions exemplified in the Conceptual Framework, National Board for Professional Teaching Standards, Specialty Professional Association Standards and Illinois Professional Teaching Standards.
- Faculty, students, staff and administrators understand the function and process involved in developing and working with innovative service, research or funding projects and participate in these endeavors in varying roles for the benefit of the learning community.

Best Practices:

- School-based methods courses taught in Chicago and suburban schools give students the opportunity to apply theory, innovative practices and pedagogy in real school settings; including international opportunities.
- Prior to student teaching, all candidates participate in an internship under the supervision of both school and University faculty. Internships and student teaching are usually done in the same school.
- Candidates enrolled in field-based internship programs teach lessons daily for two or more semesters and receive feedback from school and University supervisors.
- Candidates develop professionally through systemic reflection, analytical journal writing, and e-portfolios.
- Secondary and K-12 education candidates complete a major in their area of specialization.
- Eight College computer laboratories and wireless access facilitate technology-infusion learning experiences.
- National Board Certification (NBC) Resource Center serves south-side Chicago Public School (CPS) teachers and CSU teacher graduates teaching in the CPS to improve NBC Teacher minority recruitment.
- Students participate in practice tests and review workshops for the Certification Tests of Basic Skills, Subject Matter Knowledge, and Assessment of Professional Teaching.
- Students receive web-enhanced curriculum and wireless access for learning.
- Alternative pathway programs are offered, e.g., Teachers for Chicagoland (TFCL).
- Faculty members have developed partnerships, including: Project Nueva Generacion, a community, site-based program for training teachers; CSU-University of Minnesota (UMM) Rural Urban Diversity Project for initial certification methods students; Secondary Resident Teacher Cohort & Dual-Credit Agreement with Youth Connections Charter Schools (YCCS), Guardian-A-Program (GAP) with elementary and high schools; Ghana, West Africa Literacy, Numeracy and Environmental Studies Textbook Program, General Administration partnerships for elementary and high school teachers; Reading Specialist cohorts for elementary and high school teachers; distance learning program in Library Information and Media Studies; Child Studies program for Head Start staff and other Early Childhood cohorts; Special Education cohorts in the south suburbs for certified teachers and initial certification students; After School Matters Sports 37 program for K-12 students; Teacher Quality Enhancement project with community college partners for developing standards-based curricula for middle grade educators; planned Cougar Academy for Teachers targeted toward Junior and Senior high school students aspiring to become middle school teachers; Urban Visions Journal at urbanvisionsjournal.org since 2001; Cooperative Education Designation; CISCO Certified Network Administrator training; and General Administration cohorts.

Notable Features and Accomplishments:

- Over 123 graduates teaching in the CPS have been awarded National Board Certification since 1997. 36 CPS teachers earned their NBC credentials through the CSU NBC Resource Center in 2007-2008.
- Over 28 CSU graduates have received the Golden Apple Award for Excellence in Teaching since 1987.
- CSU students have received the Kohl, Golden Apple Scholar, and the Illinois Student Laureate Awards; 56 Distinguished Educator Awards have been presented to alums and faculty since 2003.
- Faculty engages in research, publishing, and presentations at local, national, and international conferences.
- The College has a nationally recognized professional development partnership with three state recognized Field-Based Teacher Internship Programs, originally funded by the Joyce and MacArthur Foundations, and currently funded by the Illinois Board of Higher Education.
- The College of Education has published the Illinois Schools Journal since 1920.
- Over 200 teachers have graduated from alternative pathways to certification programs.
