Teacher Preparation Programs:

The University currently offers one teacher preparation program, a Master of Arts in Teaching degree in elementary education that also results in elementary education certification. This Urban Teacher Education Program is currently only open to undergraduates enrolled at the University of Chicago. It begins in the senior year with a three-quarter course sequence. Following graduation with a Bachelor's degree (in a field other than education), the program continues with five additional quarters of work including a full-year clinical internship, and graduates are supported for two full years as new teachers.

Student Characteristics:

The first class of Master of Arts in Teaching Elementary Education was admitted Summer 2004, with a second cohort of undergraduates accepted in the fall of 2004. The first group is made up of 9 females with a range of concentrations in human development, psychology, history, Spanish, English literature, sociology, and religious studies. Two of the candidates are students of color. The second cohort, also with nine students, is made up of 3 males and 6 females. Three candidates of this group are students of color. The areas of concentration are similar to the previous cohort but also include philosophy, mathematics, and chemistry.

Admission Requirements:

Admission to Teacher Education: candidates must possess strong written and oral communication skills, have some experience working in schools or with children, and have evidence of a strong commitment to social justice. Normally, candidates must have at least a "B" average in their College courses, and be recommended by a faculty member as well as someone who can witness to their involvement with children and to their moral character.

Accreditation:

- University of Chicago is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools.
- Educational Unit and professional preparation programs are accredited by the Illinois State Board of Education.

CONTEXTUAL INFORMATION

Teacher Education Vision:

Reflective school professionals using their knowledge and experience and the results of research to foster healthy human development and meaningful learning.

Best Practices:

The Urban Teaching Education Program is based on the work of the Literacy Collaborative and emphasizes a balanced approach to literacy instruction with embedded assessments and a variety of practice in situations requiring reading and writing. Clinical experiences (including student teaching) take place in schools with strong commitments to balanced literacy and to a school community that supports social, emotional, and physical well-being as essential supports to academic learning. Clinical Instructors (mentor teachers) are considered adjunct faculty and receive guidance and training in coaching and in successful approaches to supporting new teachers. Graduates of the program are supported for two full years through the University's New Teacher Network induction program.

Notable Features and Accomplishments:

The Urban Teacher Education Program admitted its first undergraduate class fall 2003, with admission to the MAT in Summer of 2004.
