

CONTEXTUAL INFORMATION

Mission:

Founded in 1857 to prepare teachers, Illinois State University is the state's first public university. Illinois State is unique among public universities in that it provides statewide leadership in identifying the needs of Illinois schools and, through coordination with other colleges and universities, in developing and delivering programs tailored to meet them. (Illinois Board of Higher Education 1994 Focus Statement)

Teacher Preparation Programs:

- 26 B.A./BS. Programs leading to state teacher certification.
- 12 graduate-level certification programs.
- Alternative Route to secondary teacher certification for degree holders.
- Ed.D. and/or PhD. in education in six programs.

Student Characteristics:

Illinois State University served 17827 undergraduate and 2438 graduate students, 5550 were new students this year. Our student enrollment includes students from 50 states and territories and 76 foreign countries. 57.5% of the undergraduate population is female and 11.3% represent minority populations. Graduated 1130 teacher candidates with bachelor degrees. Granted masters degrees to 241 teachers or administrators. Granted 6 Certificates of Advanced Studies and 39 doctorates.

Admissions Requirements:

Admission to Teacher Education Program: Candidates are expected to meet sixteen requirements which include passing the ISBE Basic Skills Test, having a minimum GPA of 2.5, major departmental requirements, and specific performance assessments in the areas of dispositions, communications, and technology.

Admission to Student Teaching: Candidates are expected to meet seventeen requirements which include passing the ISBE Content Area Test, GPA requirements, departmental requirements and specific performance assessments in the areas of dispositions, communications, technology, literacy, working with diverse students, and field experiences.

Accreditation:

The Commission on Institutions of Higher Education of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools (NCA-CIHE) since 1913 and the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE) since 1954 have accredited ISU. All programs are fully approved by the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) and nationally recognized by specialized professional associations. The most recent NCATE/ISBE joint review took place in November 2003 with a five day site visit.

Teacher Education Vision:

Illinois State University's goal is to prepare teachers who have a strong sense of themselves and their mission as teachers and who, through caring and knowing, help their students realize the democratic ideal.

Best Practices:

- Secondary education teachers earn a major in the discipline.
- Elementary teachers complete an 18-hour specialty in an academic area.
- Middle level teachers complete an NMSA approved program, with two or more areas of specialization in an academic discipline.
- Special education candidates complete year-long field experiences in partner schools.
- University/school partnerships: year-long Professional Development School (PDS) experiences in Wheeling, Elgin, Pekin, Chicago, Peoria, Springfield, and Bloomington-Normal.
- All teacher candidates complete early experiences at the University Laboratory K-12 School, one of only 85 laboratory schools in the nation.

Notable Features and Accomplishments:

- Home of state professional organizations, including Illinois Principals Association, Illinois Association of School Administrators, Illinois Association of Teachers of English, Illinois Women Administrators; state home of Illinois Special Olympics.
- Faculty consists of scholars and creative artists of repute in their disciplines and pedagogical specialists in disciplines that offer teacher certification programs.
- University rewards the scholarship of pedagogy by faculty.
- One in seven teachers in Illinois public schools graduated from Illinois State, the largest producer of teachers in the state, and consistently among the 10 largest producers in the nation (2005 AACTE data)
- Largest preparer of elementary teacher and special education teachers in the nation. (2005 AACTE Directory)
- Only Illinois institution of higher education to offer all special education certification areas (Learning/Behavior, Deaf, and Vision) and one of two approved Director of Special Education certification programs.
- Received a total of \$2,250,000 in federal grants to prepare bilingual teachers for the state.
- Member of the prestigious Holmes Partnership, University Council for Education Administration, and National Network for Educational Renewal (NNER).
- Implemented/expanded the Chicago Pipeline to prepare more teachers for the city.
- Home of Special Education Assistive Technology Center providing assistive technology skills to all teacher education majors and advanced training for special educators and the Autism Spectrum Institute providing statewide professional development to educators and support to families.
- Publisher of the Illinois State Education Law and Policy Journal, Planning and Changing, and "The Grapevine", a national report on state appropriations for higher education.
