

CONTEXTUAL INFORMATION

Mission:

Monmouth College was founded in 1853 as a Christian liberal arts college with a major purpose of preparing young people to return to their communities to provide leadership and service. Teacher preparation has been a significant commitment of the college and remains so today. Our graduates serve with distinction as teachers in Illinois, the nation, and internationally.

Teacher Preparation Programs:

Monmouth College offers 15 teacher certification options at the BA level: Elementary Education (K-9), 8 Secondary (6-12), and 6 Special (K-12) programs. The Middle school endorsement is also available, as well as many second field combinations.

Student Characteristics:

Approximately one-third of the students enrolled at Monmouth College are in the teacher education program. Of the 1357 total enrollment, 85% are Illinois residents, primarily from central downstate and from the metro regions of Chicago and St. Louis. Six percent are minority status, and two percent are international students.

Admissions Requirements:

Admission to Teacher Education Program: Formal admission to the teacher education program is sought in the freshman year. Candidates must earn at least a 2.5 GPA, earn a C or higher in their introductory education course and practicum experience, and pass the State Basic Skills test.

Admission to Student Teaching: Formal admission to student teaching typically occurs during the junior year. Candidates must pass the ICTS content area exam; earn at least a 2.75 GPA in their content area, education, and overall coursework; minimum of 100 hours in field experiences with a grade of C or higher in Practicums I, II, and III; documentation of responsible and mature behaviors throughout the preparation program; and favorable recommendation by three faculty.

Accreditation:

Monmouth College is accredited by the North Central Association and teacher preparation programs are approved by the Illinois State Board of Education. Programs were last reviewed by ISBE in the spring of 2000. Many departments in the College are recognized by their related professional associations.

Teacher Education Vision:

The Monmouth College Teacher Education Program is committed to carrying out the mission of the college emphasizing the discovery of connections, exploration of multiple perspectives, and an appreciation of the creative tension that exists among the principles of democracy, pluralism equality, and freedom. In addition to the college mission, the Teacher Education Program and all concerned stakeholders have developed and are committed to a more specific mission. The mission of the Monmouth College Teacher Education Program is to ensure that candidates will cultivate the academic and pedagogic expertise they need to integrate their learning into conceptually rich, interdisciplinary, and meaningful curriculum and instruction to promote community partnerships and the educational success and well-being of all students.

Best Practices:

- All candidates begin the professional education program during the freshman year and must develop a personalized academic plan at the point of admittance with a member of the Educational Studies Department.
- The professional education program features early and extensive field experiences beginning in the freshman year that are continued throughout the program, leading to the culminating clinical experience of student teaching.
- Instructors in the Educational Studies Department teach at multiple levels of the program, as well as supervise student teachers.
- At the heart of our curriculum is a strong nationally-recognized liberal arts program which all candidates must pursue.

Notable Features and Accomplishments:

- One of the most defining features of our program involves the personal ties developed between teacher candidates and faculty. Ours is a small college which emphasizes the development of close personal and professional relationships with students. In many respects, we view teacher education as a mentoring process.
- Our programs are partially measured by the success of our graduates. Monmouth College teacher candidates are sought out by employers, and the placement rate for first-year teachers is approximately 95%.
