## Foreword

The Illinois State Board of Education, pursuant to 105 ILCS 5/2-3.25g, must submit to the Illinois General Assembly on or before February 1 of each year a report listing "all types of waivers of mandates and modifications of mandates granted by the State Board of Education or the General Assembly . . . (identifying) the topic of the waiver along with the number and percentage of eligible applicants for which the waiver has been granted." In addition, the report must include any recommendations for amendments to or repeal of School Code mandates involved in the waivers or modifications. This is the thirteenth report submitted under that law.

This cumulative report covers all waivers and modifications of School Code mandates or administrative rules granted as of January 2010 that have been included in waiver reports submitted to the General Assembly through October 1, 2009.

## **Introduction**

*Summary of Approved Waivers and Modifications* lists all requests that have been approved either by the Illinois State Board of Education or the General Assembly since March 1995, when the waiver law was amended to allow school districts to request waivers and modifications from almost all educational mandates contained in the School Code or in the State Board of Education's administrative rules.

The report identifies approved requests alphabetically by general category followed by topic area (with statutory or rule citation); lists the total number of requests granted, including a breakdown by entity granting the request; and identifies the number of school districts for which these requests have been granted and the percentage that number represents out of the state's 869 school districts operating as of fall 2009. Three additional subsections report the waivers and modifications granted to area vocational centers, regional offices of education, and special education cooperatives. The summary is presented in chart form. The report includes comments on potential changes in laws that are the subject of approved waivers or modifications.

### **Summary Chart**

The chart organizes the 5,295 waiver and modification requests approved as of October 2009 into seven general categories: Accountability; Calendar/Instructional Time Issues; Course Offerings; Employment Issues; Fiscal Issues; Governance; and Health and Safety. Under each category, approved waivers and modifications are further delineated by topic area. In some instances, large topic areas (i.e., "Driver Education," "Holidays," and "Physical Education") are further subdivided for clarity.

Often a single eligible applicant will submit a request in more than one area or several in a single area. Therefore, the total number of petitions will exceed the number of eligible applicants receiving approval. To date, 934 school districts, or 107.5 percent of districts statewide, have been granted waivers or modifications of School Code mandates or of mandates contained in administrative rules. (This number includes districts that have consolidated or no longer exist.) In addition, nine area vocational centers (36 percent), 34 regional offices of education (75.6 percent), and 37 special education cooperatives (54.4 percent) have been granted waivers or modifications.

### **Recommendations and Discussion**

In requiring that a cumulative report on approved waivers and modifications be submitted each year, the General Assembly recognized that the waiver process could raise policy and administrative issues that need to be considered separately from individual requests. Over the past several years, the cumulative waiver report examined legally mandated school holidays and made specific recommendations for legislative changes in that area; in more recent reports, recommendations regarding use of parent-teacher conference time were also made, along with recommendations concerning fees charged for driver's education.

In the spring of 2009, Senate Bill 1956 was passed by both chambers of the General Assembly and was signed into law as Public Act 96-640 in August of 2009. Passage of this bill allows districts and other entities eligible for waivers to use legally mandated school holidays for purposes other than school dismissal and to modify the school schedule for the majority of parent-teacher configurations without using the waiver process.

## **Recommendations and Discussion**

### **Legislative Recommendations**

The following recommendation proposes amendments to the School Code in the area of driver's education fees.

#### ***Driver's Education***

Section 27-24.2 (formerly Section 27-23) of the School Code authorizes school districts to charge up to \$50 for students participating in a driver's education course. The General Assembly has approved 274 petitions from 153 school districts since May 1996 seeking to raise this \$50 limit. Of the 40 petitions receiving approval during the last two waiver reports, 30 were renewals of previously approved requests; in those cases, six districts asked for approval to increase the fee over the amount previously approved.

Requests to raise driver's education fees are the third most common type of waiver request, after holidays and daily physical education. (Fee requests share third place with waivers for administrative expenditure limits.) The number of these applications, and the maximum fees requested, strongly indicate that many school districts believe the \$50 fee is insufficient to fund driver's education programs, and they are seeking ways to cover the shortfall in revenues by charging students more to take the course. Up until May 2003, the General Assembly considered fewer than 10 requests in each report. There was a substantial increase in petitions during 2004 and while numbers have varied since then, the last five years have seen 143 petitions to raise fees, with 52 percent of these requests involving a fee greater than \$250 per student. Indeed, only 12 percent of districts with waivers still in effect have asked to limit the fee to \$150 or less. The General Assembly has approved seven requests to charge up to \$450 per student and eight requests to charge up to \$500.

The majority of the requests that have been approved – 65 percent – are from districts located in Cook County and the five collar counties or districts in or near urban centers such as Rockford, Bloomington, and the metro-east area.

Given that the law establishing the \$50 maximum is more than 20 years old and that of all driver education fee waiver requests approved, 52 percent have been approved in the past five years, the State Board recommends to the General Assembly that (1) the fee limit be eliminated, thus allowing districts to set the fee in response to local conditions, but that (2) the district set a fee only after providing appropriate advance notices and holding a public hearing in order to take comments from parents, other community members, and affected teachers and staff members.

## ***Driver's Education***

105 ILCS 5/27-24.2

Safety education; driver education course. Instruction shall be given in safety education in each of grades one through 8, equivalent to one class period each week, and any school district which maintains grades 9 through 12 shall offer a driver education course in any such school which it operates. Its curriculum shall include content dealing with Chapters 11, 12, 13, 15, and 16 of the Illinois Vehicle Code, the rules adopted pursuant to those Chapters insofar as they pertain to the operation of motor vehicles, and the portions of the Litter Control Act relating to the operation of motor vehicles. The course of instruction given in grades 10 through 12 shall include an emphasis on the development of knowledge, attitudes, habits, and skills necessary for the safe operation of motor vehicles, including motorcycles insofar as they can be taught in the classroom, and instruction on distracted driving as a major traffic safety issue. In addition, the course shall include instruction on special hazards existing and required safety and driving precautions that must be observed at emergency situations, highway construction and maintenance zones, and railroad crossings and the approaches thereto. The course of instruction required of each eligible student at the high school level shall consist of a minimum of 30 clock hours of classroom instruction and a minimum of 6 clock hours of individual behind-the-wheel instruction in a dual control car on public roadways taught by a driver education instructor endorsed by the State Board of Education. Both the classroom instruction part and the practice driving part of such driver education course shall be open to a resident or non-resident student attending a non-public school in the district wherein the course is offered. Each student attending any public or non-public high school in the district must receive a passing grade in at least 8 courses during the previous 2 semesters prior to enrolling in a driver education course, or the student shall not be permitted to enroll in the course; provided that the local superintendent of schools (with respect to a student attending a public high school in the district) or chief school administrator (with respect to a student attending a non-public high school in the district) may waive the requirement if the superintendent or chief school administrator, as the case may be, deems it to be in the best interest of the student. A student may be allowed to commence the classroom instruction part of such driver education course prior to reaching age 15 if such student then will be eligible to complete the entire course within 12 months after being allowed to commence such classroom instruction. Such a course may be commenced immediately after the completion of a prior course. Teachers of such courses shall meet the certification requirements of this Act and regulations of the State Board as to qualifications. Subject to rules of the State Board of Education, the school district may charge a reasonable fee, ~~not to exceed \$50~~, to students who participate in the course, unless a student is unable to pay for such a course, in which event the fee for such a student must be waived. A district that chooses to exercise such authority must first provide notices, hold a public hearing, and approve the action in the same manner required of eligible applicants in Section 2-3.25g(c) of the School Code [105 ILCS 5/2-3.25g(c)]. The total amount from driver education fees and reimbursement from the State for driver education must not exceed the total cost of the driver education program in any year and must be deposited into the school district's driver education fund as a separate line item budget entry. All moneys deposited into the school district's driver education fund must be used solely

for the funding of a high school driver education program approved by the State Board of Education that uses driver education instructors endorsed by the State Board of Education.
