

# What is AP Potential?

AP Potential is a free, Web-based tool that allows schools to generate rosters of students who are likely to score a 3 or higher on a given AP® Exam based on their performance on the PSAT/NMSQT®, PSAT™ 8/9, PSAT™ 10, or SAT<sup>®</sup>.

## AP Potential: The Basics

## AP Potential allows your school or district to:

- Support access to AP for all academically prepared students
- Develop a robust AP program by identifying new course offerings
- Increase the number of sections of AP courses already offered
- Reduce time to recruit new AP students

# AP Potential: The Basics

AP Potential uses scores from the PSAT/NMSQT<sup>®</sup>, PSAT<sup>™</sup> 8/9, PSAT<sup>™</sup> 10, or SAT<sup>®</sup> to provide predictions for AP<sup>®</sup> Exams.

AP Potential identifies students who are likely to succeed in AP courses and on AP® Exams. Students with AP Potential for a particular AP course have a 60% chance or greater of earning a 3 or better on that exam.

Students are able to see their AP Potential in their College Board accounts

Students taking the PSAT ™ 8/9 can only see their AP Potential for AP World History and AP European History, the two AP courses most often offered to 10th-graders

# Students Know Their AP Potential

A student's AP Potential is updated each time a student participates in a PSAT™ -related or SAT® assessment.

#### **Using this Roster**

The following roster includes students identified based on your selections. A 'Y' indicates the student is in the pool you defined for that subject. Click on the student's name to view student details, including gender, ethnicity, and a view of which pool the student falls into for each subject you have selected. Click on the subject name in the column heading to see an isolated view of the students in your roster who fall within the pool that you have defined for the selected subject, along with select demographic information.

If the number of students you are seeing doesn't fit your needs, you can click on 'Select Pool' in the menu on the left and adjust the pool level for one or more of the subjects you've selected. By default, the pool is defined at 60% for all subjects.


Please note that AP Potential does not indicate that students should move directly into AP without taking prerequisites.




# Step 2 – Use the Matching Tool.


#### If your scores have already been released (including previous years):

- If you have a Registration Number for the SAT or Subject Tests, or an Access Code for PSAT-related assessments, go to the Matching Tool and click 'Get My Scores'.




- In order to view scores, students will need to enter the following information:
  - The test∗in which the student participated (PSAT/NMSQT®, PSAT ™ 10, PSAT™ 8/9, or SAT®,)
  - The year in which that test was administered


#### OR

- The student ID number that was provided on the answer sheet
- Next, the student will need the access code (PSAT-related assessments) or the registration number (SAT®).
  - The access code can be located on:
    - The roster report in the K-12 Assessment Reporting Portal for that test administration
    - The front of a student's paper score report (PSAT-related assessments)






# SAT<sup>®</sup> Essay Practice on Khan Academy<sup>®</sup>

- ➤ SAT® Practice Tests 1 8 have essay passages and prompts. Students can receive scores on these essays when they complete them on Khan Academy.
- Official SAT® Practice on Khan Academy includes three practice prompts.
  - The system analyzes a student's writing and gives specific recommendations for how to improve their writing in the three areas scored on the SAT® essay: Reading, Analysis, and Writing.
    - Students get "Signal Strengths" to get a sense for how well the essay is measuring against different criteria.
    - Students can revise and rewrite to improve the essay and writing skills.
  - An optional prewriting area is provided to outline and organize ideas.
- Students can view the rubric used to evaluate SAT<sup>®</sup> essays.
- Tips and Strategies are available to help students approach the essay task.







# Best Practices for Implementation

Type of Practice	Description
Independent Practice	Students practice individually or in study groups at home. Students can create a 'Practice Schedule' in their accounts and receive weekly reminder emails.
Extracurricular Practice	Students practice in study hall, in the library, during after-school sessions, or with a community-based organization.
Teacher-Guided Practice	Students practice in class, using Official SAT® Practice as a learning tool.
