Ten Ways Teachers Can Create More Equitable Learning Opportunities for Students

1) Personalized Learning Plans

Incorporating student interests into learning increases engagement. Create personalized learning plans for each student. Monitor strengths and weaknesses and encourage students to reflect on their progress. Include learning experiences outside of school and use formative assessments frequently.

2) Interdisciplinary Lessons

Work with colleagues to create interdisciplinary units and lessons. It is essential for students to see standards applied across disciplines.

3) Community Service Projects

Solve local problems or assist with ongoing programs in the community. Establish relationships with community members and encourage civic engagement.

4) Incorporate Social and Emotional Learning

Use project-based learning to integrate social and emotional objectives. Solving problems through research and inquiry can teach students how to communicate and collaborate effectively.

5) Emphasize the Importance of Growth

Personalizing instruction allows for personalized authentic assessments. Measure individual student progress and praise any amounts of growth.

6) Move to Student-Centered Instruction

Embrace student-centered learning. Move from content-centered instruction to a student-centered environment. Shift roles from teacher to facilitator. Create stations throughout the classroom to organize students and make it easier to assist with individualized supports.

7) Use Technology

Technology can ease the transition from teacher to facilitator. Time management and organization are essential skills for creating more equitable learning opportunities for students. Use websites and apps to keep track of student learning inside and outside of the classroom. Technology can promote student learning and allow for mastery to occur at any time.

8) Value Student Voices
