What is a root cause analysis?

A root cause analysis is an approach to problem solving through discussion to dig deeper than surface symptoms and causes and undercover underlying problems impacting the school.



Why should schools conduct a root cause analyze?

- RCA helps districts and schools identify the root cause of problems and implement solutions to prevent future occurrences, improving quality and student outcomes
- RCA helps keep the focus on challenges that are within the scope of control in a school setting.

Identify Local Needs - Conducting a Root Cause Analysis

A root cause analysis is a systematic process for identifying the underlying (or "root") causes of the challenges that organizations or institutions face. A root cause analysis is an approach to problem-solving through discussion to dig deeper than the surface symptoms and uncover the underlying causes.

Addressing the root causes of the problems or challenges your system faces, rather than addressing obvious symptoms, enables stakeholders to make lasting and impactful systemic changes.

Steps	Guiding Questions
Define the Problem	What is the nature of the problem? What happened? (Example: The achievement gap between groups continues from year to year with little to no change in proficiencies among student groups.) Where and when does it occur? To whom does it happen? How does it affect our goals?

Identify possible causes and categories

What factors and causes are within our control, and which are not?

Dig deeper into the "why"?


