Newly released

The U.S. Department of Education recently released a draft document titled "Title I Part A of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 as Amended by the Every Student Succeeds Act: **Providing Equitable Services to Eligible Private School Children, Teachers and Families**—Updated Non-Regulatory Guidance."



Equitable Services

ESSA Section 1117 requires participating LEAs to provide eligible children attending private schools, their teachers, and their families with Title I services or other benefits that are equitable to those provided to eligible public school children, their teachers, and their families. Eligible private school children are children who reside in a participating public school attendance area and are low achieving.



Consultation

An LEA must consult with appropriate private school officials during the design and development of the LEA's Title I program. The goal of consultation is agreement between the LEA and appropriate private school officials on how to provide equitable and effective programs for eligible private school children.

Successful consultation:

- Establishes positive and productive working relationships.
- Makes planning effective.
- Continues throughout implementation of services.
- Serves to ensure that services provided meet the needs of students and teachers.



Consultation

Private school officials in consultation may provide:

- A list of addresses and grade levels of low-income families.
- A list of children who meet the multiple, educationally related, objective criteria for participation eligibility.
- Suggest ideas, program designs, and modifications that meet the needs of their eligible children, their teachers, and their families.
- Discuss dedicated space for services, if appropriate.

Topics to be addressed in consultation include:

- How needs will be identified.
- What services will be offered (including how, where, and by whom).
- How the services will be academically assessed and how the results will be used to improve services.
- The proportion of funds allocated for services.



Equitable Share in Title I

Equitable share is based on the number of lowincome students attending nonpublic schools, regardless of where the schools are based.

Services are based on those students in academic need who reside within the public school's boundaries.



Equitable Share in Title II and IV

Equitable share in Title II and Title IV is based on the total population of the nonpublic school.

The nonpublic school must be located within the public school's boundaries to receive Title II and or Title IV services.

The services provided must meet the intent of the grant.
