





Communitywide Screenings

Comprehensive screening procedures include:

- Weighted eligibility criteria to assess the child's/family's at risk factors
- Research-Based child developmental screening instrument(s)
- Programs should be prepared to make referrals



Comprehensive screening procedures include:

- Written parental permission (for screening)
- Parent interview
- Vision and hearing screening
- Inclusion of staff
- Process to share screening results with parents and staff

Program Model

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- Intensity of services
 - O1.0 FTE home visitor (serving families weekly) has a caseload of approximately 10 to 15 families. (average 13)
 - o1.0 FTE home visitor (serving families biweekly) has a caseload of approximately 18 to 25 families. (average 20)

- Doula services are integrated and provided concurrently with home visiting services
- Training and Technical Assistance = Ounce of Prevention Fund
- Partnership with community hospitals
- Program staff flexibility
- Multiple doulas on staff

 - o Children 3 months of age or older
 - Every 6 months



- Vision and Hearing Screens (required)
 - O Developmental Screening Instrument (e.g. ASQ)
 - Children 3 months of age/every 6 months)
- Higher Standard of Practice
 - Vision collected from a child's physician or medical home
 - ★ Children 6 months of age/annually
 - Hearing objective measure of hearing sensitivity (e.g., AOE)
 - Children 6 months of age/annually
- Refer to IDHS Child and Family Connections (as appropriate)



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

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GRANT ACCOUNTABILITY AND TRANSPARENCY ACT



What is GATA?

The Illinois Grant Accountability and Transparency Act (GATA) is state legislation requiring the adoption and implementation of a comprehensive set of standards that mandate accountability and transparency throughout the entire life cycle of a grant.

- GATA provides a single, authoritative, statewide, comprehensive source of financial assistance program information. State agencies have populated the **Catalog of State Financial Assistance (CSFA)** with federal, federal pass-through and state awards received. The CSFA also records grantee awards under each CSFA number.
- The public can search the CSFA for agencies with active grant programs, currently funded grants, current funding opportunities, and registered grantees.

- Grant applicants are required to complete a FY 2019 Fiscal and Administrative Risk Assessment in the form of an Internal Controls Questionnaire (ICQ) available through the GATA Web Portal and a FY 2019 Programmatic Risk Assessment through the ISBE Web Application Security (IWAS) system, when they become available. Grant awards will not be executed until the FY 2019 ICQ and Programmatic Risk Assessments are completed.

- Grants will be scored as follows using a rubric linked in the application and posted on the ISBE website:
 - Population to be served-possible 30 points
 - Quality of proposed program-possible 40 points
 - Experience and qualifications-possible 20 points
 - Budget-possible 10 points
 - Priority possible 10 points
 - Total Possible Points 110
- Grant applications will be reviewed by an evaluation committee, with a minimum of three members reviewing each application.
