State Special Education Evidence Based Funding – 105 ILCS 5/18-8.15

Each fiscal year, ISBE will compute the Base Funding Minimum derived from the three Special Ed programs integrated into EBF as well as EBF Tier Funding for Special Ed.

The amounts are attributable and must be used for the provision of special educational facilities and services, as defined in Section 14-1.08 which include:

"Expenditures for special schools, classes, housing (including residential facilities), special instruction, special reader service, braillists and typists for children with visual disabilities, sign language interpreters, transportation, maintenance, instructional material, therapy, professional consultant services, medical services only for diagnostic and evaluation purposes provided by a physician licensed to practice medicine in all its branches to determine a child's need for special education and related services, psychological services, school social worker services, special administrative services, salaries of all required special personnel, and other special educational services (including special equipment for use in the classroom) required by the child because of his disability."

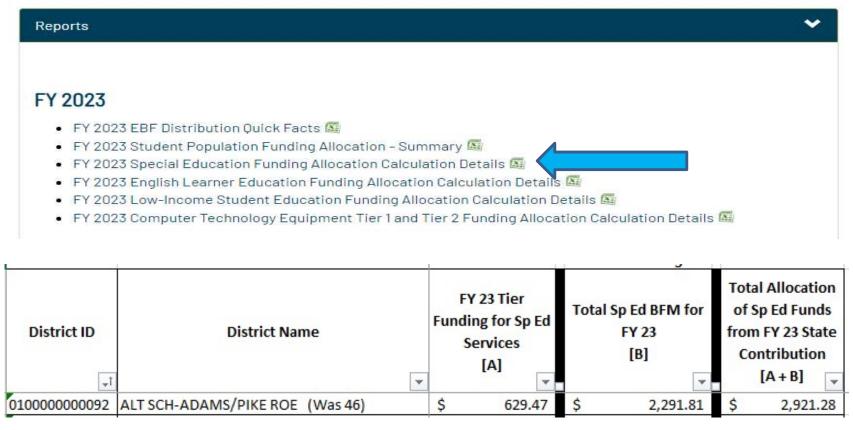

American Rescue Plan (ARP) IDEA

- ISBE received an additional \$103.6 million in IDEA funding and an additional \$9.0 million in IDEA preschool funding from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA).
- Funds are available for obligation July 1, 2021 –
 September 30, 2023, assuming a substantially approvable application was submitted no later than July 1, 2022.
- Districts with FY22 projects must have unexpended balances as of June 30, 2023 put into new, FY24 project application.
- Period of obligation ends in less than four months.

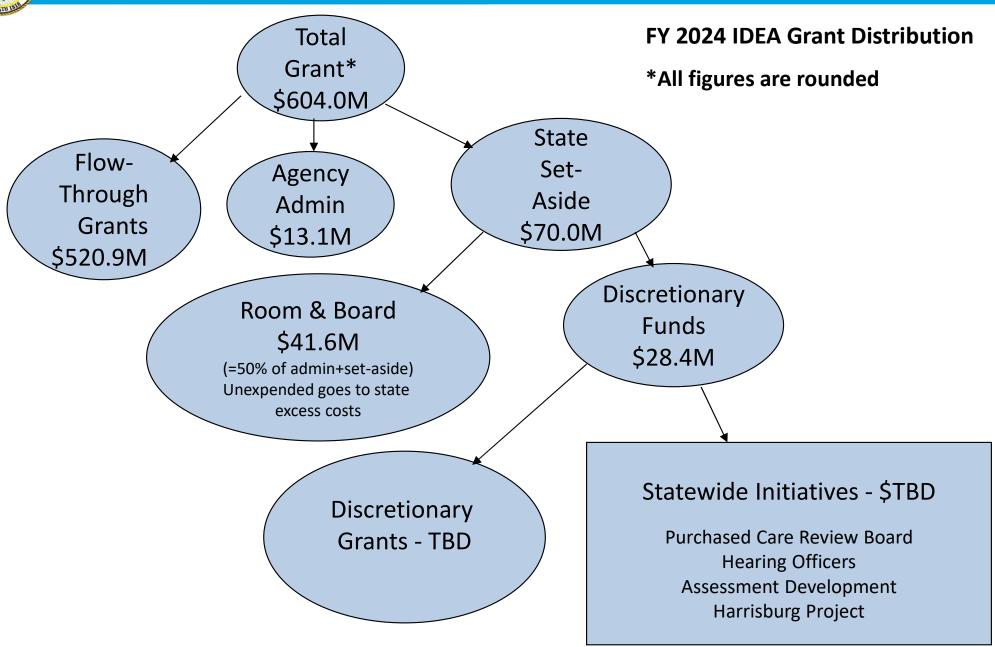

Preliminary FY23 proration is 75%. Final FY23 proration and preliminary FY24 proration will be set and communicated to Districts in January 2024. Funds may be reallocated from administration and other discretionary funds prior to final disbursement.

Assistance to States for the Education of Children with Disabilities

300.705(b) Allocations to LEAs – Permanent formula

- Went into effect when the federal appropriation reached \$4,924,672,200
- Base Year: established in the fiscal year preceding the first fiscal year the federal appropriation reached the \$4.9 billion mark (FY 2000)



34 CFR 300

Assistance to States for the Education of Children with Disabilities

300.705(b)(3) Increase in funds (Amount over the Base)

- 85% distributed on the basis of the relative population of children in public and private elementary and secondary schools, ages 3-21 who are of the same age children with disabilities for whom the State ensures the availability of FAPE under Part B;
- 15% distributed for the same population of children but who are living in poverty
 (Illinois uses Dept of Human Services 3 year avg poverty count, consistent with use in Evidence-Based Funding)



- BASE YEAR PART B FLOW THROUGH
 - -- Calculated from the Dec 1, 1998 Child Count
 - -- Each district's count multiplied by \$518.66
 - -- Since FY 2000 the special education child count has not been used to determine Part B Flow Through district allocations

IDEA Part B Flow Through Base Year Amount is \$145,798,830



- BASE YEAR PART B PRESCHOOL
 - -- Calculated from the Dec 1, 1996 Child Count
 - -- Each district's count multiplied by \$485.55
 - -- Since FY 1998 the special education child count has not been used to determine Part B Preschool district allocations

IDEA Part B Preschool Base Year Amount is \$12,587,817



PUBLIC ENROLLMENT

- -- All public school students ages 3-21 (not grade level)
- District enrollment utilizes the students reported as of October 1 used in Evidence-Based Funding;
- -- Student Information System Home District
 - Enrollments are adjusted to count students for deactivated grades/schools back to their resident district.
 - Parentally paid tuition—in students are removed from the district.
 - State authorized charter school enrollments are removed from the district.



NON-PUBLIC ENROLLMENT

- -- Nonpublic Educational Entity Registration, Enrollment, and Staff Report
- -- Any nonprofit, non-home-based, and nonpublic elementary or secondary school may register (Section 2-3.25o(e))
- -- All nonpublic students ages 3-21



POVERTY

- -- Obtained from the Department of Human Services
- -- The higher of the number of students for the prior school year OR the average of the immediately preceding 3 school years
- -- Students reported by DHS are:
 - Non-Duplicated
 - Ages 5-17
 - Receive services through:
 - Medicaid
 - Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)
 - Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP)
 - Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF)

Non-public Proportionate Share

Parentally Placed: All children with disabilities enrolled by their parents in a private, including religious elementary/secondary school.

- Fund Code L Non-public parochial students receiving services via an individualized services plan from the serving school district as of December 1
- Fund Code P Non-public home-school students receiving services via an individualized services plan from the serving school district as of December 1
- Fund Code N All parentally-placed students ages 3-5 and ages 6-21 in non-public schools, including home-schools, who have been evaluated and have had their eligibility determined to either receive or not receive special education services.



Non-public Proportionate Share

Example - District 1
Final IDEA Part B Flow Through Amount = \$100,000

- December 1 I-Star Report
 - Fund Code L students = 10
 - Fund Code P students = 5
 - Fund Code N students = 5
 - Total non-public eligible = <u>20</u>
- Total district special education count Dec 1 = 95
- Fund Code N students Codes 02, 03 & 04 = 5
 - Total count = **100**
- Calculation: 20/100 = **20**%
- Non-Public Proportionate Share Amount:
 - 20% X \$100,000 = \$20,000



Non-public Proportionate Share

- IDEA NPPS funds <u>cannot</u> be provided directly to a non-public school
- If the district does not expend the NPPS set aside by the end of the fiscal year, the district must carryover and obligate the remaining funds for non-public school special education services for one additional year.



Budget Amendments

 Must be submitted by district if expenditures exceed 10% or \$1,000 in an <u>object total</u> (e.g. Object 100-Salaries)

 Final amendments and/or project end date extensions are due 30 days prior to the end of project end date.
