

## **Family Child Care Model**

(Prevention Initiative and Preschool for All)

Family child care and family child care group homes licensed by the Illinois Department of Child & Family Services (DCFS) can apply in a subcontracted effort with administrative agents from a Local Education Agency or another eligible applicant for the Early Childhood Block Grant (ECBG). A school district or other eligible applicant can participate in only one proposal for an ECBG initiative.

## Eligible applicants that may partner with a family child care home include:

- Regional Offices of Education
- Public school districts
- University laboratory schools approved by the Illinois State Board of Education
- Charter schools
- Area vocational centers
- Public or private not-for-profit or for-profit entity with experience in providing educational, health, social, and/or child development services to young children and their families

Non-school district applicants must be operating at the time grant funds are awarded. A facility subject to DCFS licensure requirements must hold the appropriate licensure in accordance with that agency's rules to be eligible to host or operate an ECBG program. (See 89 Illinois Administrative Code, Chapter III: Department of Children and Family Services, Subchapter e: Requirements for Licensure.)

Applications for funds may be submitted by any combination of eligible applicants, as described in 235.10 (b) of the Early Childhood Block Grant Administrative Rules, Part 235, Subpart A.

Funding is not available to applicants in Chicago District 299. Applicants interested in offering services for children and families within the Chicago city limits must contact the Chicago Public Schools' Office of Early Childhood Education.

## **Prevention Initiative Guidelines**

- The Prevention Initiative (PI) Center-Based model serves children ages birth to 3.
- Grantees will follow the PI Center-Based requirements as specified in the Request for Proposal (RFP) and guidelines within the <u>Prevention Initiative Compliance Checklist</u>, including having a research-based curriculum, professional development plans, monitoring, and continuous quality improvement.
- Grantees will follow the adult-to-child ratio that is set by <u>DCFS Family Child Care Home Licensing Standards.</u>
- Administrative agents may add additional slots to their programs by partnering with one or more DCFS-licensed family child care home.
- Additional staffing may be needed to provide care for children who are not age eligible for the PI program. <u>DCFS adult-to-child ratio guidelines</u> must be followed.
- The PI program must have set hours and be implemented continuously for at least 2.5 hours each day, five days a week.
- Program Teaching Options:
  - Visiting Teacher: Must be hired by the administrative agent who meets the qualifications as specified by the <u>PI Compliance Checklist</u>; or
  - Family Child Care Home Educator: Must have the qualifications as specified by the <u>PI Compliance Checklist</u> and there must be a child care assistant meeting DCFS requirements to care for children not eligible for the PI program.
- Program Teaching Credential Requirements:
  - Teachers must meet at minimum the DCFS qualifications for early childhood teachers in a child care center. Staff must hold or be working toward obtaining an Illinois Gateways Infant Toddler Credential level 2 or beyond.
- Family child care homes must be licensed through DCFS, adhering to all requirements set forth in the Illinois Administrative Code <u>Title 89: Social Services Chapter III:</u>
   Department of Children and Family Services Subchapter e: Requirements for Licensure Part 406 Licensing Standards for Day Care Homes. Family group homes must adhere to Illinois Administrative Code Title 89: Social Services Chapter III: Department of Children and Family Services Subchapter e: Requirements for Licensure Part 403 Licensing Standards for Group Homes.
- Grant funds would be used to support implementation of PI as specified in the PI
   <u>Compliance Checklist</u> and within the suggested activities of the research-based curriculum and assessment, including expenditures for staff, equipment, supplies and professional development.

## **Preschool for All**

- The Preschool for All (PFA) program serves children ages 3 to 5 years old.
- Grantees would follow the PFA requirements as specified in the RFP and guidelines within the <u>Preschool for All Compliance Checklist</u>, including having a research-based curriculum and assessment, participating in professional development, monitoring, and continuous quality improvement.
- Grantees will follow the adult-to-child ratio that is set by <u>DCFS Family Child Care Home</u> Licensing Standards.
- Administrative agents may add additional slots to their programs by partnering with one or more DCFS-licensed family child care home.
- Additional staffing may be needed to provide care for children who are not age eligible for the PFA program. must be followed.
- The PFA program must have set hours and be implemented continuously for at least 2.5 hours each day, five days a week.
- Program Teaching Options:
  - Visiting Teacher: Must be hired by the administrative agent who meets the qualifications as specified by the Preschool for All Compliance Checklist; or
  - Family Child Care Home Educator: Must have the qualifications specified by the PFA Compliance Checklist and a child care assistant who meets the DCFS qualifications to care for children not eligible for the PFA program.
- Program Teaching Credential Requirements:
  - The lead teacher: A traveling teacher or family child care educator must hold a current Professional Educator License (PEL) with an early childhood education endorsement or an Illinois Gateway Level 5 credential while pursuing a PEL or a proper temporary approval.
- Family child care homes must be licensed through DCFS, adhering to all requirements set forth in the Illinois Administrative Code <u>Title 89: Social Services Chapter III:</u>
   Department of Children and Family Services Subchapter e: Requirements for Licensure Part 406 Licensing Standards for Day Care Homes. Family group homes must adhere to Illinois Administrative Code Title 89: Social Services Chapter III: Department of Children and Family Services Subchapter e: Requirements for Licensure Part 403 Licensing Standards for Group Homes.
