## **Teaching About LGBTQ+ Resources**

### Introduction

#### **Resource Guide Overview**

This resource guide recognizes the ongoing presence, contributions, and struggles of LGBTQ+ individuals and communities throughout history and into the present day. LGBTQ+ people have played critical roles in shaping our social, cultural, and political landscapes across generations — often in the face of systemic discrimination and erasure.

This guide is aligned with our commitment to inclusive education. It provides curated resources to support educators, administrators, and community members in creating learning spaces that affirm, respect, and uplift LGBTQ+ identities and histories. This guide is designed to help move beyond limited narratives and ensure that all students see themselves reflected in the curriculum. It provides everything from foundational background to lesson plans, information about organizations, and professional development opportunities.

## **Background**

Throughout history, LGBTQ+ individuals have made significant contributions to civil rights, the arts, sciences, education, and social justice movements. Despite progress, many LGBTQ+ stories remain marginalized or untold in mainstream education. Representation in curriculum and school culture is essential to combat harmful stereotypes and to build safe, welcoming, and affirming environments for all students — regardless of their sexual orientation, gender identity, or gender expression.

Illinois has taken important steps to address this need, including enactment of the Inclusive Curriculum Law (House Bill 246), which requires the teaching of LGBTQ+ contributions to U.S. and Illinois history. This guide serves as an entry point for schools and educators to meet these requirements with thoughtful, age-appropriate, and affirming resources.

## Goal

This guide was developed to provide, advocate for, and support an inclusive system of education that recognizes and affirms the diverse experiences, histories, and identities of LGBTQ+ people, while equipping educators with the tools and knowledge to foster safe, supportive learning environments for all.

## **Mission**

The Illinois State Board of Education, in partnership with LGBTQ+ advocates, community organizations, and educators created this guide to empower schools to move beyond outdated or incomplete narratives. Centering the voices and lived experiences of LGBTQ+ individuals enables the development of inclusive curricula and practices that promote equity, respect, and belonging.

## **Principles for Teaching LGBTQ+ History and Topics**

## 1. Center LGBTQ+ Voices and Perspectives

Use credible sources, literature, and media created by LGBTQ+ individuals to present a fuller, more accurate picture of LGBTQ+ histories and contributions.

#### 2. Highlight Diversity Within LGBTQ+ Communities

Acknowledge the intersections of race, ethnicity, gender identity, ability, and other aspects of identity within LGBTQ+ communities to avoid oversimplified or monolithic representations.

## 3. Foster Inclusive Learning Environments

Cultivate classrooms and schools that affirm all gender identities and sexual orientations. Adopt inclusive language, implement anti-bullying policies, and model respect for all students.

## 4. Commit to Present and Future Visibility

Ensure that LGBTQ+ people are not only represented in historical contexts but are also recognized as vibrant, thriving members of our communities today and in the future.

#### 5. Engage Families and Communities

Build partnerships with families and community organizations to promote understanding and support for LGBTQ+ students, and to extend inclusive practices beyond the classroom.
