Big Ideas

Big ideas represent major themes of the learning plan. These ideas may be repeated or revisited throughout the learning experience to enhance and deepen understanding. See table below.

Big Idea 1	WBL connects all aspects of the agricultural education three-circle model, beginning with career awareness and concluding with career-focused programs. Each circle of the three-circle model has unique WBL tools, resources, and strategies for participation and achievement in work-based learning experiences.	
Big Idea 2	WBL is incentivized and celebrated through incorporation into various award programs in agricultural education. However, the most common limiting factor for students in many of these programs is progress in WBL projects.	
Big Idea 3	AFNR courses can embed WBL at the activity, lesson, unit and course-wide levels of instruction. Courses may also serve as stand-alone work-based learning experiences.
