Program Overview



The MEP is a federally-funded program authorized under Title I, Part C, of the "Every Student Succeeds Act"—ESSA 2015, that provides supplemental education and supportive services to migratory children and youth across the United States.



MEP Program Goals



- To support high-quality educational program for migrant children and youth in order to reduce the educational disruption that results from repeated moves.
- To better prepare migrant children and youth to enter school, experience academic success, graduate, and pursue postsecondary education or employment







Challenges Faced by Migratory Children & Youth



- Frequent moves = disrupted schooling gaps in learning – inconsistent attendance
- Lack of credit accrual and ability to meet local graduation requirement and state standards
- Language barriers
- Low socio-economic status / need to work
- Subpar living condition / health concerns



Regular Term Programs



MEP projects operate in coordination with the regular school program and are <u>supplemental</u> to other federal, state, and local programs. Services may include:

- Before and after school programs (tutorial support)
- Secondary school services to assist high school students in achieving graduation
- Connecting families & schools
- Sharing of student information across district and states
- Early childhood support

Summer Programs



During the summer, the peak of the migrant agricultural season, comprehensive programs for migrant children offer a full range of academic and supportive services.

- Focus literacy & math
- Enrichment activities (arts, field trips, etc.)
- Health & dental services
- Credit accrual
- TX state assessments
- Center-based vs. Home-based




MEP Process



- 1. Identify potential youth
- Interview and recruit (complete COE)
- 3. Provide services
- 4. Ongoing communication for other supports needed

Basic Eligibility



- Child must be younger than the age of 22
- Child has not earned a HS diploma or an equivalent degree from the U.S.
- Child has moved on their own as a migratory worker or with/to join/to precede a parent, spouse or guardian who is a migratory worker



Basic Eligibility



- The move was:
 - Within the preceding 36 months
 - Due to economic necessity
 - From one school district to another
 - From one residence to another

*Migratory worker is someone who has moved within the past 36 months AND engaged in qualifying seasonal or temporary work in agriculture or fishing soon after the move



Identification & Recruitment (ID&R)



- Identification means actively looking for and finding migratory children
- Recruitment means contacting families or youth and obtaining the necessary information to document the child(ren)'s eligibility for, and enroll them into the Migrant Education Program



ID&R is the Foundation of the MEP



- Our state's responsibility is to identify ALL migratory children and youth in a timely manner.
- Effective ID&R practices can become the center of a network that connects migratory families and youth to schools and communities.
- When schools, growers, and other agencies know the MEP and trust MEP staff, they are more likely to allow recruitment on-site and we are more likely to identify all eligible youth.

Illinois Migrant Education Program (MEP)



The federally funded Title I Migrant Education Program (MEP) overseen by the Office of Migrant Education provides supplemental educational and supportive services to migratory children across the nation. The Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) administers the MEP in Illinois by allocating funds to local school districts and other entities in areas with a significant number of migratory children. Additionally, ISBE funds efforts across the state to identify all eligible migratory children, and these efforts can lead to the expansion of services in new areas.

The goal is to help reduce the impact of educational disruptions and other challenges faced by migratory children and youth. Inconsistent work, housing, poor nutrition and frequent mobility are realities for migratory farmworker families. The academic and supportive services help migratory children and youth to overcome these barriers and are better prepared to enter school, experience academic success, graduate, and pursue postsecondary education or employment.
