

#### Illinois Innovation

Martin Cooper, a Chicago native, invented the cell phone in 1973 while working for Motorola in Schaumburg. The device known as the DynaTAC (Dynamic Adaptive Total Area Coverage) weighed 2.5 pounds, stood 9 inches tall and provided only 35 minutes of talk time. Despite the short battery life and bulky size, it revolutionized how we communicate. Today, cell phones have become so accessible and common that even elementary school children often have them.

While cell phones can be a life saver in emergencies, they can also be a major distraction in the classroom. Check your school's policy on cell phones in the building. Review the policy with your child to ensure they understand the rules and consequences of using their cell phone during class time. You may also limit usage at home by enabling parent controls through your service provider to encourage homework completion and quality family time.



#### **Create Innovation at Home**

Communication is a vital skill for any innovator. Many groundbreaking ideas like the cell phone – were once considered far-fetched or even impossible. A century ago, the thought of using a handheld device to tele-communicate to someone miles away sounded like science fiction. However, thanks to clear communication and persistence, ideas like these became reality.

When your child comes up with a new idea, encourage them to think through how they would explain it to others. They should have a goal in mind. Can they clearly describe what problem they are trying to solve, the steps that are needed, and who or what may help them along the way?

By practicing clear communication, goal setting, and identifying resources, your child will not only strengthen their speaking and writing skills, but also learn how to turn ideas into action. These are the early steps of innovation!

#### Illinois Innovation

Víctor Gómez, the 2025 Illinois Teacher of the Year, exemplifies how Illinois educators continue to inspire the next generation of innovators. Mr. Gómez, who has been recognized by the National Science Teacher Association, teaches bilingual science classes in Leyden High School District 212. He advocated for and successfully launched the school's first bilingual course and designed a curriculum tailored to provide more opportunities to the bilingual students in his community.

Mr. Gómez is a child of a Mexican immigrant who deeply values cultural heritage. To celebrate and empower students, he founded the Alianza Latin Student club and Mariachi Augilas, the first of their kind at Leyden, to honor his students' background through community and music.

Mr. Gómez also helped develop a partnership with Elmhurst University, enabling high school students to receive college credit.

This helps create pathways for more bilingual students to enter and succeed in STEM



professions. In addition, he supports the teacher pipeline through mentorship of future bilingual teachers.

As Teacher of the Year, Mr. Gómez will travel across the state during his yearlong, state-funded sabbatical to share his passion, experiences, and commitment to education equity and innovation.

#### **Create Innovation at Home:**

- Research thoroughly Help your child explore both sides of an issue. Teach them how to understand key facts and evaluate data. Clear information builds a strong foundation for any idea.
- Craft a persuasive message Encourage your child to think about their audience. What words will connect with them? How can they clearly explain their idea to gain support?
- Be patient and persistent Remind your child that lasting change takes time. Support them in building positive relationships and goal commitment.

#### Illinois Innovation

LGBT+ individuals have made lasting contributions to society. While Jane Addams never publicly identified as lesbian, she had two long-term, same-sex relationships in her life and openly expressed her love for her partner, Mary Rozet Smith. She was deeply connected to the lesbian community and an active advocate to advance women's rights through her work with the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom.

In 2008, Addams was inducted into the Chicago Gay and Lesbian Hall of Fame. Her highest honor, however, was the Nobel Peace Prize for all her efforts to promote peace both nationally and internationally.

Addams' innovative thinking led to systems for change and made her a pioneer within the fields of social work, social reform, civic engagement, and feminism.

She co-founded Hull House in Chicago with Ellen G. Starr in 1889. Hull House provided vital services to millions of people through its 120-plus year history before closing in 2012.



#### **Create Innovation at Home**

Some of the most creative ideas come from trying to solve everyday problems. As a family, work together to come up with solutions that improve home life or make a difference in your community.

Start by choosing a problem to solve — like doing household chores or something grander, like reducing food insecurity in your community. Once you've identified a common need, research possible solutions.

Next, create a **SMART goal** together: **Specific** — clearly defined. **Measurable** — a way to track progress. **Achievable** — a realistic goal. **Relevant** — meaningful to your family or community. **Timely** — set a deadline. When you reach your goal, celebrate your success as a family!

Thanksgiving is a time to gather with loved ones, share a meal, and express our gratitude. After all the food has been served and the dirty dishes begin stacking up, there's one modern convenience many of us are especially thankful for the dishwasher!

We can thank Josephine Garis Cochrane for inventing the first successful hand-powered dishwasher in the early 1880s while living in Shelbyville. Widowed and in debt, she pursued her idea for a gentler, more efficient dishwashing machine.

Other dishwashing machines of the time used scrubbers that damaged fine china. Her design used water pressure to clean dishes without damage. She partnered with mechanic George Butters to help build her design.

Though her first model was not affordable for home use, it was perfect for hotels and restaurants. She became so successful that she was able to open her own manufacturing business. Despite the many barriers she faced as a woman in the 19th century, Josephine ultimately persevered and changed the way

we clean up after meals.

Today, many households use a modern version of her model, something to appreciate even more after the holiday feast.

## Create Innovation at Home

Science, technology, engineering, art, and math (STEAM) are all around us — from the technology we use at home, to our household decor. Celebrating STEAM with your family is a great way to spark curiosity, build critical thinking skills, and highlight how these fields shape our everyday lives.

Here are a few ways to celebrate and explore STEAM together:

- Visit a Museum (in person or online) Explore local museums or take virtual tours. Discuss the artists, inventors, and scientists you discover with your child.
- Explore STEAM Career Research exciting jobs in STEAM fields, such as robotics, graphic design, or architecture, Help your child see the real—world possibilities connected to their interests.
- Take a Nature Walk Go outside to observe your surroundings. Take notes or sketches of what you see and talk about your findings as a family.

We often see December as the midpoint of the school year — a time to rest, recharge, and enjoy winter break with the family. It's also a season with cultural and religious celebrations, many of which bring loved ones together to share special meals. And sometimes, the best part is dessert! If you've ever had to bring the dessert, you know that transporting a cake can be tricky. That's exactly what Bertha Palmer thought in 1893 when she invented the brownie while preparing boxed lunches for the Women's Pavilion at the World's Columbian Exposition, held to mark the 400th anniversary of Christopher Columbus' arrival in America.

Cake was the preferred option for dessert; however, it was too large and heavy to pack in a lunch box, so Mrs. Palmer needed something more portable. Thankfully, she had access to her husband's pastry chefs at the Palmer House in Chicago. Eventually, they created the tasty treat now known as the "brownie." Today, you may enjoy Mrs. Palmer's original recipe at the Palmer House Hilton Hotel, or you can bake them at home using



the Palmer House Brownie recipe.

### **Create Innovation at Home**

Collaboration is a key ingredient in both innovation and creativity. When people from different backgrounds come together — each bringing their own skills and experiences — they're more likely to solve problems effectively, learn from one another, and create lasting impact.

As parents, we can help our children understand the value of networking and collaborating by encouraging them to build strong social skills from an early age.

- Enroll younger children in activities, such as sports, arts, or community programs, outside of school to expand their social skills, practice teamwork, and build friendships.
- Converse with older children and teens about the benefits of joining clubs, music groups, or leadership programs, or urge them to volunteer. If they are entering the workplace, discuss how collaboration in professional settings can lead to greater success.

In today's global economy, collaboration is essential.

Teaching your child how to connect, communicate, and work effectively with others is one of the most valuable life skills you can pass on.

Dedicate this year to building a growth mindset — not just for yourself, but for your entire family. A growth mindset views mistakes, setbacks, and challenges as valuable learning opportunities. Instead of seeing failure as the end, see it as part of the journey toward success.

Here's how you can help your family embrace a growth mindset:

- Reframe challenges Encourage your child to see challenges as exciting opportunities, not obstacles.
- Celebrate effort, not just results Praise persistence, hard work, and progress.
- Learn from mistakes Talk about what went wrong and how to do better next time, without shame or blame.
- Model positive language Try replacing fixed-mindset phrases with growth mindset alternatives.

#### Illinois Innovation

As we celebrate Children's Dental Health Month, it's important to recognize one of the most influential figures in dental history — Dr. Greene Vardiman Black, often referred to as "father of modern restorative dentistry."

Dr. Black began his dental practice around 1858 in Winchester. He served as an Army scout during the Civil War in 1862. After being injured in 1863, he opened a dental practice in Jacksonville. This is when and where he began pioneering advancements in dental science and technique.

Among his many contributions to the field of dentistry, Dr. Black invented the corddriven dental engine and a foot motor. He also was one of the first medical professionals to use nitrous oxide gas as an anesthetic in dental procedures. Dr. Black wrote the first textbook of human dental anatomy and was a visionary in the treatment of cavities and the use of amalgam for fillings.

Dr. Black also promoted the importance of preventative care. Children's Dental Health Month is a great opportunity to teach children about the importance of prevention practices in maintaining healthy teeth and gums — lessons rooted in the pioneering work of Dr. G.V. Black.

#### **Create Innovation at Home**

Encourage your child to explore Career and Technical Education (CTE). Career exploration can start earlier than you might think — even in preschool! Simple activities like role-playing or reading books about different professions can spark curiosity and help children imagine themselves in a variety of careers. As they grow, encourage them to explore CTE programs, which offer hands-on instruction for careers in ever-evolving, high-skill, and in-demand occupations.

Invite family members and friends from different trades to share their career experiences with your child.

This technology was the precursor to today's high-definition, flatpanel television monitors. Their contribution was so impactful that they received an Emmy Award.

That's exactly what William LeBaron Jenney did when he revolutionized architectural engineering by building upward, using an iron frame to support a taller structure. In 1884, he pushed the limits by designing the world's first skyscraper — the Home Insurance Building in Chicago. Completed in 1885, the 10-story structure stood 138 feet tall and forever changed the skyline of the city – and the world.

#### **Create Innovation at Home**

Looking for a fun and educational way to challenge your child's mind? Try a simple engineering activity that encourages creativity, problem-solving, and resilience — all through play!

Gather everyday household items, such as dry pasta, straws, paper, and a small amount of tape. The key is to choose materials that are a bit tricky to work with — this adds to the challenge! Make sure each participant has the same set of supplies to keep things fair. Set a timer and see who can build the tallest free-standing structure before time runs out. Then, gather everyone together and talk about the experience:

- What part of the challenge was the hardest?
- → How did they try to solve that problem?
- What might they try differently next time?

These kinds of activities do more than build towers — they build confidence, patience, and perseverance. By facing small frustrations and learning to work through them, children grow stronger and more resourceful. Challenges are a natural part of growing up. It's in overcoming them that we raise resilient, innovative thinkers who aren't afraid to take on the world.

Summer break is the perfect time for a road trip — and what better way to pass the miles than with some car karaoke? We can thank Paul Galvin's innovative thinking for making music on the go possible. In 1930, the Galvin Manufacturing Corp., based in Chicago, introduced the first mass-produced car radio under the brand name "Motorola" — a blend of "motor" and "Victrola."

Before this breakthrough, car radios were far too expensive for the average consumer. Galvin's affordable design changed that, making in-car entertainment accessible and setting the stage for car radios to become a standard feature in vehicles across the world.

#### **Create Innovation at Home**

Focus on the Process: Encouraging Reflective Thinking in Young Creators

When your child is engaged in a creative project — encourage them to shift their focus from the final product to the process itself. This builds critical thinking, problem-solving, and a deeper understanding of how they learn.



Ask your child to take simple notes as they work. These could include:

- What steps they took.
- → What strategies they used.
- → What worked well and what didn't.
- Why they think certain approaches were successful.

Afterward, have a conversation about their process. Ask questions like:

- "Why do you think that method worked better than the other?"
- "What could you try next time?"
- "Can you think of another way to solve the same problem?"

By reflecting on their decisions and strategies, children learn to evaluate their thinking, adapt to challenges, and develop resilience.

These reflection habits help your child grow into a thoughtful, independent learner.
