

Title IV, Part A Student Support and Academic Enrichment

Purpose: Improve academic achievement by increasing capacity of Local Education Agencies (LEAs) to provide all students with access to **well-rounded education**, **safe and healthy school conditions**, and **technology and digital literacy.**

Program Information:

- Minimum allocation of \$10,000.
- Districts receiving an allocation of \$30,000 or greater must conduct a needs assessment at least once every three years (*Consolidated District Plan: Needs Assessment/ Needs Assessment Impact tabs*) and allocate at least:
 - o 20% on well-rounded education,
 - o 20% on safe and healthy schools, and
 - ≤15% on technology.
- Programs receiving < \$30,000 may use funds for one (or more) allowable activities. Note: Activities may not exceed 15% in technology.
- Administrative costs may not exceed 2% of the current year's allocation.
- An LEA that provides districtwide services with Title IV, Part A funds must prioritize the distribution of funds to focus on schools with the greatest identified needs.
- LEAs <u>may</u> form a consortium with other LEAs and combine the funds each agency receives to jointly carry out activities. The funding for a consortium is the sum of the collective member LEAs allocations.

All costs must be:

- Reasonable: Consistent with prudent business practice and comparable current market value (2 CFR 200.404).
- Necessary: Required to carry out the intent and purpose of the Title IV, Part A program (2 CFR 200.403).
- Allocable: Chargeable or assignable in accordance with relative benefits received (2 CFR 200.405).

Unallowable Uses of Grant Funds	
Direct reimbursement to private, nonpublic schools.	Building or classroom construction, remodeling, installation, and renovation.
Gifts or gift cards.	Promotional items, such as t-shirts, caps, tote bags, imprinted pens and key chains, souvenirs, certificates.
Non-educational games, devices, and field trips.	Incentives, prizes, fundraising.
Alcohol.	Awards, award ceremonies, and social events.
Overnight field trips.	Full course meals.
Any program or activity required by state law, ISBE regulations, or local board policy.	Clubs and extracurricular activities.

Notes:

- Districts that qualify for the Rural Education Achievement Program (REAP) may choose to utilize REAP flexibility to address their particular needs.
- Program allocation amounts must align to budget detail. Label budget detail description with Well Rounded/Safe and Healthy/Technology/REAP, etc.

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
