Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ)

Q. If the grant Notice of State Award (NOSA) is not distributed until after January 2019, will the grant period be extended?

A. It is anticipated that successful applicants will receive a Notice of State Awards from the State Superintendent via email or the U.S. Postal Service approximately 90 days after the application deadline. The NOSA is <u>NOT</u> an authorization to begin performance or expenditures. Applicants must sign and return a copy of the NOSA to confirm acceptance of the terms of the award. Once the signed NOSA is received by ISBE, a Uniform Grant Agreement will be prepared and sent to the applicant. Monies spent prior to programmatic approval are done so at the applicants own risk.

Q. If I offer one AP course, or AP program am I eligible to apply?

A. Yes. As long as the school/district meets the eligibility requirements of 40 percent or more of the students are from low-income families (i.e, eligible to receive free or reduced-price meals under the School Breakfast and Lunch Program. (105 ILCS 125)

Q. If my programs are through the Illinois Virtual School am I able to apply?

A. Yes. As long as the school/district meets the eligibility requirements of 40 percent or more of the students are from low-income families (i.e, eligible to receive free or reduced-price meals under the School Breakfast and Lunch Program. (105 ILCS 125)

Q. Can multiple schools in a district apply for separate grants?

A. No. Eligibility states: School districts.

Q. For districts with multiple schools in a proposal, is the allocation \$50,000 per school or district.

A. The allocation is \$50,000 per district.

Q. Where can we access information about Pre-AP courses for current middle school students?

A. Information for Pre-AP courses can be access through the College Boards Pre-AP webpage. <u>https://pre-ap.collegeboard.org/</u>

Q. For allowable costs, are there limits on how much can be spent for each?

A. No. Allowable costs do not have limits, however, a minimum of 20% of the grant funding must be designated to building teacher capacity through professional development offered by the College Board Advance Placement training program.

Q. Can AP tests be paid for low-income students through the grant?

A. No. The grant does not allow for the off-set or payment of AP tests for students. A district may opt to use Title 1 funds to cover test fees.

Q. What qualifies a student as low-income?

A. A student that qualifies for Free and Reduced Lunch under 105 ILCS 125.
