


## Ations Report Card State Snapshot Report

The National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) assesses reading in three content areas in grade 8: reading for literary experience, to gain information, and to perform a task. The NAEP reading scale ranges from 0 to 500.

Overall Reading Results for Illinois
In 2007, the average scale score for eighth-grade students in Illinois was 263. This was not significantly different from their average score in 2005 (264) and was lower than their average score in 2003 (266).<sup>1</sup>
Illinois' average score (263) in 2007 was not significantly different from that of the nation's public schools (261).

- Of the 52 states and other jurisdictions that participated in the 2007 eighth-grade assessment, students' average scale score in Illinois was higher than those in 18 jurisdictions, not significantly different from those in 14 jurisdictions, and lower than those in 19 jurisdictions.<sup>2</sup>
- The percentage of students in Illinois who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 30 percent in 2007. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2005 (31 percent) and was smaller than that in 2003 (35 percent).
- The percentage of students in Illinois who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 75 percent in 2007. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2005 (75 percent) and was not significantly different from that in 2003 (77 percent).



NOTE: The NAEP grade 8 reading achievement levels correspond to the following scale points: Below *Basic*, 242 or lower; *Basic*, 243–280; *Proficient*, 281–322; *Advanced*, 323 or above.



## Average Score Gaps Between Selected Groups

- In 2007, male students in Illinois had an average score that was lower than that of female students by 8 points. In 2003, the average score for male students was lower than that of female students by 6 points.
- In 2007, Black students had an average score that was lower than that of White students by 27 points. In 2003, the average score for Black students was lower than that of White students by 29 points.
- In 2007, Hispanic students had an average score that was lower than that of White students by 21 points. In 2003, the average score for Hispanic students was lower than that of White students by 26 points.
- In 2007, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, a proxy for poverty, had an average score that was lower than that of students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch by 23 points. In 2003, the average score for students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch was lower than the score of those not eligible by 27 points.
- In 2007, the score gap between students at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 43 points. In 2003, the score gap between students at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 44 points.





NOTE: Scores at selected percentiles on the NAEP reading scale indicate how well students at lower, middle, and higher levels performed.

<sup>1</sup> Comparisons (higher/lower/narrower/wider/not different) are based on statistical tests. The .05 level was used for testing statistical significance. Statistical comparisons are calculated on the basis of unrounded scale scores or percentages. Comparisons across jurisdictions and comparisons with the nation or within a jurisdiction across years may be affected by differences in exclusion rates for students with disabilities (SD) and English language learners (ELL).
