

Overall Results

- In 2011, the average score of eighth-grade students in Illinois was 147. This was lower than the average score of 151 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Illinois in 2011 (147) was not significantly different from their average score in 2009 (148).
- In 2011, the score gap between students in Illinois at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 45 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 2009 (48 points).
- The percentage of students in Illinois who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 26 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (28 percent).
- The percentage of students in Illinois who performed at or above the NAEP Basic level was 60 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (61 percent).

In 2011, the average score in Illinois (147) was

- lower than those in 32 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 8 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 11 states/jurisdictions

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2011, Black students had an average score that was 41 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (44 points).
- In 2011, Hispanic students had an average score that was 26 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (30 points).
- In 2011, male students in Illinois had an average score that was higher than female students by 6 points.
- In 2011, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 30 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (34 points).
