Success1. The ACCESS data was shared with the staff and the teacher created an excellent chart that reflected the growth students achieved from the previous year. Behavior data - reduction in Office Disciplinary ReferralsDates # of Referrals Last Year # of Referrals This Year % +/-August-October 53 35 -34%November-December 76 74 -3%January-March 101 87 -14%April-June 117 58 -50%TOTALS 347 254 -27%2. With the assistance of our CEC Partner we were able to conduct a needs assessment of the Literacy Framework. This will guide our work to improve Literacy instruction during the upcoming school year.3. We were able to work on the school and classroom environments by removing items, focusing on Talking Walls and increase collaborative learning environments for the students and staff.4. Family/Community Involvement-The events that the teachers sponsored during the school year for families were fairly well attended. The Rock Island/Milan Council for Continuous Improvement had a CEC member join that provided additional support on the topics of parent and community involvement as well as cultural diversity. These areas are also included in the district's "Big Rocks" as a focus for the upcoming school year. In the month of March we became a laser like focus toward increasing communication with our families. Our data indicates that 577 different contacts were made using a variety of methods. Telephone conversations, text messages and classroom newsletters were cited as the most frequent methods used. The data indicates that approximately 15 communication connections were made with families each day with the number growing to between 25 and 30 on some of the days.5. The building leadership team has been able to successfully collaborate the development of visuals and graphics for selection of professional development focuses, professional development opportunities, coaching sessions, followed by data collection of classroom walk-throughs (rubrics developed) and the ability to repeat the cycle again. Another was created to share the communication structure of SMART goals in the center of the work, committee work/teacher focus on goals and objectives in their area of concern, and reporting out bi-weekly at the Building Leadership meetings to monitor overall progress of SIG. These graphics serve as an easy reminder of the tasks at hand, and also describe, in detail the teacher expectations. Challenges1. Number of minutes - only minimal improvement in this area. Yes, the length of time was increased for both reading and mathematics from the previous year, but further improvements as to how we strategically utilize them will be made during the 2015 - 2016 school year. Systematic planning of the day is currently underway as well an extended day plan. Intersession did not take place during the fall but did occur during the Spring.2. Outcome data - by the end of the year we were able to examine student data on Acuity measures for both reading and mathematics (fall, winter and spring data). With the PARCC assessments in their "launching" year we were not yet able to review that data but look forward to examining it once it is released. Attendance rate - students attending school and the truancy rate declined. Our school is very fortunate to have secured a \$10,000. grant from the Alcoa Foundation to address this challenge. Teacher Talent:3. Teachers whose yearly evaluations indicated the following performance level:Excellent: 1Proficient: 7Needs Improvement: 0Unsatisfactory: 04. Teacher attendance rate: I don't have the specifics but my guess is that with a long term medical leave, maternity leave and additional medical leave this would be a concern/challenge.Parent Involvement Facilitator - we hired two individuals for this position during the year. The initial individual had to be replaced as she lacked the skill set that was necessary to be successful. The second person worked for a month and cited health concerns and too many grant related tasks to complete in the amount of hours available. We are actively seeking another person for the 2015 - 2016 school year.RIA1. Parent Liaison- From start to finish, we had a strong presence in the area of parental involvement with the addition of our Parent Liaison, Ms. Robinson. To minimize disruptions, Ms. Robinson created a form for teachers to complete to request specific help from parent volunteers that ranged from copying papers to reading to students.In addition, this position worked with parents to boost attendance at programming outside of the school as well as inside of the school. She assisted with Intersession, and a Saturday field trip to a career conference. In addition, other programming outside of the school walls was also provided for parents, which included healthy grocery shopping on a budget, which we were able to build a partnership with the neighboring businesses.The events that the teachers sponsored during the school year for families were fairly well attended. The Rock Island/Milan Council for Continuous Improvement had a CEC member join that provided additional support on the topics of parent and community involvement as well as cultural diversity. These areas are also included in the district's "Big Rocks" as a focus for the upcoming school year.2. Referrals/Discipline - With the introduction of BIST (Behavior Interventions Support Tools), we saw an overall decline in referrals. Teacher accountability increased as teacher language and conversations with students changed from being punitive to being more helpful and solution focused on improving teacher-student relationships.3. With the assistance of our CEC Partner we were able to conduct a needs assessment of the Literacy Framework. This will guide our work to improve Literacy instruction during the upcoming school year. National Council for Literacy Education completed a needs assessment that has driven us to build and/or adopt a literacy framework. The organization has agreed to continue working with the Academy as we begin building the shared agreements and building the framework for literacy for our school.4. We were able to work on the school and classroom environments by removing items, focusing on Talking Walls and increase collaborative learning environments for the students and staff.6. Aside from the use of maternity leave of 3 certified staff members, overall staff attendance has improved with certified teachers missing fewer days as compared to other years. Challenges1.Although professional development has taken place, the instructional shifts in the classroom are not present and have not impacted student learning in ELA.2.While we have participated in the NILS deconstruction process and assessment design process, the big picture is still not clear and focused on how the work will proceed.3.We have not had a clear and deliberate focus on math at all in year 1.4.We are not seeing growth as measured by the Acuity Assessment in ELA/Math.5.There was some confusion and difficulty in accurately assigning the role of the English Language Arts/English Language Learner coach at the Academy. Therefore, the coaches were not used to their capacity to increase the gains in achievement as measured by the assessments like PARCC and/or Acuity.

2. The project proposed in the application, and as negotiated and finalized by the parties in the Grant Agreement, is hereinafter referred to as the "project." In planning the project there has been, and in establishing and carrying out the project, there will be (to the extent applicable to the project), participation of persons broadly representative of the cultural and educational resources of the area to be served, including persons representative of the interests of potential beneficiaries.
3. Applicants may be asked to clarify certain aspects of their proposals/applications prior to final agreement on the terms of the project.
4. All funds provided shall be used solely for the purposes stated in the approved proposal/application.

Obligations of the Illinois State Board of Education will cease immediately without further obligation should the agency fail to receive sufficient state, federal, or other funds for this program.

19. The award recipient will be in default of the grant award and the corresponding Grant Agreement if it breaches any

representation or warranty made in the Grant Agreement, the Program-Specific Terms or in these Certifications and Assurances, and Standard Terms of the Grant, or fails to observe or perform any covenant, agreement, obligation, duty or provision set forth in the Grant Agreement, the Program-Specific Terms or in these Certifications and Assurances, and Standard Terms of the Grant. Upon default by the award recipient and written notification by the Illinois State Board of Education, the award recipient will have ten (10) calendar days in which to cure the default to the satisfaction of the Illinois State Board of Education. If the default is not cured to the satisfaction of the Illinois State Board of Education, the Illinois State Board of Education shall thereafter have full right and authority to terminate the Grant Agreement and/or seek such other remedy that may be available at law or in equity. To the fullest extent permitted by law, the award recipient shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless the State of Illinois, the Illinois State Board of Education, and their respective members, officers, agents and employees against all claims, demands, suits, liabilities, injuries (personal or bodily), property damage, causes of action, losses, costs, expenses, damages or penalties, including, without limitation, reasonable defense costs, reasonable legal fees, and the reasonable value of time spent by the Attorney General's Office, arising or resulting from, or occasioned by or in connection with (a) any bodily injury or property damage resulting or arising from any act or omission to act (whether negligent, willful, wrongful, or otherwise) by the award recipient, its subcontractors, subgrantees, volunteers, anyone directly or indirectly employed by them, or anyone for whose acts they may be liable; (b) failure by the award recipient or its subcontractors, subgrantees, or volunteers to comply with any laws applicable to the performance of the grant; (c) any breach of the Grant Agreement, including, without limitation, any representation or warranty provided by the award recipient herein; (d) any infringement of any copyright, trademark, patent, or other intellectual property right; or (e) the alleged unconstitutionality or invalidity of the Grant Agreement. Neither the award recipient nor its employees or subcontractors shall be considered agents or employees of the Illinois State Board of Education or of the State of Illinois.

The applicant will obey all applicable state and federal laws, regulations, and executive orders, including without limitation: those regarding the confidentiality of student records, such as the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) (20 U.S.C. 1232g) and the Illinois School Student Records Act (ISSRA) (105 ILCS 10/1 et seq.); those prohibiting discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, age, or handicap, such as Title IX of the Amendments of 1972 (20 U.S.C. 1681 et seq.), the Illinois Human Rights Act (775 ILCS 5/1-101 et seq.), the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (20 U.S.C. 1400 et seq.), the Age Discrimination in Employment Act of 1967 (29 U.S.C. 621 et seq.), Titles VI and VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 U.S.C. 2000d et seq., 2000e et seq.), the Public Works Employment Discrimination Act (775 ILCS 10/0.01 et seq.), and the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. 12101 et seq.); and the Illinois School Code (105 ILCS 5/1-1 et seq.). 24. The applicant is prohibited from receiving a grant award from the State of Illinois because it pays dues or fees on behalf of its employees or agents or subsidizes or otherwise reimburses them for payment of their dues or fees to any club which unlawfully discriminates (775 ILCS 25/1).
25. The applicant certifies it has informed the State Superintendent of Education in writing if any employee of the applicant was formerly employed by the Illinois State Board of Education and has received an early retirement incentive under 40 ILCS 5/14-108.3 or 40 ILCS 5/16-133.3 (Illinois Pension Code). The applicant acknowledges and agrees that if such early retirement incentive was received, the Grant Agreement is not valid unless the official executing the agreement has made the appropriate filing with the Auditor General prior to execution.
26. The applicant shall notify the State Superintendent of Education if the applicant solicits or intends to solicit for employment any of the Illinois State Board of Education's employees during any part of the application process or during the Term of the Grant Agreement.
27. If applicable, the applicant shall be required to observe and comply with provisions of the Prevailing Wage Act, 820 ILCS 130/1 et seq., which applies to the wages of laborers, mechanics, and other workers employed in any public works.
28. The applicant certifies that it is (a) current as to the filing and payment of any applicable federal, state and/or local taxes; and (b) not delinquent in its payment of moneys owed to any federal, state, or local unit of government.
29. The applicant represents and warrants that all of the certifications and assurances set forth herein and attached hereto are and shall remain true and correct through the Term of the grant. During the Term of the grant, the award recipient shall provide the Illinois State Board of Education with notice of any change in circumstances affecting the certifications and assurances within ten (10) calendar days of the change. Failure to maintain all certifications and assurances or provide the required notice will result in the Illinois State Board of Education withholding future project funding until the award recipient provides documentation evidencing that the award recipient has returned to compliance with this provision, as determined by the Illinois State Board of Education.
30. Any applicant not subject to Section 10-21.9 of the School Code certifies that a fingerprint-based criminal history records check through the Illinois State Police and a check of the Statewide Sex Offender Database will be performed for all its a) employees, b) volunteers, and c) all employees of persons or firms holding contracts with the applicant, who have direct contact with children receiving services under the grant; and such applicant shall not a) employ individuals, b) allow individuals to volunteer, or c) enter into a contract with a person or firm who employs individuals, who will have direct contact with children receiving services under the grant who have been convicted of any offense identified in subsection (c) of Section 10-21.9 of the School Code (105 ILCS 5/10-21.9(c)) or have been found to be the perpetrator of sexual or physical abuse of any minor under 18 years of age pursuant to proceedings under Article II of the Juvenile Court Act of 1987 (705 ILCS 405/2-1 et seq.).
31. Any applicant that does not have a calculated indirect cost rate from the Illinois State Board of Education or does not utilize their restricted indirect cost rate as calculated by the Illinois State Board of Education certifies that it has developed a written

Cost Allocation Plan (CAP) that: a) will be utilized in identifying the accumulation and distribution of any allowable administrative costs in the grant program; b) identifies the allocation methods used for distributing the costs among programs; c) requires support through records and documentation showing personnel time and effort information, and formal accounting records according to generally accepted governmental accounting principles; d) requires the propriety of the charges to be substantiated; and e) shall be made available, along with any records or supporting documentation for allowable administrative costs, for review upon Illinois State Board of Education's request.

32. The applicants participating in a joint application hereby certify that they are individually and jointly responsible to the Illinois State Board of Education and to the administrative and fiscal agent under the grant. An applicant that is a party to the joint application, a legal entity, or a Regional Office of Education may serve as the administrative and/or fiscal agent under the grant.
33. The entity acting as the fiscal agent certifies that it is responsible to the applicant or, in the case of a joint application, to each applicant that is a party to the application; it is the agent designated and responsible for reports and for receiving and administering funds; and it will:
- a) Obtain fully executed Certifications and Assurances, and Standard Terms of the Grant forms from each entity or individual participating in the grant and return the forms to the Illinois State Board of Education prior to award of the grant;
 - b) Maintain separate accounts and ledgers for the project;
 - c) Provide a proper accounting of all revenue from the Illinois State Board of Education for the project;
 - d) Properly post all expenditures made on behalf of the project;
 - e) Be responsible for the accountability, documentation and cash management of the project, the approval and payment of all expenses, obligations, and contracts and hiring of personnel on behalf of the project in accordance with the Grant Agreement;
 - f) Disburse all funds to joint applicants based on information (payment schedules) from joint applicants showing anticipated cash needs in each month of operation (The composite payment schedule submitted to the Illinois State Board of Education should reflect monthly cash needs for the fiscal agent and the joint applicants.);
 - g) Require joint applicants to report expenditures to the fiscal agent based on actual expenditures/obligation data and documentation. Reports submitted to the Illinois State Board of Education should reflect actual expenditure/obligations for the fiscal agent and the data obtained from the joint applicants on actual expenditures/obligations that occur within project beginning and ending dates;
 - h) Be accountable for interest income earned on excess cash on hand by all parties to the grant and return applicable interest earned on advances to the Illinois State Board of Education;
 - i) Make financial records available to outside auditors and Illinois State Board of Education personnel, as requested by the Illinois State Board of Education;
 - j) Have a recovery process in place with all joint applicants for collection of any funds to be returned to the Illinois State Board of Education; and
 - k) Be responsible for the payment of any funds that are to be returned to the Illinois State Board of Education.
34. The applicant hereby assures that when purchasing core instructional print materials published after July 19, 2006, the applicant will ensure that all such purchases are made from publishers who comply with the requirements of 105 ILCS 5/28-21 which instructs the publisher to send (at no additional cost) to the National Instructional Materials Access Center (NIMAC) electronic files containing the contents of the print instructional materials using the National Instructional Materials Accessibility Standard (NIMAS), on or before delivery of the print instructional materials. This does not preclude the district from purchasing or obtaining accessible materials directly from the publisher. For further information, see Article 28 (105 ILCS 5/28-21) of the [School Code](#).

Drug-Free Workplace Certification

35. This certification is required by the Drug-Free Workplace Act (30 ILCS 580/1). The Drug-Free Workplace Act, effective January 1, 1992, requires that no grantee or contractor shall receive a grant or be considered for the purposes of being awarded a contract for the procurement of any property or services from the State unless that grantee or contractor has certified to the State that the grantee or contractor will provide a drug-free workplace. False certification or violation of the certification may result in sanctions including, but not limited to, suspension of contract or grant payments, termination of the contract or grant, and debarment of contracting or grant opportunities with the State of Illinois for at least one (1) year but not more than five (5) years.

- (e) Imposing a sanction on, or requiring the satisfactory participation in a drug abuse assistance or rehabilitation program by, any employee who is so convicted, as required by section 5 of the Drug-Free Workplace Act.
- (f) Assisting employees in selecting a course of action in the event drug counseling, treatment, and rehabilitation are required and indicating that a trained referral team is in place.
- (g) Making a good faith effort to continue to maintain a drug-free workplace through implementation of the Drug-Free Workplace Act.

"PROGRAM" means any applicable program under which Federal funds are made available to the applicant.

"PROJECT" means the activities to be performed for which grant funds are being sought by the applicant.

9. The LEA has adopted effective procedures for acquiring and disseminating to teachers and administrators participating in each Program significant information from educational research, demonstrations, and similar projects, and for adopting, where appropriate, promising educational practices developed through such projects; and
10. None of the funds expended under any applicable Program will be used to acquire equipment (including computer software) in any instance in which such acquisition results in a direct financial benefit to any organization representing the interests of the purchasing entity or its employees or an affiliate of such an organization.

Further, the person submitting this application on behalf of the applicant certifies under oath that all information in the grant agreement is true and correct to the best of his or her knowledge, information and belief, that grant funds shall be used only for the purposes described in this agreement, and that the award of this grant is conditioned upon this certification. This grant agreement may not be amended or modified except as by receiving approval for an amendment through the IWAS application process. By hitting Submit on the Submit page, this grant agreement shall be deemed to be executed on behalf of the applicant.
