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
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
I. Expulsion and Multiple Suspension Rates in Illinois




Chart 3. Funding Levels of RSSP, by Number of Students Enrolled in RSSP: FY98-FY12

The majority of students transferred to RSSP were expulsion-eligible students (54.7 percent) and a greater number of these students committed offenses related to possession of drugs/ weapons or fighting while in their home schools. Meanwhile, a greater number of insubordinate students or violating school rules were suspension-eligible students.

Overall, the majority of students transferred to RSSP were in possession of drugs (17.6 percent), involved in fighting (19.5 percent), or violated school rules (17.9 percent).

Substance abuse, such as drugs or alcohol, start early for some students transferred to RSSP. Specifically, about 26 percent and 15 percent of students transferred to RSSP due to alcohol or drug offenses were in grade 8. Moreover, over 41 percent of students transferred to RSSP because of weapon(s) possession were in elementary grades.

RSSP's highest outcome was with high school students earning academic credits (77.3 percent). Incidents related to the primary reason students were administratively transferred to RSSP were also reduced for 76 percent of all students. Other outcomes achieved by RSSP students include 57.7 percent elementary students advancing to the next grade and 53.2 percent grade 12 students graduating from high school.

Reading


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RSSP grade 8 students were the highest performing group on the ISAT-Reading with 61.1 percent of students meeting standards – 17 percentage points greater than grade 7 and 13 percentage points greater than grade 6. On the other hand, grade 6 students were the highest performing group on the ISAT-mathematics with 52.2 percent of students meeting the standards – almost 8 percentage points greater than grade 7 and 4 percentage points greater than grade 8. Grade 7 is the lowest performing group.

Grades 6-8 students enrolled in RSSP in 2012 did better on the Illinois Standards Achievement Test (ISAT) than grades 6-8 students enrolled in RSSP in 2011. While grades 6-8 enrollments given eligibility status are similar between 2011 and 2012, suspension-eligible students slightly edged expulsion-eligible students in 2011. However, in 2012, expulsion-eligible students significantly outperformed suspension-eligible students on the ISAT. While the performance trend of ALL Illinois students tested on the ISAT show higher percentages of students meeting the standards on the ISAT-Mathematics, in RSSP it is the reverse, where more students are meeting the standards in Reading and this has been the case for the last three years.

Data elsewhere still show RSSP students significantly falling behind their non-RSSP peers on the state achievement tests.

APPENDIX B

Description of Offenses

Alcohol (liquor law violations, possession, use, sale)

Disorderly conduct (disruptive behavior)

Drugs, excluding alcohol and tobacco (illegal drug possession, sale, use/under the influence)

Fighting (mutual altercation, battery, and/or physical altercation)

Harassment, nonsexual (physical, verbal, or psychological)

Insubordination (disobedience to school staff or school personnel)

Robbery (taking of things by force) or theft

Threats (including school threats)

Vandalism (damage to school or personal property)

Violation of school rules (disobeying school policy)

Weapons possession (firearms and other weapons)
