Purpose of Agenda Item

• To review the recommended passing scores for 46 new teacher and administrator certification tests; and,

• To establish the passing scores for the new tests.

Expected Outcome(s) of Agenda Item

The State Board will adopt the passing scores for these 46 new certification tests.

Background Information

The State Board of Education has demonstrated its commitment to ensuring high quality educators by adopting rigorous standards that identify the knowledge and skills expected of Illinois public school teachers, school service personnel, and administrators. These standards serve as the foundation of Illinois's new standards-based certification system. New tests assessing candidates against these standards are being phased in over a three-year period, and passing scores must be established for each test upon its implementation.

The State Board of Education is working with its test contractor to develop the tests. Development activities for all tests include the following:

- Review and approval of all test objectives and test items by Illinois public school and college faculty content experts as well as by Illinois bias experts;
- Validation of test objectives by a larger group of public school and college faculty;
- Field-testing of test items with Illinois educator candidates;

Item re-validation and passing-score activities.

To date, only four school service personnel tests remain to be completed. In May 2003, the State Board of Education adopted the passing score for the new Learning Behavior Specialist I test; and, in September 2003, they set the passing scores for the new Assessment of Professional Teaching and 12 other new special education tests.

The focus of this agenda item is the content-area tests that assess candidates on the field-specific standards required of educators seeking teaching and administrative certificates. The first administration of these 46 tests was conducted on July 24, 2004. During the week of August 16th, 46 panels of Illinois educators were convened to make recommendations for the passing scores.

A decision on the recommended passing scores is needed for two reasons:

- To permit candidates who have taken the tests and are awaiting their score reports to receive scores, and
- To establish the passing score for each test that must be achieved by future testing candidates.

Description of the Tests. Each new test assesses candidates on the respective Illinois Content-Area Standards for Educators adopted by the State Board in June 2000. The standards define the knowledge and skills required of an Illinois educator in the particular teaching discipline or administrative position. The breadth and depth of knowledge assessed by each test is expressed in the test framework—the set of objectives upon which the test is based. The test frameworks for all fields may be viewed at www.isbe.net/teachers. The new tests replace the subject-matter tests previously required for individuals seeking those certificates.

With the exception of the foreign language tests, each test consists of 100 scorable multiple-choice items. (See Attachment A for a list of these tests.) To pass one of these tests, the examinee must achieve a total score at or above the passing score. The total score is the number of items answered correctly.

Each non-Asian foreign language test consists of 80 scorable multiple-choice items and two constructed-response assignments—one each for written and oral expression. (See Attachment B for a list of these tests.) Passing these tests requires the examinee to achieve the total test passing score for which, with the exception of the Latin test, the multiple-choice items are weighted two-thirds and each constructed-response is weighted one-sixth. On the Latin test, the multiple-choice section is weighted 90%, the constructed-response oral and transcription sections each 5%.

The Asian foreign language tests each consist of seven constructed-response items. (See Attachment C for a list of these tests.) With the exception of the language acquisition item, which is weighted 7%, the constructed-response items are each weighted 15.5% of the total score to arrive at the total test score required for passing.

Standard-Setting Process. A modified Angoff standard-setting model was used for establishing the recommended raw passing scores. This standard-setting model conforms to accepted industry practice, is endorsed by the agency's certification testing Technical Advisory Committee, and is used by the State Board of Education in establishing passing scores for all certification tests.

Passing Score Review Panels constituted of (1) current public school teachers or administrators who hold appropriate certification; and (2) college faculty involved in the preparation of individuals seeking certification were convened for each of the 46 test fields. Panel members participated in a highly structured, multi-step process that included orientation and training, simulated test-taking, item-based validity verification, and item-based passing score judgments. Panel members independently read and answered each test question and provided their best professional judgment about the percentage of "just acceptable candidates" who would answer each question correctly. There were two rounds of passing score judgments. The panelists' Round II individual ratings of test items resulted in panel-based recommended passing scores.

On September 2nd, the certification testing system's Bias Review Committee met to review the panel-based passing scores and to make recommendations for adjustments suggested by the data. In addition to the panel-based recommended passing scores, the Bias Committee was provided with the panel-based recommended passing scores adjusted by Standard Error of Measurement (SEM) units. The SEM is a statistical tool that may be used to adjust for error in the standard-setting process. These adjusted scores, at plus or minus one or two standard errors of measurement, are shown in Attachments A, B and C. Additionally, for the 13 test fields in which there were 25 or more examinees testing on July 24, preliminary pass rates reports were provided to the committee. (See Attachment D.) For 11 of those fields there were 10 or more examinees from a reporting group (e.g., gender, ethnicity) and preliminary pass rates by reporting group were included for those fields.

The committee also received a description of the performance characteristics and scoring scale, which describes the expectations of constructed-responses receiving scores at the various score points. Total raw scores for each constructed-response item range from 2 to 8.

Upon review of the data, the Bias Review Committee identified three areas of concern: test fields where the panel-based recommended score was less than 60 out of 100; perceived inconsistencies across the foreign language tests recommended constructed-response scores; and, the projected pass rates of non-Caucasians on the early childhood and mathematics tests.

The committee agreed that achieving a score of less than 60 on a 100-item test would not ensure that a candidate possessed the content knowledge necessary to provide students with a quality education. It was also the consensus of the committee that perceived inconsistencies in scoring expectations across the languages might communicate an unintended message about the value of the languages and of the

teaching of the languages. Additionally, members discussed the possible differences in language abilities between native and non-native speakers and attempted to strike a balance regarding expectations, as defined by the performance characteristics and scoring scales. The committee recommendations address these first two concerns.

Although the Bias Committee expressed concern over the preliminary disparate pass rates for the Caucasian and non-Caucasian reporting groups, the committee recognized the limitations of the data and the need to ensure the quality of certified educators. Consequently, the Bias Review Committee did not recommend any changes to the panel-based recommendations for fields with reporting group differences in performance. However, future performance data, by reporting groups, should be produced to determine if the disparate rates persist and warrant further inquiry.

Bias Review Committee Recommendations

The Bias Review Committee recommends to the State Teacher Certification Board and the State Board of Education that the panel-based recommended passing scores be adjusted for measurement error as follows:

For the tests comprising 100 multiple-choice items:

- Adjust the panel-based recommendations by +1 SEM for the following fields: Dance (63); Elementary/Middle Grades (61); Music (60); Science: Chemistry (63); Science: Physics (62); Social Science: Geography (61); Social Science: History (64);
- Adjust the panel-based recommendation by +2 SEM for Social Science: Sociology & Anthropology; (63)
- Set the passing scores for the remaining tests comprising 100 item multiple-choice items at the panel-based recommended raw scores (see Attachment A).

For the foreign language tests comprising 80 multiple-choice items and two constructed-response items:

- Adjust the panel-based recommendations by -1 SEM for: Hebrew—Written (6) and Oral (6); Italian—Oral (6);
- Set the passing scores for the remaining tests comprising 80 multiplechoice and two-constructed response items at the panel-based recommended raw scores.

For the foreign language tests comprising all constructed-response items:

- Adjust the panel-based recommendations by +1 SEM for: Cantonese— Reading Comprehension (5), Language Structures (5) and Written Expression (5); Mandarin—Reading Comprehension (5), Language Structures (5), Written Expression (5);
- Adjust the panel-based recommendation by -1 SEM for Korean—Written
 (6):
- Adjust the panel-based recommendation by -2 SEM for Korean—Oral (6);

 Set the passing scores for the remaining tests comprising constructedresponse items at the panel-based recommended raw scores.

State Teacher Certification Board Recommendations

At its September 10th meeting, the State Teacher Certification Board reviewed and discussed the Bias Review Committee's recommendations and concurred with those. Additionally, the Certification Board discussed the need to review the passing scores for all tests fields after a year administration of the new tests.

Consequently, the State Teacher Certification Board adopted the following motions:

- That the State Teacher Certification Board recommend to the State Board
 of Education for consideration at their September 2004 meeting the
 adoption of the panel-based recommended passing scores for the 46 new
 content-area certification tests as adjusted by the Bias Review Committee.
- 2. That the State Teacher Certification Board ask State Board staff to report in October 2005 on progress with regard to all of the tests' passing scores that are approved today.

Analysis and Policy Implications

As expressed in the *Standards for Educational and Psychological Testing* (American Educational Research Association, American Psychological Association, National Council on Measurement in Education, 1999), the establishment of passing scores "...Embodies value judgments as well as technical and empirical considerations." (p. 54).

The panel-based recommended scores are for the most part, a product of technical and empirical considerations. Panel members rated the validity of all test items and made judgments about the percentage of "just acceptable" candidates that would answer the item correctly. Panel members did not discuss the ratings as a whole. The recommendations of the Bias Review Committee build on those technical and empirical considerations and add appropriate value judgments. In its recommendations, the committee took into consideration factors such as the desire to maintain high standards, the breadth and depth of knowledge covered by the standards that the tests assess, the opportunity candidates have had to become proficient in the standards, the expectations of teachers proficient in the standards, the expectations of teachers in other fields and disciplines, and the effect on the supply of certified educators.

Breadth of Knowledge/Skills. The State Board of Education's commitment to ensuring high quality educators in Illinois public schools is evidenced by its adoption of the Illinois professional teaching and content-area standards. These new standards have raised the bar considerably.

For example, certification requirements in the sciences and social sciences are a dramatic departure from the previous field-specific certification classifications. These teaching candidates are now required to possess a breadth of knowledge across the sciences (biology, chemistry, earth and space science, environmental science, and physics) or the social sciences (economics, geography, history, political science, psychology, and sociology/anthropology) as well as a depth of knowledge in at least one specific discipline.

The foreign language tests are also markedly different from the previously required assessments. In addition to demonstrating knowledge and skill in the language via multiple-choice questions, candidates completing the test must demonstrate the ability to write and speak in the language.

The changing expectations of teacher candidates is also evidenced by the age and grade level of students some teacher candidates must now be prepared to teach. Previously in the fields of visual arts, music, and physical education candidates were given the choice of limiting their preparation to teaching students in grades 6 to 12. With the adoption of the new standards, all candidates in those fields must prepare across the broader range of K to 12 and must demonstrate their knowledge of content necessary to teach students at all levels covered by the certificate.

These are some of the more readily visible changes in the preparation, assessment and certification of new teachers. Higher expectations in other fields are demonstrated by the range or depth of the content that is assessed or the way in which the content is assessed.

It is important to note that the broad-based standards upon which the new tests are based were adopted only four years ago. Since that time our higher education institutions have been redesigning their programs to ensure their teacher and administrative candidates meet the new standards. However, many candidates who will be required to take and pass the examinations were in the pipeline and did not have the benefit of completing a teacher preparation program that had been fully redesigned to address these standards. The recommended passing scores seek to maintain those standards but at the same time not penalize teacher candidates, who at time of program completion, are now faced with significantly differing expectations than when they began their programs.

Additionally, beginning with this academic year, state law requires teacher candidates to pass the content test before being permitted to student teach. Consequently, teacher candidates are taking the tests earlier in their preparation than was previously required. The effect of this new law may be felt most greatly by candidates taking tests such as Elementary/Middle Grades, which contain a fair amount of content-specific pedagogical knowledge that candidates may still be in the process of acquiring at the time they are required to take the test.

Effect on Supply and Demand. In establishing the passing scores, the State Board is confronted with balancing its quest for high standards and producing an appropriate supply of new teachers and administrators to meet the increasing demand. Because potential administrators and teachers must successfully complete the required content tests before they can become certified, the point at which the passing scores are set will affect the supply of teachers and administrators.

The preliminary pass report (Attachment D) provides some guidance regarding the possible impact the passing scores will have on the future supply of teachers. (*Note:* Caution should be used in interpreting these data as the July 24th examinees may not be representative of future test takers and the number of examinees was quite low for most test fields.)

The recently released Educator Supply and Demand Report 2003 also provides data useful in gauging the possible impact the passing scores may have on selected fields. Teaching fields with the greatest reported shortages include Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Librarian/Media and Spanish. The recommended passing scores for these fields, including the Bias Review Committee adjustments, are (61), (62), (63), (60), and (57, 6, 6). None of these scores are so high as to substantially reduce the supply of qualified teachers in the discipline. Further, it is possible that over time, the new certification structure may serve to lessen the reported shortages in sciences. As teacher candidates become more broadly prepared across the sciences, districts may find more science teachers qualified to teach not only general science and biology, but physics and chemistry as well.

Comparison to Other Certification Tests. The recommended scores are reasonable and reflect expectations comparable to other teaching fields for which passing scores have already been adopted. The range of scores for the 100-item multiple-choice tests, as adjusted by the Bias Review Committee, is 60 to 70. Passing scores for previously adopted tests fall within this range. Further, precedent exists for using Standard Error of Measurement units to adjust the panel-based recommended passing score. Most recently, the passing score for the Assessment of Professional Teaching Test—Birth to Grade 3 was set at plus 2 SEMs; and, the passing score for the Speech Language Pathologist: Teaching test was set at plus 1 SEM.

Content Tests within the Larger Context. Finally, it is important to note that each of these tests is only one component of a comprehensive certification process. Teacher candidates must successfully complete the Basic Skills test prior to entry into the teacher education program and must complete the Assessment of Professional Teaching test before receiving a certificate. Administrator candidates must pass the Basic Skills test if they have not already done so for a previous certificate. More importantly, for both teachers and administrators the testing requirements are in addition to the completion of a state-approved preparation program, which includes clinical and field experiences as well as additional assessments by the institution.

<u>Superintendent's Recommendation</u>

The State Board of Education should adopt the panel-based recommendations for the 46 new content-area certification tests as adjusted by the Bias Review Committee and recommended by the State Teacher Certification Board.

The State Board of Education should join the Certification Board in committing to a review of the passing scores after the first year of administration.

Next Steps

- Individual score reports will be prepared and sent to examinees who took these tests on July 24, 2004, and who are awaiting their results.
- Institutional score reports will be prepared and sent to colleges and universities as requested by examinees.
- Information about the required passing score for each test will be made available on the State Board website and through other appropriate means.

Purpose of Agenda Item

The purpose of this agenda item is to seek approval from the State Board to implement the middle grades teaching certificate by 2010.

Expected Outcome(s) of Agenda Item

The State Board will approve the recommendation for a middle grades teaching certificate and direct ISBE staff to develop a plan for implementation, including necessary rules, testing development, software changes, and university program changes and other requirements to develop the new certificate within the indicated timeline.

Background Information

This timeline is based on the June 2004 recommendations of the task force to the State Teacher Certification Board. It follows previous Board reviews of proposals for development of a middle grades certificate where the Board determined to develop an enhanced middle grades endorsement that could be attached to existing elementary and secondary certificates.

The State Teacher Certification Board passed the following motion by unanimous vote at its September 10, 2004 meeting. "The State Teacher Certification Board" recommends to the State Board of Education the recommendation for the middle grades certificate with the accompanying timeline."

<u>Analysis and Implications for Policy, Budget, Legislative Action and</u> Communications

This new certificate will replace the current middle grades endorsement available on elementary and secondary certificates and require middle grades teachers to obtain a new type of certification in the middle grades.

Policy Implications

Development of a new certificate type will require establishment of new rules creating the certificate. Universities will need to restructure their elementary and secondary education programs to ensure the changes are in place to provide the certificate to those students graduating in the summer of 2010.

Additionally procedures will need to be developed to provide for the exchange of previously issued elementary and secondary certificates for persons with the middle grades endorsement and for those persons who have obtained all the requirements but who do not have the endorsement. A decision will need to be made whether to purchase a preexisting test(s) and validate it for this purpose or to develop a new test for Illinois' standards.

Budget Implications

This effort will require staff time to develop rules, tests, and processing procedures, to make program changes in the computer system, and to review program proposals from universities

Legislative Action

The School Code creates the elementary and secondary certificate and defines the grade levels covered by each which now will be subsumed under the middle grades certificate. This will require an amendment to the Code to permit issuing the new certificate.

Communication

Universities, potential applicants for the new certificate, current teachers, districts, and regional superintendent will require extensive and intensive knowledge and training about the new certificate.

Pros and Cons of Various Actions

Creating this new certificate will respond to those persons who feel middle grades students are distinct in their needs and that a middle grades certificate will be the means to ensure their success in school. It will serve to further comply with the No Child Left Behind Act in that subject matter tests for the middle grades will be developed and test each teacher in his/her specialty areas. It may result in improved knowledge of the content areas they teach.

It forces teachers into specialties and reduces their ability to be employed at various levels without significant additional training. It may force smaller institutions to make significant cuts in their training of teachers if they cannot afford to develop programs for three grade levels.

Superintendent's Recommendation

The State Superintendent recommends approving the recommendation for a middle grades teaching certificate and directs ISBE staff to develop a plan for implementation, including necessary rules, testing development, software changes, and university program changes and other requirements to develop the new certificate within the indicated timeline.

Next Steps

The Division Administrator in Certification will develop an implementation plan in collaboration with the Middle Grades Task Force.

Middle Grades Task Force Report Timeline

Through June 30, 2010 - Continue to issue the middle grades endorsement

to teachers based upon the focused set of standards

approved in December 2003.

July 1, 2010 - Begin to issue a new middle grades certificate to teacher

candidates who have completed a teacher education program that is focused on the complete set of middle grade standards submitted in the April 2004 Middle Grades Task

Force Report.

July 1, 2010 - Begin issuing initial certificates based upon a simplified

pattern:

Early Childhood – birth through grade 3 (unchanged)

Elementary – kindergarten through grade 5 Middle Grades – grade 5 through grade 9 Secondary – grade 9 through grade 12

After July 1, 2010 - The middle grades endorsement would no longer be issued.

New graduates would be required to have the new middle grades certificate in order to teach in grades 5-9.

Practicing teachers would be entitled to exchange a current certificate for two certificates from the simplified pattern above in the following instances:

- 1) the teacher has already earned the middle grades endorsement; or
- 2) the teacher submits transcripts that show completion of the middle grades endorsement coursework; or
- 3) the teacher can document 3 or more years of successful teaching at the middle level; or
- 4) the teacher submits passing scores on the middle grades core and subject matter tests (see below).

A core test of pedagogical knowledge (APT middle grades) based upon the middle grade standards will be required for teachers earning the middle grades certificate.

Middle grades subject matter tests based upon appropriately broad and interdisciplinary content standards will be required for teachers earning the middle grades certificate.

Purpose of Agenda Item

 Present the State Teacher Certification Board's recommendation for the approval of the Illinois Institute of Technology's Science program.

Expected Outcome(s) of Agenda Item

Continue the "Approval" of the Illinois Institute of Technology's Science program.

Background Information

In October of 2002, the State Board reviewed the Notice of Objection submitted by IIT regarding the recommendation of the Certification Board to grant IIT's Science program "Provisional Approval." The State Board modified the Certification Board's recommendation but required IIT to submit a revised program report within 18 months, in accordance with Illinois Administrative Rules, Section 25.127 (p) Review of Individual Programs. The revised program was presented to ISBE staff in August, 2004 and on September 10, IIT's revised Science program report, speaking directly to the State Board's weakness statements, was presented to the Certification Board.

Certification Board Review and Action

Acting in the capacity of an audit committee, the Certification Board discussed the revised Science program report as it pertains to the weakness statements for that program.

The Certification Board determined that IIT presented evidence sufficient to support removing four of the six cited weakness statements and to designate the six accreditation standards as "met."

The Certification Board revised the two remaining weakness statements to reflect that the Science program needs to integrate its evaluative measures as part of its unit assessment system plan and to demonstrate more evidence of attention to the needs of exceptional learners.

According to the Illinois Administrative Rules, Section 25.140 (2)(c) Transitional Requirements for the Unit Assessment Systems, the program should be in the third phase of the transition period. At this time, Illinois accredited teacher preparation institutions are required to be in the second year of implementing their unit assessment system plan and should present evidence that performance data from the programs are being collected. The university needs to be using internal performance assessments to identify the competence of all candidates, testing the system for accuracy, consistency, and fairness; and implementing the integrated and systematic management of data on candidates' performance.

Illinois Administrative Rules, Section 25.127 (b)(3)(A) states that a program must meet the applicable content-area standards established by the State Board of Education. The Illinois Professional Teaching Standards call for all competent teachers to understand the areas of exceptionalities as defined in the Individuals with Disabilities Act (IDEA) and the State Board's rules for Special Education (23 III. Adm. Code 226); knows the roles and responsibilities of teachers, parents, students and other professionals related to special education; and uses a variety of instructional and intervention strategies prior to initiating a referral of a student for special education (Illinois Administrative Rules, Section 24.100).

On the basis of its review of the IIT 18 month Science program report, the institution's progress in addressing the original weakness statements, and the fact that despite some remaining weaknesses, all standards can be considered as "met," the STCB recommended that the Illinois Institute of Technology's Science program be granted "Approval".

Superintendent's Recommendation

Continue the "Approval" of the Illinois Institute of Technology's Science program, thereby authorizing the institution to continue offering it.

Next Steps

Staff will notify the University of the decision of the State Board of Education and work with the university regarding the areas of weakness. Future annual reports submitted by IIT will identify actions taken to address those weaknesses. The next accreditation

visit for the University will be on the regular 5-year cycle for institutions that have been granted "Initial Accreditation."

Purpose of Agenda Item

 To review the recommendations issued by the State Teacher Certification Board for the approval of a new preparation program at National-Louis University.

Expected Outcome(s) of Agenda Item

- To issue final decisions allowing the new program to operate, and
- To authorize the State Superintendent to inform the institution of the State Board decision

Background Information

On September 10, 2004, the State Teacher Certification Board reviewed the program proposal presented by National-Louis University for a non-teaching Speech-Language Pathology program.

The Certification Board voted to recommend that the preparation program be granted "approval" until the time of the institution's next scheduled review.

The Illinois Administrative Code Section 25.145 states that the State Board's decision to "approve" a new program authorizes the educational unit to conduct the program and to recommend candidates for certification by entitlement. This is consistent with the policies and procedures for unit accreditation established in alignment with those of the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE).

<u>Certification Board Analysis and Recommendations</u>

National-Louis

National-Louis University, located in Chicago, is an established Illinois approved teacher preparation institution that offers graduate programs in early childhood education; elementary education; ten secondary education areas; special certification areas, including reading specialist, technology specialist, multiple foreign languages, and special education; school service personnel areas, including school counseling, school nursing, and school psychology; as well as two educational administration areas. The proposed Speech-Language Pathology program has been developed to meet the high need for highly qualified speech-language pathologists in Illinois schools.

Candidates seeking the Speech-Language Pathology certificate will be prepared in an advanced-level program that will lead to a Type 73 school service personnel certificate and a Master of Education degree. The advanced-level preparation program will ensure that program completers meet the Speech-Language Pathology Content-Area Standards (IAC Section 28.230) and requirements as defined in IAC Section 25.252.

The State Teacher Certification Board (STCB) determined that the program satisfies the statutory requirements and applicable administrative rules. The STCB recommended that National-Louis University's Speech-Language Pathology program be approved until the institution's next review.

Policy, Budget, and Legislative Implications

The State Board's decision regarding the program approval status of the request does not have state-level policy, budget, or legislative implications. However, the program responds to personnel needs in Illinois schools and the creation of this program is consistent with the State Board goal of providing sufficient and high-quality preparation opportunities in areas of shortage.

Communication

The institution may advertise the new program and actively recruit candidates to enroll in the new program. The Department of Certification and Professional Development will post the new program on its website and in the Directory of Approved Programs.

Pros and Cons of Various Actions

Acceptance of the Certification Board's recommendations for the new program described in this report will allow the institution to offer coursework, enroll candidates, and engage in other pertinent activities necessary for the operation of the new program. The preparation of new speech-language pathologists will positively impact the pool of certified personnel available to serve the children in Illinois public schools.

If the Board rejects the Certification Board recommendation, the final decision will be shared with the institution. The institution would not be authorized to initiate its proposed program.

Superintendent's Recommendation

The State Board should:

 Approve the following program, thereby authorizing the institution to conduct the program and to recommend candidates for certification by entitlement until the time of the institution's next review.

National-Louis University - Speech-Language Pathology

 Authorize the Superintendent to inform the institution of the State Board's decision.

Next Steps

Staff will contact representatives of the institution to explain the State Board's decision and to provide technical assistance requested by the institution. Official correspondence from the State Superintendent will confirm the decision of the State Board and will serve as written documentation of the Board's formal action.

Purpose of Agenda Item

The purpose of this agenda item is to present the emergency amendments to Part 1 for adoption and the identical proposed amendments for initial review.

Expected Outcomes of Agenda Item

The Board will be asked to adopt the emergency amendments and to authorize publication of the identical proposed amendments in the <u>Illinois Register</u> to elicit public comment.

Background Information

This rulemaking consists almost entirely of technical corrections that are needed to ensure continuity in certification policy. When the personnel-related portions of Part 1 were most recently amended (effective June 1, 2004), no changes were intended in the requirements for serving in the middle grades. However, by virtue of the way the various rules work together, the specific lists of required coursework for teachers whose fields are reading or library/media science became inapplicable and were not replaced. We therefore have identified a need to amend Section 1.720 by restating the specific topics that the required 18 hours in the field must address.

Similarly, in the recent amendment process several long-standing requirements for the assignment of teachers in career and technical education programs were inadvertently omitted. These details, which chiefly have to do with the requirement for work experience in the field to be taught, need to be added to new Section 1.737, which

discusses the minimum requirements for various assignments. The wording change in the title and in subsection (a) of Section 1.737 is being made only to ensure that it is clear that the requirements expressed apply to grade 9 regardless of the configuration of grades among schools in a district.

Finally, the chart presented in Appendix A should have included both the old and the new specifications for the provisional vocational and temporary provisional certificates, since the previously issued K-12 certificates do continue to be valid if properly registered.

The only policy change being made via Appendix A is to re-amend the validity of the provisional vocational certificate. The amendments that took effect on June 1 of this year included a change in the validity of both the provisional vocational certificate and the temporary provisional vocational certificate from K-12 to grades 11 and 12 only. The difficulties caused by that change were not noted during the public comment period but have now come to our attention. Educators in the field as well as representatives of the regional superintendents who deal with certification issues have indicated that smaller districts in particular will be unable to offer career and technical education programs if they are required to employ different staff for exploration and orientation (which occur in grades 7 through 10) than for the "skill-level" instruction that is provided in grades 11 and 12. For this reason we believe emergency rulemaking is warranted to alleviate the problem as early as possible in this school year.

We concur that individuals who meet the requirements for the provisional vocational certificate generally have sufficient educational preparation, in addition to their career background, to enable them to introduce students in grades 7 and above to the fields addressed in career and technical education. However, we have determined that the temporary provisional vocational certificate, for which the requirements are less stringent, should continue to be valid only for grades 11 and 12 and limited to skill-level instruction in the specific field of endorsement.

Also reflected in Appendix A is a change in the validity of the initial certificate. P.A. 93-679, signed into law on June 30 of this year, added a stipulation that the initial certificate, which was previously not renewable, would be renewable without limitation until the certificate-holder acquires four years of teaching experience. This change would not require emergency rulemaking in and of itself since the law is explicit, but the change needs to be reflected now that Appendix A is being amended for the other reasons outlined above.

These amendments were discussed with the State Teacher Certification Board at its meeting on September 10, and the Certification Board recommends them for consideration by the State Board of Education.

Next Steps

The adopted emergency amendments will be filed with the Administrative Code Division so that they may take effect immediately. With the Board's authorization, staff will also submit the proposed rules for publication in the <u>Illinois Register</u> to elicit public comment. Additional means such as the Superintendent's message and the agency website will also be used to inform interested parties of the opportunity to comment on this rulemaking.

SUBPART G: STAFF QUALIFICATIONS

Section 1.720 Requirements for Teachers of Middle Grades EMERGENCY

a) The requirements of this Section apply to teachers first employed after September 1, 1973, in departmentalized grades 5 through 8 ("middle-grade teachers"). Teachers first employed in grades 5 through 8 prior to September 1, 1973, or employed in non-departmentalized grades 5 through 8, are subject to the requirements of Section 1.710 of this Part. To qualify as a middle-grade teacher, the teacher must have either completed the coursework identified in subsection (a)(1) of this Section prior to July 1, 1997, or completed the coursework identified in subsection (a)(2) of this Section. In mathematics and reading, and for library information specialists, there is specific coursework that must be included among the 18 semester hours to be earned; see subsections subsection (a)(3), (4), and (5) of this Section.

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- 1) 18 semester hours in the subject matter area of major teaching assignment (e.g., language arts, mathematics, general science, social science, music), unless the subject taught is a foreign language and Section 25.86 of the State Board's rules for Certification (23 Ill. Adm. Code 25) applies. Where a teacher is assigned to deliver instruction in two areas (e.g., English and social science or mathematics and science), the teacher shall meet the requirements of this subsection for one area and have no fewer than 5 semester hours in the other instructional area.
- 18 semester hours in the subject matter area of major teaching assignment (e.g., language arts, mathematics, general science, social science, music), unless the subject taught is a foreign language and Section 25.86 of the State Board's rules for Certification applies. Where a middle-grade teacher is assigned to deliver instruction in two areas (e.g., English and social science or mathematics and science), the teacher shall meet the requirements of this subsection for one area and have no fewer than 9 semester hours in the other instructional area. In addition:
 - A) 3 semester hours of coursework, approved by the college of education or other institutional unit governing teacher education, that includes middle-grade philosophy, middle-grade curriculum and instruction, and instructional methods for designing and teaching developmentally appropriate programs (i.e., addressing the cognitive, emotional and physical development of each child) in the middle grades, including content area (e.g., science, social sciences) reading instruction.
 - B) 3 semester hours of coursework, approved by the college of education or other institutional unit governing teacher education, that includes educational psychology focusing on the developmental characteristics of early adolescents, the nature and needs of early adolescents, and the role of the middle-grade teacher in assessment, coordination and referral of students to health and social services.
- 3) For teachers of mathematics in grades 6 through 8 first employed on or after September 1, 1985, the required 18 semester hours in the field shall include three semester hours in the methods of teaching mathematics in those grades and 15 semester hours to be selected from four of the following areas:

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- A) Math content courses for elementary teachers;
- B) Calculus;
- C) Modern algebra or number theory;
- D) Geometry;
- E) Computer science;
- F) Probability and statistics;
- G) History of mathematics.
- 4) For major assignments in reading in any of departmentalized grades 5 through 8:
 - A) persons first employed on or after September 1, 1978, but before

 July 1, 2004, are required to have completed the 18 semester hours
 described in Section 1.740 of this Part; and
 - B) persons first employed on or after July 1, 2004, shall be required to have completed 18 semester hours in the field that include a practicum and address at least five of the six topics listed at 23 Ill. Adm. Code 25.100(i).
- Persons first employed on or after September 1, 1978, as media professionals or library information specialists serving any of grades 5 through 8 are required to have completed 18 semester hours in the field that address administration, organization (cataloging and classification), reference, and selection of materials. The provisions of subsection (a)(2) of this Section notwithstanding, no individual who has completed only nine semester hours in the field may serve in this capacity.
- b) Beginning July 1, 2004, no individual may be assigned to teach in departmentalized grades 5 through 8 unless he or she holds a certificate that is valid for the grade level or levels to be taught and:
 - 1) holds a middle-grades endorsement applicable to the subject area; or

- 2) meets the relevant requirements of this Section; or
- 3) met the requirements of this Section or their predecessor requirements at a time when they were applicable, as confirmed by the employing district's verification of the individual's qualifications; or

Section 1.737 Minimum Requirements for the Assignment of Teachers <u>in Grades 9</u> through 12 at the Secondary Level Beginning July 1, 2004 EMERGENCY

- a) Beginning July 1, 2004, no teacher may be assigned to teach a particular subject in any of grades 9 through 12 at the secondary level unless he or she holds a certificate that is valid for the grade level or levels to be taught and:
 - 1) holds the applicable endorsement for the subject area (and, in the case of the provisional vocational certificate, has also completed the work experience required pursuant to subsection (b)(1)(A) of this Section); or
 - 2) met the requirements of Section 1.730, 1.735, or 1.736 of this Part, or their predecessor requirements, at a time when they were applicable to that assignment, as confirmed by the employing district's verification of the individual's qualifications; or
 - 3) meets the minimum requirements for that assignment identified in subsection (b) of this Section and has not exhausted the three-year period of eligibility available pursuant to 23 Ill. Adm. Code 25.100(l); or
 - 4) meets the requirements of Section 1.745 of this Part, if applicable; or
 - 5) is assigned pursuant to authorization received under 23 Ill. Adm. Code 25.464 (Short-Term Authorization for Positions Otherwise Unfilled).

- b) Beginning July 1, 2004, the provisions of this Section shall replace those of Sections 1.730, 1.735, and 1.736 of this Part as one basis upon which school districts and other entities subject to this Part may assign individuals to teach specific subjects. The qualifications identified in this subsection (b) are not the same as those for the respective endorsements, nor are they intended to match the requirements for identification as a "highly qualified" teacher in any particular subject area. Each individual who is first assigned to a subject area based upon the qualifications delineated in this subsection (b) shall be subject to the requirement for acquiring an endorsement in the respective field within three years after the date of assignment, in accordance with 23 Ill. Adm. Code 25.100(l). For purposes of the applicability of this requirement, an individual shall be considered "first assigned" to any field in which he or she has not taught in Illinois prior to July 1, 2004.
 - 1) For agricultural education; visual or drama/theatre arts; business, marketing, and computer education; dance; English language arts; health education; health careers; family and consumer sciences; technology education; mathematics; music; physical education; biology; chemistry; earth and space science; environmental science; physics; economics; geography; history; political science; psychology; sociology and anthropology: 24 semester hours in the field.
 - In addition to the semester hours required under subsection (b)(1) A) of this Section, teachers who provide instruction at the "skill level" (grades 11 and 12) in reimbursable career and technical education programs must have 2,000 hours of work experience in the area to be taught or, for more than one area, a total of 2,000 hours with no fewer than 250 hours in each area taught. A district may, however, employ an individual who holds a secondary certificate but has not completed 2,000 hours of work experience in the occupational area to be taught, provided that the individual acquires this experience in paid employment outside the teaching profession within four years after the date of first assignment. The employing entity shall maintain records to substantiate this experience, which may include written statements from former supervisors who can be reached for verification or, in cases where supervisors are no longer available to verify the individual's employment, affidavits by the applicant's instructors describing the work experience.

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- B) In addition to meeting the other requirements of this subsection (b)(1), a teacher serving as a coordinator of either a specific cooperative education program or interrelated cooperative education shall be required to have completed six semester hours of coursework in the organization and administration of cooperative education.
- A teacher serving as a coordinator of cooperative education for special education students shall be required to meet the requirements for assignment as a special education teacher rather than those for assignment as a teacher of career and technical education, except that an individual serving in this capacity shall be required to have completed 2,000 hours of work experience as provided in subsection (b)(1)(A) of this Section and six semester hours of coursework in the organization and administrative of cooperative education.
- 2) For foreign language: 20 semester hours in the language (unless 23 Ill. Adm. Code 25.85 or 25.86 applies).
- 3) For safety and driver education: 16 semester hours in the field.
- 4) For assignments in reading, the requirements of Section 1.745 of this Part shall apply.

Purpose of Agenda Item

The purpose of this agenda item is to present the proposed repealer and related amendments for adoption.

Expected Outcomes of Agenda Item

The Board will be asked to adopt the proposed repealer of Part 227 and the related amendments to Parts 230 and 525.

Background Information

This group of rules responds to P.A. 93-21, which took effect on July 1, 2003. This Act repealed Article 14A of the School Code ("Gifted Children") in its entirety. The repeal of this Article removes the statutory basis for the requirements and reimbursement described in Part 227. Similar changes were made to eliminate references to gifted students from provisions of the School Code that describe the purpose of the summer school program (Section 2-3.61) and identify the services required to be provided on a regional basis (Section 2-3.62). These changes necessitate revisions in Parts 230 and 525, respectively.

These three sets of rules were presented for the Board's initial review in June of this year and were subsequently published in the <u>Illinois Register</u> to elicit public comment. None was received on any of these rules, so no changes have been made in the versions originally presented.

Superintendent's Recommendation

Section 227.10 Definition of Terms

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"Advisory Council" means the Advisory Council on Education of Gifted Children defined in Section 14A-4 of The School Code (Ill. Rev. Stat. 1987, ch. 122, par. 14A-4).

"Educational Assessment" means all those activities which contribute to a more comprehensive and accurate understanding of the child and his or her educational needs. These activities shall include testing, staffing and evaluation of academic history.

"Educational Service Center (ESC)" means a state funded agency established within a specific geographic region to provide services to local education agencies (LEA's) in meeting the educational needs of gifted and talented children as provided in 23 Ill. Adm. Code 500.50 (b)(1) (Educational Service Centers).

"Gifted and Talented Children" means those children who consistently excel or show the potential to be consistently superior in one or more of the following areas of human endeavor:

General Intellectual Ability. The child possesses general intellectual ability, high level thought processes (e.g., the ability to make valid generalizations about events, people and things), or divergent thinking (e.g., the ability to identify and consider multiple, valid solutions to a given problem) which is consistently superior to that of other children to the extent that he or she needs and can profit from specially planned educational services beyond those normally provided by the standard school program.

Specific Aptitude/Talent. The child possesses a specific aptitude/talent in a specific academic area, creativity or the arts which is consistently superior to the aptitudes of other children to the extent that he or she needs and can profit from specially planned educational services beyond those normally provided by the standard school program.

"Gifted Education Program" means those instructional programs, supportive services, unique materials, learning settings, and other state and local educational services as described in Article 14A of The School Code and herein, which modify, supplement, and support the standard education program of the public schools, and shall include the following components:

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Identification of the gifted and talented child.

Assessment of the nature of the child's cognitive and affective educational needs for the purpose of developing a suitable program.

Instruction which is based upon an assessment of the student's educational needs.

Continued evaluation and refinement of the program.

"Instructional Services" means those instructional activities which are provided for gifted and talented children in a standard classroom or other educational setting relevant to the gifted student's needs.

"Local Education Agency (LEA)" means a public school board of education, an educational service region or a combination of these, or other public authority legally constituted within the state that is recognized by the state to be an administrative agency for public elementary or secondary schools.

"Reimbursement Coordinator" means the person who is directly responsible for the administration and operation of the program for gifted and talented children within an LEA.

"Reimbursement Program" means an educational program designed to meet the educational needs of gifted and talented children that receives reimbursement for services and materials as described in Section 14A-5 of The School Code.

"Staffing" means a meeting of personnel such as classroom teachers, school administrators, psychologists, guidance counselors, academic discipline specialists, parents, and students for the purposes of:

Determining the eligibility of students for specially planned education services.

Determining the appropriate provision of these services.

Reviewing the educational progress of the gifted and talented students.

"Standard School Program" means the educational program generally offered by the local school district to the majority of its students.

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Section 227.12 Comprehensive Plan for Gifted and Talented Education

- a) Pursuant to the provisions of Section 14A-3.1 of The School Code (Ill. Rev. Stat. 1987, ch. 122, par. 14A-3.1), each school district shall develop a plan which either provides or makes available for all gifted and talented pupils gifted education program(s) (as defined in Section 227.10 of this Part) which encompass all grade levels and fundamental areas of learning as set forth in 23 Ill. Adm. Code 210. Appendix A (Learning Assessment and School Improvement Plans).
- b) Each comprehensive plan for gifted and talented education (hereinafter called a Plan) shall at least contain the information required in Section 227.14 of this Part and shall be submitted to the State Board of Education by December 31, 1989 for review and approval in accordance with Section 227.16 of this Part.

Section 227.14 Contents of the Plan

- a) Each Plan must include a description of:
 - a system for the identification and assessment of gifted and talented children that meets the requirements of Section 227.40 of this Part;
 - 2) a gifted education program that:
 - A) meets the requirements of Sections 227.10 and 227.12(a) of this Part; and
 - B) reflects in scope the district's estimate of the number of gifted and talented students it expects to serve by grade level and fundamental area of learning;
 - 3) educational personnel needed to provide instructional and other services pursuant to subsections (a)(1) and (a)(2);
 - 4) that portion of the district's ongoing staff development plan (developed pursuant to 23 Ill. Adm. Code 30) designed for the educational personnel referred to in subsection (a)(3); and
 - 5) evaluation procedures that meet the requirements of Sections 227.30(b) and 227.60 of this Part.

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b) Each Plan shall also include a budget, completed on forms provided by the State Board of Education, which shall be an estimate of the school district's costs for operating the program components described in its Plan. For the purpose of establishing accurate estimates of these costs, school districts shall not be constrained by the reimbursement limitations set forth in Section 14A-5 of The School Code (Ill. Rev. Stat. 1987, ch. 122, par. 14A-5).

Section 227.16 Gifted and Talented Education Plan Approval and Amendment Process

- a) The State Board of Education will approve the Plan if the Plan conforms to the requirements listed in Section 227.14.
- b) Upon completion of review of the Plan, the State Superintendent of Education shall send a letter to the submitting LEA, indicating that:
 - 1) its Plan has been approved pursuant to the provisions of subsection (a) of this Section; or
 - 2) its Plan can be approved upon submission of specified revisions and/or additional information within 45 days.
- c) Upon completion of review of information submitted by a school district pursuant to the provisions of subsection (b)(2) of this Section, the school district will be notified in writing that its Plan has been approved or that the Plan remains unapprovable for reasons which shall be specified.
- d) A school district must have an approved Plan on file with the State Board of Education in order to be eligible for reimbursement of the costs of implementing its Plan. Annual reimbursement for programs based upon approved Plans shall be provided in accordance with the provisions of Section 227.18 of this Part.
- e) Each school district shall review its Gifted and Talented Education Plan annually and may amend it to ensure that services meet the changing needs of students.
 - 1) Amendments to Plans shall be submitted to the State Board of Education for approval prior to their implementation.
 - 2) The State Board shall notify the district of the approval status of its amended Plan as set forth in Section 227.16(b).

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3) Amendments will be approved if the resulting Plan continues to meet the criteria set forth in Section 227.14.

Section 227.18 Implementation of Plans

- a) Implementation of the plans or components thereof (i.e., as specified in Section 227.14(a) in relation to grade levels and fundamental learning areas) as determined by the State Board of Education shall begin during the 1991-92 school year, provided that the Governor and the General Assembly have accepted the formula and funding level to be submitted to them by the State Board of Education by January 31, 1991 (Section 14A-3.1 of The School Code).
- b) Subject to the condition set forth in subsection (a) of this Section, the State Board of Education shall determine the extent to which the approved Plans or components thereof shall be implemented, on the basis of:
 - 1) the sum of the estimated costs for the Plans and for their components;
 - 2) the extent of additional personnel and other resources needed to implement the Plans or their components; and
 - 3) the intent of the State Board of Education to achieve full implementation of the Plans at the earliest possible date.
- c) The State Board of Education shall send a written notice to all districts indicating the Board's implementation decision pursuant to this Section within thirty (30) days of adopting said decision.

Section 227.20 The Establishment and Administration of Gifted Education Programs

- a) Proposed programs for gifted and talented children shall be submitted to the Advisory Council and State Board staff on forms provided by the State Board of Education for evaluation and recommendation to the State Superintendent of Education.
- b) Proposed programs shall be recommended for approval to the State Superintendent of Education if they contain evidence of providing or increasing services of the public school in the field of gifted education and evidence of compliance with the requirements set forth in this Part.

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- c) Approval and subsequent reimbursement of proposed programs in accordance with Section 14A-5 of The School Code shall be determined by the State Superintendent of Education and shall be based upon the recommendations resulting from review of the proposed programs and the standards for such review as set forth above, and upon the information provided by the applicant in the "Budget Breakdown" portion of the application form issued by the State Board of Education. This section of the form requires the provision of information concerning the district's enrollment, equalized assessed valuation, personnel salaries and other expenses necessary to determine the level of reimbursement for which the district is eligible.
- d) An LEA may request gifted education reimbursement funds to establish and operate a gifted education program to meet the educational needs of children who consistently excel or have the potential to consistently excel in one or more of the areas of human endeavor defined in Section 227.10.
- e) The establishment of reimbursable gifted education programs shall proceed from planning to program development and implementation at all grade levels.
- f) The gifted education program reimbursement coordinator shall be responsible for the development and operation of the local gifted education program as an integrated part of the standard school program in cooperation with appropriate state education agency personnel, educational service center personnel, parents of gifted students, and gifted students themselves.

Section 227.30 Gifted Education Instructional Programs

- a) Those LEA's receiving gifted reimbursement funds shall design gifted education programs in direct response to the educational needs of children identified as gifted and talented in one of the areas of human endeavor defined in Section 227.10.
- b) Educational objectives, experiences, and evaluation techniques shall be developed by the LEA for each type of instructional program designed to meet the educational needs of gifted and talented children. These objectives, experiences, and evaluation techniques shall stress sequential education and be subject to continuing review, evaluation, and revision through consultation with individuals involved in the program, e.g., LEA personnel, ESC personnel, students and parents.

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c) Programs and services designed to meet the educational needs of gifted and talented children shall be an integrated part of the standard school program. These programs and services may also provide learning experiences that occur in settings and at times other than those of the regular school program, including optional summer school.

Section 227.40 Identification and Assessment of Gifted and Talented Children

- a) Subject to subsection (c) below, in order to qualify for program approval, an LEA shall indicate in its proposal that gifted and talented children have been identified, through a process consistent with subsection (b), for participation in the program to be reimbursed.
- b) The process for identifying children as gifted and talented shall be determined by the LEA. However, the identification process shall meet the following standards.
 - 1) It must be applied to all students in the LEA population.
 - 2) It must establish, make public, and apply criteria for selecting a child from the LEA's student population for differentiated instructional programs or services.
 - 3) It must uniformly apply any criteria for selection to every child in the LEA population for whom they are applicable (e.g., according to grade level, academic area, or area of talent).
 - 4) It must describe specific means used for student identification and make use of both objective measures and professional judgment such as those enumerated in subsections (A) and (B), respectively:
 - A) Objective measures

Specific subject matter tests
Achievement test sub-scores
Creativity tests
Pictorial, nonverbal, or abstract reasoning tests
Individual intelligence tests
Group verbal intelligence or mental ability tests;

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B) Professional judgment

Teacher or specialist, e.g., counselor, psychologist, or other professional evaluation
Past school performance
Evidence of accomplishment or ability, e.g., portfolio, audition, or other performance.

- c) All gifted and talented children who have been identified shall be given an educational assessment as defined in Section 227.10.
- d) The identification and assessment of a gifted child must be done prior to the development of an instructional program or service for that child.

Section 227.50 Educational Personnel for Gifted Programs

- a) All professional personnel for whom reimbursement funds in excess of \$300 are claimed must hold a registered teaching, supervisory, or administrative certificate as applicable to their roles, and must meet at least two of the three following requirements:
 - 1) They must have completed at least three semester or four quarter hours of college credit in the education of gifted and talented children.
 - 2) They must have completed a training institute for teachers of gifted and talented children approved by the State Board of Education prior to June 30, 1986, or provided by an ESC pursuant to 23 Ill. Adm. Code 500.50(b)(1) (Educational Service Centers) after June 30, 1986.
 - 3) They must have had at least two years of experience in working with programs for gifted and talented children.
- b) The LEA superintendent shall serve as or designate a reimbursement coordinator who shall have the following responsibilities:
 - 1) To complete and file the application and proposal for approval.
 - 2) To implement and/or supervise the activities proposed within the LEA gifted program proposal.

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- 3) To develop and operate the local gifted education program as an integrated part of the standard school program.
- 4) To provide inservice training for the teachers of identified gifted and talented children.
- 5) To select and implement identification and assessment instruments and processes.
- 6) To determine the need and provide for the implementation of staffings related to gifted and talented children.
- 7) To develop and implement a self-evaluation process for the LEA gifted program.
- 8) To complete and file the claim for reimbursement form.
- 9) To submit:
 - A) program applications within 45 days of receipt;
 - B) program evaluation reports within 45 days of receipt;
 - C) claims for reimbursement as provided in Section 14A-5(b) of The School Code (Ill. Rev. Stat. 1985, ch. 122, par. 14A-5(b)).
 - D) Except in the case of claims for reimbursement, these submission dates shall be waived when circumstances beyond the control of local districts or the State Board of Education make this action necessary. School districts shall receive written notification including the reason(s) for the waiver and the new date established for submission of the required materials.
- 10) To coordinate the LEA's gifted program with those of its regional ESC and the State Board of Education.
- To meet all program goals and objectives as set forth and agreed upon by the LEA and the State Board of Education.

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c) All professionals within an LEA designated as teachers of identified gifted children or as administrators of the local gifted program shall be eligible to participate in and receive all services pertinent to the education of gifted and talented children offered by the State Board of Education and the Educational Service Centers.

Section 227.60 Evaluation of Gifted Programs

- a) The extent to which the LEA receiving reimbursement funds for gifted programs is fulfilling its responsibilities to gifted and talented children as defined and set forth in this Part shall be determined annually by the State Board of Education in accordance with the criteria set forth in subsection (d) of this Section.
- b) All gifted program financial records must be maintained for a period of three years subsequent to the conclusion of the program.
- c) An LEA receiving reimbursement funds for operating a gifted program shall develop its own gifted program evaluation. The LEA reimbursement coordinator shall conduct the evaluation at least annually in a manner consistent with the provisions of Section 227.30 (b). Evaluation procedures should indicate the process, instruments and techniques used to measure the progress toward the objective and the anticipated degree of change.
- d) The evaluation report resulting from (c) above must contain evidence of LEA compliance with Section 227.50(b)(11) in order to be eligible for continued state reimbursement in each year following approval of the initial program application.

Evidence that an applicant has adequately related students' needs to proposed services may include, but not be limited to, plans to provide students who demonstrate deficiency in a particular academic subject area with intensive instructional support in that area, or plans to offer students exhibiting superior proficiency in a subject area advanced instruction in that area or introduction to an area requiring those skills.
- d) An application must be submitted on or before the date specified in Section 2-3.61 of the The School Code.
- e) Information provided in the application, as required in <u>subsection (a) of this</u> Section 230.30(a), will be reviewed by State Board of Education staff to determine that the information demonstrates compliance with Section 2-3.61 of the The School Code and this Part.

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- f) State Board staff will send a written notice to applicants specifying any requested information that is missing from their application. Such applicants must supply the requested information within 15 fifteen (15) calendar days after of their receipt of the said notice.
- g) The State Superintendent of Education will approve applications that demonstrate compliance with Section 2-3.61 of the The School Code and this Part, except that the State Superintendent shall have discretion to invoke the provisions of subsection (f) of this Section with respect to any such application submitted for final approval.

Section 525.110 Programs and Services to be Provided

The following school improvement services shall be provided by each Regional Office of Education and the Chicago Intermediate Service Center as defined in Section 525.10 of this Part. These services shall comprise a core common to all Regional Offices and the Chicago Intermediate Service Center, but shall not limit the range of programs and services that may be offered by one or more of these entities. The 10 Regional Offices of Education with the smallest populations shall provide services under cooperative agreements with one or more of the 35 Regional Offices of Education with the largest populations in accordance with subsection (b) of this Section.

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- a) Each Regional Superintendent of Schools shall ensure the provision to all school districts of the following programs and services listed in this subsection (a). Such services may be provided either directly by each Regional Office of Education or in cooperation with one or more Regional Offices of Education. Such services may include, but need not be limited to, the provision of administrator and teacher training programs, data collection, on-site consultation, evaluation services, implementation of the improvement practices selected by school district staff, and other services identified by school personnel as critical to the completion of their school improvement efforts.
 - Each Regional Office of Education shall provide for Education of Gifted Children as specified in Section 2-3.62(1) of the School Code. Gifted education services are those necessary to support school administrators and teachers in the planning, implementation, and evaluation of the district comprehensive gifted education plans as they relate to school improvement plans. Regional Offices shall assist the State Board of Education with collection and dissemination of information relative to the implementation of district comprehensive plans, professional development programs, and the completion of special studies as deemed necessary by the State Superintendent of Education.
 - Each Regional Office of Education shall provide for Computer Technology Education as specified in Section 2-3.62(2) of the School Code. This shall include planning, implementation, and evaluation services necessary for the establishment of programs designed to achieve computer literacy and high-technology competency. These technology services must include, but need not be limited to, inservice training and staff development; use, application, and evaluation of software; technical assistance; and curriculum development.
- 2) Each Regional Office of Education shall provide for Staff Development Services in Fundamental Learning Areas, to include at least mathematics, science, and reading resources, as specified in Section 2-3.62(3) of the School Code. These services shall include planning, implementation, and evaluation services as they relate to the continuing education, inservice training, and staff development needs of teachers and administrators in the areas of mathematics, biological and physical sciences, language arts, fine arts, social sciences, and physical development and health. Activities shall include, but need not be limited to, assisting in needs assessment activities, providing workshops and inservice training sessions, providing

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technical assistance, convening study or assessment groups, and acting as a clearinghouse for research materials in the fundamental learning areas.

- 3) 4) Each Regional Office of Education shall ensure access for all administrators to continuing professional development offered through the Illinois Administrators' Academy (Section 2-3.53 of the School Code [105 ILCS 5/2-3.53]) and at least provide the following services: assessing regional needs, acting as a clearinghouse for educational materials and research, and keeping accurate records of attendance at inservice training sessions provided through the Illinois Administrators' Academy.
- 4) 5) Each Regional Office of Education shall establish and maintain a directory of cooperating consultants used by the Regional Office to provide services to school districts and to make information regarding such consultants available to schools.
- b) The 10 Regional Offices of Education with the smallest populations shall enter into cooperative agreements with one or more of the larger regions to provide those services outlined in subsections (a)(1) through (4) (5) of this Section, provided that:
 - 1) approval for the agreement is obtained from each Regional Superintendent of Schools involved in the cooperative;
 - 2) services and programs to be delivered are included in the regional improvement plan pursuant to Section 525.120 of this Part; and
 - if one or more of the 10 Regional Offices of Education cannot enter into a cooperative agreement with one or more of the larger regions, then the State Board of Education shall work with regions so that they enter into a cooperative agreement or, if necessary, assign regions to participate in a cooperative agreement.

Background Information

This rulemaking responds to P.A. 93-55, which took effect on July 1, 2003, and amended Section 27-24.6 of the School Code with regard to who must sign a school district's claim for reimbursement for the driver education program. The previous language of the law required the president or acting president of the school board to sign the claim in addition to the chief school administrator. With the change, either the chief school administrator or "authorized driver education personnel employed by the school board" can prepare and certify the district's claim.

The proposed amendment to Part 252 reflects the revision to the statute and makes no other substantive change. It was presented for the Board's initial review in June of this year and was subsequently published in the <u>Illinois Register</u> to elicit public comment. None was received, and the version presented for adoption is identical to the version reviewed in June.

Section 252.30 The Terms of Reimbursement for Public School Participation in the Program

- a) Claims for Reimbursement -- These shall be made under oath or affirmation of the president or acting president of the school board and the chief school administrator for the district employed by the school board or authorized driver education personnel employed by the school board [105 ILCS 5/27-24.6].
 - Reimbursement shall be determined in accordance with the provisions of Sections 27-24.4 and 27-24.5 of the School Code [105 ILCS 5/27-24.4 and 27-24.5]. If the local school board establishes a policy permitting students to take a proficiency examination after at least 3 clock hours of practice driving (see Section 252.20(c)(13) of this Part), and the student(s)

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successfully complete the examinations, the claim for reimbursement will include this fact. However, reimbursement for students who fail the proficiency examination may be claimed only upon their completion of 6 clock hours of practice driving.

- The <u>State</u> state shall not reimburse any district for any student enrolled in the driver education course who has repeated any part of the course more than once, who did not meet the age requirements of the Act or was otherwise ineligible during the period in which he or she was enrolled in the course, or who did not hold a valid instruction permit during the laboratory instruction, or any district which did not adequately publicize and provide the course in a reasonable time after requested.
- 3) If the sum appropriated from the driver education fund is insufficient to pay all claims submitted each year, the amount payable to each district shall be proportionately reduced.
- 4) The school district that which is the residence of an eligible pupil who attends a nonpublic school in another district that has furnished the driver education course shall reimburse the district offering the course the difference between the actual per capita cost of giving the course the previous school year and the amount reimbursed by the State state.
- The district may charge a reasonable fee -- not to exceed the amount specified in Section 27-23 of the School Code -- to students who participate in a driver education course approved in accordance with this Part. This fee shall supersede any other fee(s) or portion thereof charged to students and attributable to the driver education course. As used in this Part, "reasonable fee" means a fee calculated by dividing the sum of documented annual district costs for items such as instructional materials (if not included in the district's textbook rental fee), the cost of driver education cars, car maintenance costs, fuel, and insurance by the number of students participating in the driver education course. For purposes of this calculation, the cost of driver education cars that are purchased by the district shall be amortized over a five-year period, and the cost of leasing cars shall be included in the fee calculation in the year such costs are incurred.
- 6) No fee shall include any portion of the costs for school district personnel salaries and benefits.

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- 7) The driver education fee shall be waived with respect to any student who applies pursuant to this subsection and who is eligible for free lunches or breakfasts pursuant to the School Free Lunch Program Act [105 ILCS 125/1 et seq.], and with respect to other students in accordance with the district's policy adopted in accordance with Section 1.245 ("Waiver of School Fees") of the rules of the State Board of Education (see 23 Ill. Adm. Code 1, Public Schools Evaluation, Recognition and Supervision).
- b) Tuition Student -- The district of residence will pay the entire per capita cost of such instruction to the other school and make claim for State reimbursement for such student.
- c) Transfer Student For any transfer student as defined in Section 252.20(b)(3) of this Part, reimbursement shall be claimed only by the school district to which the student has transferred.
- d) Cooperative School Programs -- In fulfilling the reimbursable requirements, a school district must provide an approved driver education course or participate in a special education cooperative or be part of an approved joint school agreement with another public school district.
- e) Records -- Daily attendance records shall be kept by the teachers in the manner prescribed in Section 27-24.6 of the School Code and are to be used to certify claims made under the Act.
 - 1) Records must be maintained by the school to which substantiate daily lessons, time behind the wheel, observation time, other laboratory experiences and periodic as well as final evaluation of each student. Also recorded shall be the beginning and ending dates of classroom and laboratory instruction. Students are to be identified by their instructional permit number, name, address and other personal information.
 - 2) Such records are to be on file in the office of the driver education supervisor, principal, or other manager at the time reimbursement and/or certification is requested.
 - 3) Driver education participation records are to be kept and be readily available for a period of not less than three years.
 - 4) All records are subject to yearly audit by <u>State</u> state auditors.

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- f) Public School District Participation Agreement -- Prior approval affirms continuous approval as long as the school continues to maintain standards established in the Driver Education Act and this Part.
- g) Driver Education Cost Accounting -- Records of all expenses incurred in the operation of a reimbursable driver education program must be maintained by school officials. Actual school expenditures for administration, supervision, instruction, instructional supplies, inservice training for teachers, operation of equipment, buildings, and other special construction (provided a schedule is on file) may be used to determine the actual per capita cost.

The purpose this agenda item is to present the proposed rules for adoption.

Expected Outcomes of Agenda Item

The Board will be asked to adopt proposed new Part 1300.

Background Information

The federal regulations implementing Title II of the ADA require that each public entity employing 50 or more persons designate at least one employee who will be responsible for assisting the entity in complying with its obligations related to nondiscrimination on the basis of disability. Further, each such entity is required to adopt and publish grievance procedures for the resolution of complaints alleging actions that would be prohibited by the federal regulations. These procedures meet the definition of "rule" set forth in the Illinois Administrative Procedure Act ("each agency statement of general applicability that implements, applies, interprets, or prescribes law or policy") and thus are required to be filed as such.

The proposed new rules were prepared based on an accepted model used by other Illinois agencies for this purpose. They generally also reflect existing agency practice, although there have been no specific ADA-related complaints or inquiries to date.

These rules were presented for the Board's initial review in June of this year and were subsequently published in the <u>Illinois Register</u> to elicit public comment. One letter was received, and the issues raised are summarized in the attachment.

Superintendent's Recommendation

Further, the Board authorizes the State Superintendent of Education to make such technical or nonsubstantive changes as the State Superintendent may deem necessary in response to suggestions or objections of the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules.

Next Steps

Notice of the adopted rules will be submitted to the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules to initiate JCAR's review. When that process is complete, the adopted rules will be filed with the Secretary of State and disseminated as appropriate.

Summary and Analysis of Public Comment

Americans with Disabilities Act Grievance Procedure (4 III. Adm. Code 1300)

Comment

It was suggested that Section 1300.30(c) of the proposed rules should entail a more proactive form of outreach on the part of ISBE staff in terms of making individuals who have complaints aware that a grievance procedure is available and how to use it. It was recommended that the rules provide specific mechanisms for publicizing the existence of the procedure.

Analysis

It is certainly the intent of ISBE's responsible staff to ensure that information about the availability of this procedure is readily available. However, it is not necessary for the rules to set forth all the mechanisms by which this will be accomplished. In this connection it should be noted that these proposed rules were closely modeled on rules of numerous other agencies and that such mechanisms were similarly omitted from those other rules.

There is a difference between the agency's broad responsibility to make this information available and each staff member's specific responsibility to provide the information to particular individuals who apparently need it. That is, individual ISBE staff members can only be required to provide this information once they become aware someone needs it. In our view, the commenter's suggested wording that would have the rules "require ISBE staff to inform any individual who has a complaint that the grievance procedure is available and how to use it" is substantially similar to the proposed language of Section 1300.30(c). However, there may be a slight difference between having a complaint and having a "desire to file a formal grievance", and clearly an individual in either situation should be made aware of the procedure. We believe a minor wording change can encompass this portion of the meaning sought by the commenter.

Recommendation

Section 1300.30(c) should be revised as shown below:

c) Upon becoming aware that an individual has a complaint or wishes being informed of an individual's desire to file a formal grievance, staff of the State Board of Education shall instruct the individual how to receive information about the procedure established under this Part and a copy of the grievance form.

Comment

The commenter noted that the definition of "grievance" requires that each one be committed to writing. She suggested that options (such as tape recording) should be

available for individuals whose disabilities make writing impossible, or that assistance in completing the form should be available.

Analysis

We agree that accommodations may be necessary for individuals who cannot readily complete a written form. Section 1300.40 (Designated Coordinator's Level) discusses the procedure for initiating a grievance and already indicates that the designated coordinator is responsible for providing assistance in completing the form. The language of this provision can be amplified to encompass other types of assistance that might be necessary. This will then be comparable to the provision in the rules for special education due process (Section 226.610(b)) that requires directors to assist parents in taking "whatever action is necessary to use the hearing process".

Recommendation

Section 1300.40(b) should be reworded as shown below:

b) The designated coordinator shall provide <u>such assistance</u> as may be necessary to help individuals avail themselves of the grievance process, including assisting assistance in completing the grievance form if requested to do so. Incomplete grievance forms shall not be considered.

Further, the definition of "grievance" in Section 1300.20 should be slightly amplified to clarify that an individual is not required to complete the form personally:

A "grievance" is any complaint under the ADA that is reduced to writing by <u>or on behalf of</u> an individual with a disability who meets the essential eligibility requirements…."

Comment

The commenter advocated extending the timeframe for an individual's response to an unsatisfactory resolution from five business days to at least 15 days.

Analysis

The proposed five-day timeframe mirrors that afforded to affected individuals under the rules of several other large agencies. However, we foresee only a very limited need for individuals to use the process established in Part 1300, so there should be no detriment to the agency in making this timeline more liberal as the commenter suggested.

Recommendation

Section 1300.50(a) should be revised as shown:

a) If a grievance is not resolved to the complainant's satisfaction by the actions taken at the designated coordinator's level under Section 1300.40 of this Part, the complainant may submit a copy of the grievance form and the designated coordinator's response to the State Superintendent of Education for review. These documents shall be submitted within 15 five

business days after the complainant's receipt of the designated coordinator's response and shall be accompanied by a brief written explanation of the complainant's dissatisfaction.

Section 1300.10 Purpose

- a) This Part establishes a procedure for use in resolving grievances asserted by qualified individuals with disabilities, pursuant to the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA) (42 USC 12101 et seq.) and its implementing regulations at 28 CFR 35.107. Any individual who desires to review the ADA or its implementing regulations in order to understand the rights, privileges, and remedies afforded by the Act may contact the designated coordinator.
- b) In general, the ADA requires that each program, service, and activity offered by the State Board of Education, when viewed in its entirety, be readily accessible to and usable by qualified individuals with disabilities.
- c) It is the intention of the State Board of Education to foster open communication with all individuals who request readily accessible programs, services, and activities. The State Board encourages the supervisors of the Board's programs, services, and activities to respond to requests for modifications before grievances arise.

STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION NOTICE OF ADOPTED RULES

Section 1300.20 Definitions

A "complainant" is an individual with a disability who files a grievance form provided by the State Board of Education under this Part.

The "designated coordinator" is the person or persons appointed by the State Superintendent of Education to be responsible for coordinating the State Board's efforts to comply with and carry out its responsibilities under Title II of the ADA, including the investigation of grievances filed by complainants. The designated coordinator for the State Board of Education can be contacted at 100 North First Street, Springfield, Illinois 62777.

A "grievance" is any complaint under the ADA that is reduced to writing by or on behalf of an individual with a disability who meets the essential eligibility requirements for participation in or receipt of the benefits of a program, activity, or service offered by the State Board of Education and who believes that he or she has been excluded from participation in, or denied the benefits of, any program, service, or activity of the State Board or that he or she has been subject to discrimination by the State Board.

A "grievance form" is the form prescribed for use in filing a grievance pursuant to this Part. It includes information such as the complainant's name, address, and telephone number; the nature of the grievance, including the date, time, and place of the incident; and any witnesses.

Section 1300.30 Applicability of Procedure

- a) To be eligible for consideration, each grievance shall be submitted in accordance with the procedure established in Sections 1300.40 and 1300.50 of this Part.
- b) A complainant's failure to submit a grievance or to appeal it to the next level for consideration within the applicable time limit shall be deemed a withdrawal of the grievance or the complainant's acceptance of the response most recently given by the State Board of Education under the grievance procedure.
- c) Upon becoming aware that an individual has a complaint or wishes to file a formal grievance, staff of the State Board of Education shall instruct the individual how to receive information about the procedure established under this Part and a copy of the grievance form.

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Section 1300.40 Designated Coordinator's Level

- a) Each individual who wishes to submit a grievance shall complete a grievance form and submit it to the designated coordinator for the State Board of Education no later than 180 days after the occurrence of the alleged instance of discrimination.
- b) The designated coordinator shall provide such assistance as may be necessary to help individuals avail themselves of the grievance process, including assisting in completing the grievance form if requested to do so. Incomplete grievance forms shall not be considered.
- c) The designated coordinator or a representative shall investigate the grievance and shall make reasonable efforts to resolve it if it is found to be valid. The designated coordinator shall provide a written response to the complainant and to the State Superintendent of Education within 15 days after receipt of a completed grievance form.

Section 1300.50 Final Level

- a) If a grievance is not resolved to the complainant's satisfaction by the actions taken at the designated coordinator's level under Section 1300.40 of this Part, the complainant may submit a copy of the grievance form and the designated coordinator's response to the State Superintendent of Education for review. These documents shall be submitted within 15 days after the complainant's receipt of the designated coordinator's response and shall be accompanied by a brief written explanation of the complainant's dissatisfaction.
- b) Within 15 days after receipt of a request for review, the State Superintendent shall appoint a three-member panel to review the grievance at the final level. One of the appointed members shall serve as chairperson of the panel. The panel shall schedule a review of the grievance to begin no later than 15 days after the last member of the panel is appointed.
- c) The complainant shall be afforded an opportunity to appear before the panel and shall have the right to appoint a representative to appear on his or her behalf. The panel shall review the designated coordinator's written response and may conduct interviews and seek advice as it deems appropriate.

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- d) Upon agreement of at least two of the panel members, but no later than 15 days after completion of the panel's review, the panel shall make recommendations in writing to the State Superintendent as to the proper resolution of the grievance. All recommendations shall include the panel's rationale and shall bear the signatures of the concurring panel members. A dissenting member of the panel may make a separate recommendation to the State Superintendent in writing and shall sign any such recommendation.
- e) Within 10 days after receipt of a panel's recommendations, the State Superintendent or his or her designee shall approve, disapprove, or modify the panel's recommendations; shall render a decision in writing; shall state the basis for the decision; and shall cause a copy of the decision to be served on the parties. The State Superintendent's decision shall be final.
- f) The grievance form, the designated coordinator's response, the complainant's statement of his or her reasons for dissatisfaction, the recommendations of the panel, and the decision of the State Superintendent shall be maintained in accordance with the State Records Act [5 ILCS 160] or as otherwise required by law.

Section 1300.60 Accessibility

The State Board of Education shall ensure that all stages of the procedure set forth in this Part are readily accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities.

Section 1300.70 Case-By-Case Resolution

Each grievance involves a unique set of factors. Accordingly, termination of a grievance at any level, whether through the granting of relief or otherwise, shall not constitute a precedent on which any other complainant should rely.

- P.A. 93-77, enacted in 2003, revised the maximum amount of time for which a contractor may be suspended from five to ten years. The change affects Section 1100.5520(c) of the State Board's rules.
- P.A. 93-769, enacted this year, changed the dollar figures that are used to define "small business". The new maximums need to be incorporated into Section 1100.4545(f) of the rules.

SUBPART N: PREFERENCES

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Section 1100.4545 Small Business

- a) The Procurement Officer may determine categories of supplies or service procurements that will be set aside for small businesses located in Illinois. The set-aside designation may be made for current and future procurements of a specific supply, service or construction, or for a class of like supplies, services or construction. A set-aside designation may last indefinitely or for a stated period of time.
- b) The Procurement Officer may contact DCMS to determine whether a particular procurement has been set aside for small businesses and, if so, the SBE may honor the set-aside to the extent practicable.
- c) The Procurement Officer may use the list, maintained by DCMS or other appropriate State agency, of responsible vendors that meet the criteria of small business. A business that fits the definition of small on the day of bid or proposal opening shall be considered small for the duration of the contract.
- d) If the Procurement Officer wishes to make a procurement covered by a set-aside designation, the solicitation shall note responses are limited to those from responsible small businesses. Bids or proposals received from large businesses shall be rejected as not responsive.
- e) If the Procurement Officer determines that acceptance of the best bid or proposal will result in the payment of an unreasonable price, the Procurement Officer shall reject all bids or proposals and withdraw the designation of small business setaside for the procurement in question. When a small business set-aside is withdrawn, notification shall be published in the Bulletin with an explanation. After withdrawal of the small business set-aside, the procurement shall be conducted in accordance with the limitations of the Code and this Part.
- f) Unless the Procurement Officer provides a definition for a particular procurement that reflects industrial characteristics, a small business is one:
 - 1) that is independently owned and operated.
 - 2) that is not dominant in its field of operations. This means the business does not exercise a controlling or major influence in a kind of business

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activity in which a number of business concerns are primarily engaged. In determining dominance, consideration shall be given to all appropriate factors, including volume of business, number of employees, financial resources, competitive status or position, ownership or control of materials, processes, patents, license agreements, facilities, sales territory, and nature of business activity.

- 3) has annual sales for the most recently ended fiscal year no greater than:
 - A) \$10,000,000 \$7,500,000 for wholesale business;
 - B) $\frac{$10,000,000}{$3,000,000}$ for construction business; or
 - C) \$6,000,000 \$1,500,000 for retail business.
- 4) has no more than 250 employees if it is a manufacturing business.
 - A) A manufacturing business shall calculate how many people it employs by determining its average full-time equivalent employment, based on the number of persons employed on a full-time, part-time, temporary or other basis, for its most recently ended fiscal year.
 - B) If a manufacturing business has been in existence for less than a full fiscal year, its average employment should be calculated for the period through one month prior to the bid or proposal due date.
- If the business is any combination of retailer, wholesaler, and construction business, then the annual sales for each component may not exceed the amounts shown in subsection (f)(3) of this Section. For example, a business that is both a retailer and a wholesaler may not have total sales exceeding \$16,000,000 \$9,000,000; the retail component may not exceed \$6,000,000 \$1,500,000 and the wholesale component may not exceed \$10,000,000 \$7,500,000. If the business is also a manufacturer, in addition to meeting the annual sales requirement, the number of manufacturing employees may not exceed the number shown in subsection (f)(4) of this Section.

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- When computing the size status of a vendor, the number of employees and annual sales and receipts, as applicable, of the vendor and all affiliates shall be included. Concerns are affiliates when either one directly or indirectly controls or has the power to control the other, or when a third party or parties controls or has the power to control both. In determining whether concerns are independently owned and operated and whether affiliation exists, consideration shall be given to all appropriate factors, including use of common facilities, common ownership and management and contractual arrangements. However, a franchise relationship shall not affect small business status if the franchise has the right to profit commensurate with ownership and bears the risk of loss or failure.
- g) Vendors desiring to submit bids or proposals or to otherwise contract for items set aside for small businesses shall submit information verifying that the vendor qualifies as a small business as defined in subsection (f) of this Section. The CPO may establish procedures for verifying such information.

SUBPART P: COMPLAINTS, PROTESTS AND REMEDIES

Section 1100.5520 Suspension

This Section applies to all debarments or suspensions of vendors from consideration for award of contract.

- a) The CPO may suspend a vendor from doing business with the SBE, or for specific types of supplies or services. A suspension may be issued upon a showing that the vendor violated the Code or this Part, or failed to conform to specifications or terms of delivery.
- b) When the CPO finds cause exists for suspension, a notice of suspension, including a copy of such determination, shall be sent to the suspended vendor. Bids or proposals shall not be solicited from the suspended vendor, and, if they are received, they shall not be considered during the period of suspension.
- c) A contractor may be suspended for a period of time commensurate with the seriousness of the offense, but for no more than <u>ten</u> five years. The suspension shall be effective within seven days after receipt of the notice unless an objection

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NOTICE OF PROPOSED AMENDMENTS

is filed. If an objection is filed, the suspension shall not become effective until the evaluation of the objection is completed.

- d) The CPO may debar a vendor. Debarment is the permanent suspension of a vendor from doing business with the SBE. A debarment may only take place in those instances involving bribery or attempted bribery of a State of Illinois officer or employee, or as otherwise allowed or required by law. Bids or proposals shall not be solicited from the debarred vendor, and if they are received, they shall not be considered.
- e) The SBE shall maintain a master list of all suspensions and debarments. The master list shall retain information concerning suspensions and debarments as public records. Such records shall be maintained for a period of at least three years following the end of the suspension or debarment. Such public information may be considered in determining responsibility.

Purpose of Agenda Item

 To inform the Board members about requests for waivers and modifications that have been received since the last report in April 2004; and

• To secure approval of the Fall 2004 Waiver Report for submission to the General Assembly by October 1, as required by law.

Expected Outcome of Agenda Item

 The Board's authorization to submit the Fall 2004 Waiver Report to the General Assembly.

Background Information

The Fall 2004 Waiver Report is the nineteenth report to be submitted to the General Assembly pursuant to Section 2-3.25g of the School Code. That law, enacted in 1995, permits school districts to request waivers or modifications of state education laws and administrative rules promulgated by the State Board of Education. All waivers of state law must be submitted to the General Assembly for its consideration.

This report contains 42 requests that seek to waive mandates of School Code provisions. These include requirements pertaining to driver education fees (11 requests), daily physical education (10 requests), parent-teacher conferences (nine requests), and inservice training (five requests). Other requests to be forwarded to the General Assembly for action address content of evaluation plans, administrative cost limitations, non-resident tuition, statement of affairs, and substitute teachers.

Since the spring waiver report, the State Board of Education has approved 87 requests that modify School Code mandates or modify or waive agency rules.

Analysis and Policy Implications

The State Board will be forwarding 11 requests to the General Assembly from districts wishing to increase their fees for driver's education from the maximum of \$50 allowed in 105 ILCS 5/27-23. Of the 11 districts requesting the fee increase, four request fees not to exceed \$200; four request fees not to exceed between \$250 and \$300; two request fees not to exceed \$400; and one requests fees of \$500. Only one of these requests is a renewal.

The fee limit of \$50 placed on districts for their driver's education course was part of the reform legislation passed in 1985. Since that time, district costs have gone up in all areas associated with driver's education, and the increasing number of applications received for this area may suggest a need for the legislature to raise the fee limit to an amount that comes closer to meeting district expenses. The State Board may wish to consider making such a recommendation to the General Assembly.

The State Board also will be transmitting to the General Assembly for action 10 waiver requests from school districts seeking relief from the mandate to provide physical education on a daily basis. Summaries of each of these requests can be found on pages 4 to 6 of the waiver report.

Staff have summarized the information received from all 10 districts applying for physical education waivers (see attached chart). The summary details achievement of the Illinois Learning Standards for Physical Development and Health and the equal learning opportunities provided in lieu of daily physical education.

In September 2001, the State Board of Education implemented its policy concerning physical education waivers and modifications that focuses on:

- 1. student achievement of the Illinois Learning Standards for Physical Development and Health, specifically Goals 19, 20, and 21; and
- 2. the need for districts seeking to waive or modify the daily physical education mandate to provide the learning opportunities necessary for their students to progress toward achieving these standards.

The fall 2004 report is the sixth opportunity for districts to include with their physical education waiver applications descriptions of their students' achievement relative to the Illinois Learning Standards for Physical Development and Health and of the additional learning opportunities provided to students to ensure that they continue to make progress toward achieving the standards.

Nine of the districts submitted this additional information (see attached chart). Byron CUSD 226 did not have any assessment data to share. All three of the school districts whose petitions include elementary grade levels submitted ISAT results in addition to

results from locally developed assessments. Others also used the Presidential Fitness Test or the Fitnessgram to measure achievement of Goal 20 (i.e., individual fitness). High school districts, for the most part, summarized results from locally developed assessments.

Of the 10 requests:

- Eight are renewal requests,
- Three include kindergarten through grade 8, and
- Seven include high school grade levels.

Superintendent's Recommendation

- The 42 requests summarized in the report should be forwarded to the General Assembly without comment.
- The Board should approve the report and authorize its submission to the General Assembly by October 1.

Next Steps

Submit the Fall 2004 Waiver Report as presented to the General Assembly by October 1.

Executive Summary

The following report outlines waivers of School Code mandates that school districts, regional offices of education, or special education or vocational education cooperatives have requested since the last report, which was transmitted in May 2004. Pursuant to Section 2-3.25g of the School Code (105 ILCS 5/2-3.25g), these requests must be sent to the General Assembly for its consideration before October 1, 2004.

The report is organized by subject area and by school district, regional office, or special education or vocational education cooperative. The General Assembly may disapprove the report in whole or in part within 30 calendar days after each chamber next convenes once the report is filed. This is done by a joint resolution. If either chamber fails to reject a waiver request, then that request is deemed granted.

Section I summarizes the 42 requests received for waivers of School Code mandates for consideration by the General Assembly, which are presented alphabetically by topic area. The largest number of applications received seeks waivers from Section 27-23 of the School Code regarding driver education (11 requests), followed by 10 petitions pertaining to physical education, nine for parent-teacher conferences, and five for school improvement/inservice training. Two petitions each were received for content of evaluation plans and for substitute teachers, and one petition each was received for limitation of administrative costs, non-resident tuition, and statement of affairs.

The requests dealing with substitute teachers seek authorization to employ substitutes for longer than the 90 days allowed under Section 21-9 of the School Code (see page 7 of the report).

This document also contains three other sections beyond what is required under Section 2-3.25g of the School Code. Section II lists the modifications or waivers of State Board of Education rules and modifications of School Code mandates upon which the State Board has acted. Of the approvals, 78 address legal school holidays, four involve physical education and block scheduling, three address instructional time and the Prairie State Achievement Examination, and two address driver education.

Section III describes the 23 requests that have been returned to or withdrawn by the petitioning entities. Section IV shows all the requests submitted, organized by Senate and House district.

In addition, the requests received are summarized by subject area in a table following this Executive Summary. Complete copies of the waiver requests for the General Assembly's consideration have been made available to legislative staff.

This is the nineteenth report submitted pursuant to Section 2-3.25g of the School Code, which requires that the State Board of Education compile and submit requests for waivers of School Code mandates to the General Assembly before May 1 and October 1 of each year.

Students in grades 9, 10, and 12 will attend school for a half day on the afternoon of April 27 and have no school on April 28. The district will accumulate sufficient student attendance time beyond the five-clock-hour instructional day to be applied to these days so that they can be counted among the 176 days of pupil attendance required by Section 10-19.

Kaneland CUSD 302 - Kane, DeKalb (SD 25/HD 50) / Expiration: 2004-05 school year

WM300-3355-2 (renewal) – Modification of School Code (Section 18-8.05(F)(2)(d)) allows the district to dismiss students in grade 11 following the administration of the Prairie State Achievement Examination on April 27 and 28. Students in grade 12 will attend school for a half day on the afternoon of April 27 and have no school on April 28.

The district will accumulate sufficient student attendance time beyond the five-clock-hour instructional day to be applied to these days so that they can be counted among the 176 days of pupil attendance required by Section 10-19.

P.A. 93-557, effective August 20, 2003, now requires that the public hearing to consider the request be held on a day other than a regular board meeting day and that legislators be notified in writing of the public hearing.

Bartelso SD 57 – Clinton (SD 54/HD 107) / Expiration: 2006-07 school year WM300-3305 (renewal) – Modification of School Code (Section 24-2). The district requested to be allowed to hold school on the legal holiday honoring Abraham Lincoln. P.A. 93-557, effective August 20, 2003, now requires that the public hearing to consider the request be held on a day other than a regular board meeting day and that legislators be notified in writing of the public hearing.

P.A. 93-557, effective August 20, 2003, now requires that the public hearing to consider the request be held on a day other than a regular board meeting day and that legislators be notified in writing of the public hearing.

Lyons SD 103 – Cook (SD 11/HD 21) / Expiration: 2008-09 school year WM300-3337 (renewal) – Modification of School Code (Section 24-2). The district requested to be allowed to hold school on the legal holidays honoring Casimir Pulaski and all veterans of foreign wars. The district failed to provide the legally required notice of the public hearing held to consider the request.

The district requested to be allowed to hold school on the legal holidays honoring Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Abraham Lincoln, Casimir Pulaski, and Christopher Columbus. The district failed to provide adequate notice of the public hearing held to consider the request.

Parent-Teacher Conferences

Lee Center CUSD 271 – Lee (SD 45/HD 90) / Expiration: 2008-09 school year WM100-3263-2 – Waiver of School Code (Section 18-8.05(F)(2)(d)(1)). The district requested to be allowed to schedule two consecutive parent-teacher conferences in the evening following a full day of school. One day during that week would be a nonattendance day for students, and the evening sessions would be counted among the 176 days of actual pupil attendance required by Section 10-19. As of July 1, 2004, the district had reorganized, requiring the new board of education to act on the waiver request.

The request is being made due to inadequate facilities. This modification takes effect in the 2005-06 school year.

Rich THSD 227 – Cook (SD 19/HD 38) / Expiration: 2009-10 school year WM300-3289-2 – Modification of School Code (Section 24-2) allows the district to recognize the contributions of Abraham Lincoln, Casimir Pulaski, Christopher Columbus, and all veterans of foreign wars through instructional activities rather than observing school holidays in their honor. This modification takes effect in the 2005-06 school year.

SD 21/HD 42

Lombard ESD 44 – DuPage (SD 21/HD 42) / Expiration: 2008-09 school year WM100-3358 – Waiver of School Code (Section 24A-5) request to allow the district to replace the current rating scale of "excellent, satisfactory, and unsatisfactory" for the teacher evaluation process with ratings of "Professional Growth Track – no rating" and "Professional Assistance Track – satisfactory or unsatisfactory."

Central CUSD 301 – Kane (SD 25/HD 49) / Expiration: 2008-09 school year WM100-3348 – Waiver of School Code (Section 27-23). Kaneland CUSD 302 - Kane, DeKalb (SD 25/HD 50) / Expiration: 2007-08 school vear

WM100-3355-1 – Waiver of School Code (Section 27-23) request to allow the district to charge a reasonable fee not to exceed \$400 of students who participate in driver education courses. If approved, this waiver would take effect in the 2005-06 school

year.

Kaneland CUSD 302 - Kane, DeKalb (SD 25/HD 50) / Expiration: 2004-05 school year

WM300-3355-2 (renewal) – Modification of School Code (Section 18-8.05(F)(2)(d)) allows the district to dismiss students in grade 11 following the administration of the Prairie State Achievement Examination on April 27 and 28. If approved, this waiver would take effect in the 2005-06 school year.

Millburn CCSD 24 – Lake (SD 31/HD 61) / Expiration: 2008-09 school year WM300-3293 – Modification of School Code (Section 24-2) allows the district to recognize the contributions of Abraham Lincoln through instructional activities rather than observing a school holiday in his honor.

SD 32/HD 63

Alden Hebron SD 19 – McHenry (SD 32/HD 63) / Expiration: 2008-09 school year WM300-3268-1 – Modification of School Code (Section 24-2) allows the district to recognize the contributions of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., through instructional activities rather than observing a school holiday in his honor.

Alden Hebron SD 19 – McHenry (SD 32/HD 63) / Expiration: 2008-09 school year WM300-3268-2 – Modification of School Code (Section 24-2) allows the district to recognize the contributions of Casimir Pulaski through instructional activities rather than observing a school holiday in his honor.

Mount Prospect SD 57 – Cook (SD 33/HD 66) / Expiration: 2009-10 school year WM100-3362-1 (renewal) – Waiver of School Code (Section 21-9) request to allow the district to employ substitute teachers for more than 90 days in any one school year. If approved, this waiver would take effect in the 2005-06 school year.

Mount Prospect SD 57 – Cook (SD 33/HD 66) – Expiration: 2009-10 school year WM100-3362-2 (renewal) – Waiver of School Code (Section 27-6) request to permit students in grades 1 through 5 to participate in physical education three times a week for 30 minutes each session. Students will also receive structured recess activities supervised by a certificated teacher in the classroom for the remaining two days of the week. If approved, this waiver would take effect in the 2005-06 school year.

Purpose of Agenda Item

To share the results of the analysis conducted of 18 school districts that qualify for financial certification. The analysis of these 18 school districts consist of financial data collected through via the June 30, 2003 Annual Financial Report, financial data submitted by the districts, or on-sight visits conducted with the districts.

Expected Outcome(s) of Agenda Item

To certify school districts deemed to be in financial difficulty as defined by the *Illinois School Code*.

Background Information

After proper investigation, ISBE has the authority to certify school districts in financial difficulties as defined by 105 ILCS 5/1A-8 of the *School Code* when any one of the following conditions occurs:

- The district has issued school orders for wages, or the district has issued funding bonds to retire teacher orders in 3 of the last 5 years;
- (2) The district has issued tax anticipation warrants or tax anticipation notes in anticipation of a second year's taxes when warrants or notes in anticipation of current year taxes are still outstanding;

(3) The district has for 2 consecutive years has negative fund balances on its annual financial report for the aggregate totals of the Educational, Operations and Maintenance, Transportation, and Working Cash Funds.

After analysis of the data collected from the June 30, 2003 Annual Financial Report, 18 schools were identified as being eligible for certification for meeting the criteria listed above, as they had incurred two or more years of negative fund balances.

On May 18, 2004 a letter was sent out to all of the districts asking that they submit additional financial data, inquiring as to why they were incurring negative fund balances, and how the financial problems were being addressed for remediation. The districts were asked to submit their FY 2002 and FY 2003 independent audits, their final FY 2004 budget, a tentative FY 2005 budget, three years of financial projections, their projected cash flow, as well as a schedule of short and long-term debt.

The Regional Financial Consultants contacted each district to obtain a better understanding of their financial condition and they also analyzed the data submitted by the districts.

From the analysis:

- Six of the eighteen districts do not appear to be making improvement in their financial status and are recommended to be certified as being in financial difficulty.
- One of the districts requires further analysis of submitted data before a final recommendation can be made. ISBE has been working with this district over the past year and it is believed they are making progress, but the data submitted by the district is incomplete.
- The remaining 11 districts are not being recommended for certification at this time, but should continue to be monitored by the Regional Financial Consultants to ensure they are making adequate progress to obtain good financial standing. These 11 districts have either made significant reductions in their budget, have increased their revenues through passed referendums, or are restructing their finances; and, with these modifications, they are projecting surplus operations for either their fiscal year 2004 or fiscal year 2005 that allows for them to make adequate progress on eliminating their negative fund balances.

School districts are commencing with the audit of their fiscal year 2004 finances. As the June 30, 2004 Annual Financial Reports (AFR) are completed and received by ISBE, the Regional Financial Consultants will begin analysis that

data to determine if the 11 monitored school district did make adequate progress. If not, they will be recommended for certification at that time. The Fiscal Year 2004 AFRs will also be reviewed to determine whether additional districts meet the criteria to be certified. Review of the Fiscal Year 2003 AFRs reveal there are 34 additional schools that incurred one year of deficit fund balances. If these districts incurred negative fund balances for Fiscal Year 2004, they will also meet the criteria to be certified. They, too, will be monitored as their AFRs are received and recommendations will be made to the State Board accordingly.

Next Steps

Districts that are being recommended for certification have been asked to come before the State Board to present their financial situation as well as their plan to improve their finances. If the State Board certifies a district, the district must comply with the following:

- (1) Develop, adopt, and submit a financial plan within 45 days after certification for State Board approval.
- (2) Present a budget consistent with the financial plan that has been approved by the State Board.
- (3) The State Board may review the district's operations and request for review budgetary data and financial statements.
- (4) The State Board may require the district to produce reports and require access to any other information in the possession of the district that it deems relevant.
- (5) The State Board may issue recommendations or directives within its powers to the district to assure compliance with the financial plan.
- (6) The District must produce such budgetary data, financial statements, reports, and other information, and comply with all directives.

If a school district fails to follow its approved Financial Plan, the State Board of Education may appoint an involuntary Financial Oversight Panel to oversee all aspects of the finances of the district.

Purpose of Agenda Item

To provide the Board standard reports with key information on fiscal and administrative activities of the state Agency.

Expected Outcome(s) of Agenda Item

The board will receive and approve baseline data from a series of reports on fiscal and administrative activities which provide one basis for gauging Agency progress over time.

Background Information

In June 2002, the State Board adopted bylaws outlining a new committee structure under which fiscal, audit and operations issues will be handled by the Fiscal and Audit Committee. Superintendent Schiller requested that the Agency organize and standardize the financial and headcount data provided to the Board for their future policy work and decision making.

Currently the following Reports are provided or are being developed.

- 1. Budget/Annual Report (annually in January)
- 2. Condition of Public Education (December)
- 3. Comptroller SEA Report (annually in February)
- 4. Appropriation and Expenditure (monthly)
- 5. Financial Status Report Contract/Grant Detail (monthly)
- 6. Business Plans at the Director Level (quarterly)
- 7. Headcount Reports (monthly)
 Personnel Transactions, Staff Detail by Division, & Monthly
 Headcount Graph

<u>Analysis and Implications for Policy, Budget, Legislative Action and Communications</u>

Beginning in November 2003 the Superintendent will also provide the Board an "Accomplishments and Planning Report" each November, March, and July. The report will detail Agency accomplishments that occurred over the previous four months as well as the activities that are planned for the next four months. For example, the November 2003 report identifies accomplishments for the period July 2003 through October 2003 and identifies activities to occur for the period November 2003 through February 2004.

The first and third reports have been provided for several years. These provide an overview of the elementary and secondary education system, the Board Goals, and the programs operated by the Agency. This year the Condition of Public Education document was added to review the status of the elementary and secondary education system in Illinois. It is a precursor to the Annual Report/Budget document and much of it is incorporated into that document. It is intended to layout the current situation and challenges in Illinois and outline options for policy and program activities to improve the current situation in the future.

The Monthly or Quarterly Fiscal and Headcount Repots were first provided to the Board in August 2002. These provide information regarding staffing and funding as well as details of contracts over \$50 thousand and grants the Agency is processing.

Agency Business Plans were first implemented in FY01 to help the Board and Management provide context to the larger education system and the Board Goals and to walk between these and the detailed funding information at the Division level.

The Board specifically approves all proposed contracts over \$1M prior to the issuance of an RFP. This month there are no such proposed contracts.

There are two sets of reports this month. The FY04 lapse period ended August 31, 2004, which is the final FY04 report. A FY05 report is also included for July and August spending.

Superintendent's Recommendation

The Superintendent recommends that the Board accepts and approves these monthly reports.

Next Steps

Continue to provide these reports pursuant to the schedule above.



Purpose of Agenda Item

Approval of Chicago School District 299's FY05 Supplemental General State Aid Plan.

Expected Outcome of Agenda Item

Approval of FY05 ISBE Contravention Report and Chicago School District's FY05 SGSA distribution plan. Continued support of programs that will effect improved student achievement for children from low income households in Chicago Public Schools.

Background Information

The Supplemental State Aid grant increases the amount of State Aid a district receives in proportion to the number of low income students attending the district. The grant must be used to supplement other categorical program grants and not to replace that funding at any school. Section 5/18-8.05(H) requires the State Board of Education to approve the City of Chicago's SGSA distribution plan.

<u>Analysis and Implications for Policy, Budget, Legislative Action and Communications</u>

ISBE staff have analyzed the Chicago Public School District 299 SGSA plan for systematic contravention and found no evidence of supplanting. The plan also includes the elements mandated by the Illinois State Board of Education.

Pros and Cons of Various Actions

Section 5/18-8.05(H) of the Illinois School Code mandates that the State Board of Education approve or reject the Chicago Public School Plan. Approval of the plan authorizes the expenditure of SGSA funds for the approved programs. Rejection of the plan require the district to give written notification of the intent to modify the plan within fifteen days after receiving notice of it's rejection. The district then has thirty days to submit a modified plan.

Superintendent's Recommendation

Based on staff analysis of the Chicago School District's SGSA plan and the inclusion of elements required by the Illinois State Board of Education, I recommend that the FY05 Chicago School District's SGSA plan be approved.

Next Steps

The superintendent of the Chicago School District will be notified of the approval or rejection of the SGSA plan. A finalized SGSA plan will be submitted in December. ISBE staff will conduct a review of the character of the SGSA expenditures of sixty Chicago schools to assure funds are being expended for approved programs.

Call Meeting to Order/ Roll Call

The Chair, Dr. Janet Steiner, called the August 18, 2004, meeting to order at 10:40 a.m. She then requested that the roll be called. A quorum was present.

Dr. Steiner stated that the meeting would be a one-day meeting in which the Board would discuss and take action on the presented agenda items.

Presentation of 2004 State Assessment Results for ISAT, PSAE, IAA And IMAGE

Dr. Schiller reported that for the first time, six-year trend data are available. He said that six-year assessment data for Illinois elementary school students show an upward trend in mathematics in all grades tested, and over the past four years there is a continued narrowing in the achievement gap in many subjects and grade levels for black, Hispanic, and low-income students.

The results reflect the following:

ISAT:

- Reading: Moderate gains in grades 3 and 8, marginal gain in grade 5.
- Mathematics: All grades continue to show improvement, with 65.4 percent of third graders meeting or exceeding standards; of those students there were significant gains by black students who made a 5.2 percent gain; Hispanic students made a 6.7 percent gain; and low-income students made a 5.7 percent gain.
- Writing: Overall performance has been erratic, but there were year-to-year gains in each grade assessed, including 5th graders who moved from 64.8 percent to 69.9 percent.

- <u>Science</u>: Remains steady with small gains in both grades 4 and 7.
- Social Science: Despite moderate gains in 2003, there was a small decrease in 2004.

PSAE:

 In each subject area, reading, mathematics, writing, science, and social science, there was a slight improvement, with the exception of mathematics, which saw a decrease.

IAA:

• 11th grade students who were assessed in writing showed marked improvement.

IMAGE:

 In grades 3,5,8, and 11, writing performance in the expanding and transitioning levels increased, especially in grade 5 where there was a 23.4 percent jump and grade 11 were there was a 11.9 percent increase.

Staff indicated that results of a longitudinal study conducted for ISBE by University of Illinois researchers indicated that we are beginning to see a causal relationship between those schools that implement the Illinois Learning Standards and improved performance on the state assessments. Staff explained that for students to do well on the state assessments, their curriculum must be aligned with the state standards.

Discussion followed for clarification purposes and Board members' input. Staff members Connie Wise, Shuwan Chiu, and Any Metcalf answered questions and indicated that staff will continue to analyze the state assessment data and provide the Board with updates.

Presentation of 2004 ACT Results

Superintendent Schiller presented the results of the ACT results for the 2004 graduating seniors. He informed the Board that he was once again pleased that the average score in Illinois rose for the second straight year in 2004. He noted that Illinois' graduating seniors in 2004 earned an average composite score of 20.3 on the ACT, up from 20.2 last year and 20.1 in 2001. He said that ACT assures us the .1 percent increase is statistically significant given our large student pool. Dr. Schiller stated that we should all be encouraged that the mandated

Resolution – Award of Contract of Assessment System

Ron Gidwitz moved that with regard to the award of a contract for Illinois assessments to be first administered in the spring of 2006, the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) notes the following:

- Whereas, in September of 2003, the ISBE issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) for the development and scoring of the enhanced Illinois Standards Achievement Tests (ISAT).
- Whereas, this RFP was prepared with input from the Assessment Task Force and reflects the importance of having usable diagnostics for educators across the State.
- Whereas, ISBE wishes to acknowledge the hard work of the Assessment Task Force in addressing assessment issues for the past two and one-half years.
- Whereas, prior to the awarding of a contract, Senate Bill 2205 (as amended) was signed into law (P.A. 93-0838). P.A. 9300838 became effective on July 30, 2004. The new law prohibits ISBE from administering ISATs in the areas of writing, physical development and health, fine arts, and the social sciences (history, geography, economics, civics, and government), beginning with the 2004-2005 school year.
- Whereas, Illinois is required to administer academic assessments to measure the achievement of all public elementary and secondary school students under the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 (NCLBA).
- Whereas, beginning with the 2005-2006 school

year, such assessments must be offered to all students in grades 3 through 8 in mathematics and reading (or language arts) and, beginning in 2007-2008, to all students at least once during grades 3 through 5, grades 6 through 9, and grades 10 through 12, in science.

- Whereas, generally, the development and preparation of a new assessment takes at least 18 months.
- Whereas, it is estimated that the time necessary for ISBE to reject all the bids or proposals received in response to the RFP issued in September of 2003, re-issue an RFP and evaluate new proposals for the ISAT based o the assessments now required under Illinois law, and negotiate a contract would be at least 2 months.
- Whereas, although the intervening legislation (P.A. 93-0838) reduced the number and types of tests to be administered, it did not materially alter the specifications required for the assessments, and the time necessary to re-issue an RFP for the ISAT and finalize a contract would likely threaten ISBE's ability to meet the testing requirements set forth in the NCLBA.
- Whereas, it is in the best interests of the State and the children in the State for the ISBE to continue negotiations with the most responsive bidder to the September 2003 RFP.
- Whereas, Legislation is pending (SB 3000) which, among other things, reconstitutes the membership of the Illinois State Board of Education.

Therefore, it is resolved that the ISBE seek to finalize the contract with the bidder previously selected to develop and score the ISAT. ISBE directs the State Superintendent to obtain a cost proposal from that bidder for the remaining portions of the ISAT and to request a letter from the Governor's office concurring in this approach.

Announcements and Reports

Superintendent Schiller reported that the transition at the East. St. Louis School District regarding the intergovernmental agreement has gone very well.

Discussion followed for Board members' input. Superintendent Schiller answered questions.

Motion to Honor David Wood	Committee Reports: Joyce Karon commented that the September meeting date should be moved to a one-day meeting on Wednesday, September 22 due to a Jewish Holiday conflict. Greg Kazarian moved that he wanted to make a resolution to recognize David Wood's remarkable level of professionalism and service in terms of the financial operations of the Agency as well as incredible leadership in terms of the financial needs and demands of the school districts across the state. He further stated that David Wood is one of the most trusted and reliable sources of objective information when the Legislature considers its financial impact of its decisions. Mr. Kazarian said that Mr. Wood has created a body of work that should be recognized by this Board. Ron Gidwitz seconded the motion. All Board members voted unanimously to approve the motion.

The Chair, Dr. Janet Steiner, called the September 2, 2004 Special Board meeting to order at 11:07 a.m. (the meeting was by phone). She then requested that the roll be called. A quorum was present.

Public Participation

Dr. Steiner began by stating that the meeting would start with Public Participation. She then asked if there were any people on the phone line who would like to participate and to identify themselves.

Mr. Michael Hussey, Vice President of Pearson Education Measurement, introduced himself. He stated that he had been with the organization for 15 years. Mr. Hussey said the reason for his participation was in regard to two letters that he had sent to Superintendent Schiller, one on August 4, 2004 and the other on August 31, 2004. Pearson asked that those letters be sent to the Board members in preparation for this Special Board Meeting, which Mr. Hussey then stated that the Special Board Meeting was announced the past Monday, August 30th. He then stated that the letters mentioned were created based on the Resolution from the ISBE's most recent board meeting on August 18, 2004, with regard to the award of a contract for the Illinois Assessment. Mr. Hussey then said Pearson received the letter dated August 31, 2004, from David Wood, Chief Procurement Officer yesterday. He stated that the letter denied Pearson's protest on two premises. First, policy role and second, merit. Mr. Hussey then outlined Pearson's responses to both those issues. First, on procedure and timing, he said the letter was received on the 7th day. The Illinois procurement and precedent is clear on this. He stated that our letter noted receipt on August 25th, the 7th day after the

Resolution was created. Mr. Hussey then proceeded to say that by Illinois precedent, the first day of knowledge is always considered the 0 day when calculating time period. The first day therefore would be the 19th, with the 25th being the 7th day. He then stated that our letter did note receipt by the 25th. Mr. Hussey then proceeded with the second issue, merit. He said the scope of the RFP had been materially changed since the time the proposals were created and evaluated. He then spoke about how the state legislature removed four of the seven subject areas to which were originally planned to test. Mr. Hussev then asserted that from a budget perspective, 6.3 million the legislature removed from the 2005 and subsequent years represented a change of 28% from the previously communicated 2005 assessment budget, which he thought were significant scope changes. Mr. Hussey then stated it was likely, if not certain, that the state will not receive the best value on this contract by negotiating with only one vendor for the significantly-reduced scope. He further stated that the basis for questioning the award is that it appears to be outside the legal process of awarding a bid of this type. He then added that the proposed contract scope is significantly different from the RFP released more than one year ago. And secondly, there was no authority to exclusively negotiate significantly modified scope with only one of multiple vendors. Mr. Hussey continued by saying that an award based on negotiations with only one vendor is a violation of Illinois Procurement Law. Pearson has engaged in legal counsel in this matter and Mr. Hussey stated that on the line with him were both Pearson counsel and Illinois counsel. Pearson had counsel with the law firm of Dykema. Gossett, Rooks, & Pitts to provide Pearson with legal advice for the process of procurement bids under Illinois law and the rights of Pearson as a bidder. Mr. Hussey then said that what Pearson stated in their letter had been confirmed to them by their legal counsel. He said that while ISBE's legal counsel and Pearson's may have some disagreement, that this matter would create potential litigation. Mr. Hussey then continued by saying that ISBE's resolution stated that the process of item development and creating new assessments takes up to 18 months. He further stated that utilizing the standards, Illinois will have difficulties meeting federal reporting requirements and would be at risk and would need to find an alternative to avoid those risks for Illinois schools and accomplishes needed for developing new tests in accordance with the new Illinois law for federal requirements.

Mr. Hussey then suggested as an alternative, Pearson offers the following.

He stated that to minimize the risk for Illinois schools, the current board and ISBE staff, Pearson suggests extending the current contract as necessary while a new RFP is specified and

	released. He further asserted that Pearson's response to this request for test specifications can be met in less than 60 days and Pearson commits to work with ISBE on a solution. Mr. Hussey then thanked Chair Steiner, the Board Members and Superintendent Schiller for giving Pearson an opportunity to express their views on this very important decision. Superintendent Schiller then asked Chair Steiner if there were
	any other public comments. Chair Steiner than asked the public if there were any additional comments and there were none. Dr. Schiller then asked if there were any further public comments from anyone present in Springfield and there were none.
Motion to Enter into Closed Session	Dr. Steiner stated that the Board would adjourn to enter into Closed Session. She therefore requested a motion to do so. Dean Clark moved that the Illinois State Board of Education go into Closed Session under the exceptions set forth in the Open Meetings Act of the State of Illinois as follows: Section 2 (c) (1) for the purpose of discussing information regarding appointment, employment, compensation, discipline, performance, or dismissal of an employee, including hearing testimony on a complaint lodged against an employee. The motion was seconded by Ron Gidwitz.
Roll Call Vote	Dr. Steiner then requested a roll call vote to enter into Closed Session. The motion passed as all members presented voted affirmatively and the members went in to Closed Session at 11:22 a.m.
Approval to Finalize Contract for the Illinois Enhanced Assessment System	The open portion of the meeting resumed at 11:49 a.m. At that time, Dr. Steiner requested roll call be taken. Dr. Steiner stated that the ISBE is prepared to take action for the only item on the agenda. Greg Kazarian moved that the ISBE authorize the State Superintendent to proceed with negotiations on the final contract with the bidder previously selected to develop and score the Illinois Enhanced Assessment System in response to the RFSP's issued in August 2003. Given that the State Superintendent received a letter of concurrence from the Office of the Governor that the Chief Procurement Officer has determined that proceeding with the contract is consistent with state law and given that the award of the contract is in the best interest of ISBE and the State of Illinois. Mr. Kazarian further moved that the ISBE authorize the State Superintendent to execute a final contract upon the completion of negotiations. Ronald Gidwitz seconded the motion.
Adjournment of Meeting	Dr. Steiner then requested a motion to adjourn. Dick Sandsmark made the motion to adjourn, while Joyce Karon seconded the motion. A roll call vote to adjourn the meeting was taken and all members voted affirmatively and the meeting adjourned at 11:51 a.m.
