Purpose of Agenda Item

The purpose of this agenda item is to provide the Board with information regarding the need for funding to educate and provide opportunities for children to succeed from each and every community throughout Illinois, as communicated by educators, students and community members throughout the state. This information will facilitate the Board's discussion in preparation for the Fiscal Year 2018 (FY2018) budget recommendation.

<u>Relationship to the State Board's Strategic Plan and Implications for the Agency and</u> <u>School Districts</u>

The budget is crucial for all aspects of the State Board's Strategic Plan.

- Goal 1: Every child in each public school system in the state of Illinois deserves to attend a system wherein . . .
 - 1. All Kindergarteners are assessed for readiness.
 - 2. Ninety percent or more of third-grade students are reading at or above grade level.
 - 3. Ninety percent or more of fifth-grade students meet or exceed expectations in mathematics.
 - 4. Ninety percent or more of students are on track to graduate with their cohort at the end of ninth grade.
 - 5. Ninety percent or more of students graduate from high school ready for college and career.

- Goal 2: Every student will be supported by highly prepared and effective teachers and school leaders.
- Goal 3: Every school will offer a safe and healthy learning environment for all students.

Background Information

Funding History and Current Conditions

The Board has historically adopted a budget recommendation at its January meeting. This memo is intended to provide preliminary information to facilitate initial FY2018 budget discussions at the Board's December meeting.

The partial budget enacted for FY2016 did not fully fund all ISBE programs or operations. The budget enacted for FY2017 allowed for the use of many of the FY2017 appropriations for FY2016 costs but was insufficient, in many cases, to cover the combined costs of FY2016 and FY2017. Staff has submitted a supplemental appropriation request in response to the shortfall.

In FY2017 the Board sought an increase of \$383.1 million or 5.5% over the FY2016 appropriation levels for General Funds. The FY2017 budget that was enacted reflected a General Funds appropriation of \$7.461 billion, which resulted in an overall increase of \$523.6 million (7.6%) over the FY2016 appropriation levels. The most significant changes in programmatic funding are as follows:

- \$133.0 million (7.7%) increase in General State Aid (GSA)
- \$313.4 million for GSA Hold Harmless and Equity Grants
- \$79.5 million (25.3%) increase in Early Childhood Education grant funds
- \$15.0 million for After School Programs

The percentage of the General Funds budget allocated for direct Pre-K through 12 Education funding has diminished from 28.8% in FY2010 to 23.2% in FY2016 while the percentage allocated to the indirect cost of Education funding (pensions) has increased from 3.8% to 13.8% during the same period (Exhibit B).

The Illinois Office of Comptroller (IOC) continues to struggle in addressing the backlog of unpaid bills. As of November 28, 2016, the General Funds backlog of unpaid bills at the IOC totaled \$5.5 billion. The Comptroller held 18,060 delayed ISBE vouchers with a value of \$1.1 billion. Of those ISBE vouchers, 7,336 with a value of \$489 million are from FY2016. The oldest delayed voucher date was June 17, 2016. The backlog included \$861.8 million of MCAT payments, \$427.2 million of which are from FY2016.

Determining the Fiscal Year 2018 Budget

Fiscal Year 2018 Budget Hearings

A series of three public Budget Hearings were held throughout the state for the FY2018 budget. Hearings were conducted in Springfield, Granite City and Chicago. Testimony in support of various programs was provided by 154 individuals (comprised of educators, students and community members), either in-person or via email. Many individuals communicated funding needs for multiple programs. A summary of the programs for which funding needs were communicated follows:

General State Aid (GSA)

Approximately 68% of the \$7.46 billion FY2017 ISBE State General Funds budget is distributed through the GSA Formula. In FY2017, the statutory Foundation Level remained at \$6,119. The GSA claim was prorated at 88.7%, 87.1% and 92.1% in FY2014, FY2015 and FY2016 respectively. In FY2017 the appropriation also included \$313.4 million in Low Income Equity Grant and Hold Harmless funds for GSA.

In FY2017, for the first time since FY2009, the GSA claim is fully funded. In addition, no district receives less than it received in FY2016 payments. In this fiscal year, each district receives the greater of (A) its FY2016 net payment, including loss limit funding, plus a share of the new \$250 million equity grant pool or (B) its FY2017 gross GSA claim. The FY2017 gross GSA claim is

\$4.731 billion. In addition, there is \$313.3 million provided to pay those districts where option A was the more beneficial choice. With the addition of \$26.7 million in net adjustments, FY2017 GSA payments total \$5.071 billion.

Staff is developing the forecast for the FY2018 GSA claim and the result of that forecast will be included in the Superintendent's recommendation in January.

Mandated Categorical Reimbursements (MCATS)

Approximately 23.6% of the \$7.46 billion FY2017 ISBE State General Funds budget is distributed through the MCATS. Historically, the Board has recommended appropriations sufficient to fully fund the MCATS, with the exception of Regular/Vocational Transportation, Special Education Private Facility and IL Free Lunch and Breakfast. The Board's FY2017 recommendation for Regular/Vocational Transportation reimbursement was based on an approximate 80% proration, 95% proration for Special Education Private Facility and 35% for IL Free Lunch and Breakfast.

The final projections for MCATS will be completed in late December and will be included, with consideration of Federal IDEA maintenance of fiscal effort requirements, in the Superintendent's Recommended Budget for FY2018.

Standards and Assessments

<u>Assessments</u> - The Board's FY2017 recommendation of \$53.1 million was intended to fund the expansion of PARCC to cover grades 3 through 11. The FY2017 request also included funding for the SAT exam for all 11th grade students; a science exam and PARCC non-summative testing for grades Kindergarten through eight.

General Revenue funding for assessments was not appropriated for FY2016. The FY2017 appropriation of \$44.6 million was made available for both FY2016 and FY2017 costs. A request for supplemental funding for FY2017 has been submitted.

Final cost estimates are being calculated for FY2018 Assessments and will be included in the Superintendent's recommended budget when presented in January.

Academic Improvement

<u>Early Childhood Education</u>— It is estimated that more than 265,000 eligible children, age birth to five years, are not being served by an Early Head Start, Head Start, Prevention Initiative, or Preschool for All program. The General Assembly enacted the Board requested appropriation of \$393.7 million for FY2017.

Educators, parents and community members have requested \$443.7 million, a budget increase of \$50 million for FY2018. The request is based on the proposal made as part of the application for the federal Preschool Development Expansion Grant. The application for the \$80 million grant included a commitment to increase State Early Childhood Education funding by \$50 million per year, for five years. FY2018 is the third year of the commitment.

<u>Bilingual Education</u> – The percentage of English Language Learning students increased from 7.6% in FY2010 to 10.5% in FY2016. Appropriations for Bilingual Education have been at approximately \$63.5 million since FY2011. When the funding appropriated for Bilingual Education is insufficient to fully pay the claim submitted by districts, section 5/14C-12 of the Illinois School Code directs ISBE to apportion funds on the basis of approved claims. Bilingual Education proration is estimated at approximately 58% of the claim for FY2017, down from 63%

in FY2016 (Exhibit F). Bilingual education cost reimbursement claims are based on cost standards established as the result of a survey conducted in FY1999. Educators, parents and community members requested that the FY2018 claim be fully funded. Staff are preparing an estimate of the FY2018 Bilingual Education claim.

<u>Advanced Placement</u> – An appropriation of \$1,000,000 has been requested by staff which would fund grants to schools for new, or expanded Advanced Placement and/or pre-Advanced Placement programs. The FY2017 appropriation was \$500,000. The requested amount would double the number of school districts served from 11 to 22.

<u>Career and Technical Education</u> – Career and Technical Education Programs continue to provide important experiential learning opportunities for Illinois students. Funding for this program also leverages approximately \$40.4 million in federal funding annually. An appropriation of \$38.1 million is needed to meet Maintenance of Effort Requirements for FY2018.

<u>Agricultural Education</u> – Educators, students and employers have requested \$5.3 million, an increase of \$3.5 million to the Agricultural Education (Ag Ed) line. The increase represents a restoration of the \$1.2 million reduction in funding since FY2010. The request also includes \$2.3 million for the establishment of an Agriculture Education Teacher Grant program in accordance with Public Act 99-0826. The Act, which is subject to appropriation, allows districts to apply for funding to cover 50% of the personal services costs for an agriculture education teacher. Districts establishing new agriculture education programs may apply for 100% of an agriculture teacher's personal services costs in the first two program years and 80% in years three and four. The Act also requires ISBE to create a statewide system to track agriculture education teacher hours completed pursuant to a grant.

<u>Arts & Foreign Language</u> – The FY2017 appropriation for the Arts & Foreign Language program is \$500,000.

<u>Competency-Based Pilot</u> – Public Act 99-674 requires ISBE to establish and administer a competency-based high school graduation requirements pilot program as one of a number of strategies to prepare more students for meaningful college and career opportunities. The pilot program is intended to lead to the full development and implementation of a detailed plan for a competency-based learning system for high school graduation requirements. The Superintendent may request \$1 million in funding to support grants to 12 schools as well as networking support and other technical assistance. The grant funds will offset costs of educator professional development and initial implementation.

Technology

<u>State and District Technology</u> – The FY2016 budget did not include funding for State and District Technology. The FY2017 appropriation of \$2.4 million was utilized for FY2016 obligations. Staff have requested supplemental FY2017 appropriations to resolve the shortfall. Estimates for the State and District Technology Support needs for FY2018 are being developed and will be presented as part of the Superintendent's recommendation in January.

<u>District Broadband Expansion</u> – The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) has initiated federal match funding through states for schools to expand broadband availability through its E-Rate program. The FCC currently has supplemental funds available through the program. The additional funds are subject to state dollar for dollar matching requirements and will be available in FY2018 and FY2019. Educators have requested that the ISBE budget include matching

funds to support the additional available federal funds for reimbursement of special construction costs for E-Rate eligible entities. In combination, the state and supplemental federal funds would provide reimbursement of 20% of the cost of eligible broadband special construction projects. The expansion of broadband to schools statewide is supported by a partnership with the Office of the Governor, Illinois Department of Innovation and Technology, and EducationSuperHighway. The Superintendent may request \$5 million to provide matching funds for an additional \$5 million of federal funds to support broadband expansion construction costs.

Targeted Special Education

Philip Rock Center – The Philip Rock Center is a statewide center and school for individuals who are both deaf and blind. No funding was appropriated to support the center in FY2016. The FY2017 appropriation of \$3.6 million was utilized for FY2016 costs. Staff has requested \$3.6 million in supplemental FY2017 appropriations to resolve the shortfall. Educators have requested \$3.6 million for FY2018.

Educator Quality and Support

<u>Principal Mentoring</u> - Quality leaders are recognized as a key component for school improvement and strong schools. Educators have requested \$1 million for mentoring of 500 first year Principals.

<u>Teacher Mentoring</u> - Effective teachers are one of the cornerstones in an effective school. With increasing accountability and new evaluation systems, it is critical that the approximately 10,200 new teachers entering the workforce each year receive support and professional development that will support their teaching. Educators have requested \$2 million of General Revenue funding for this line item.

<u>Teach for America</u> – The Board requested funding of \$1.9 million in FY2017. State funding has been at \$1.0 million in FY2014, FY2015, FY2016 and FY2017, an amount sufficient to continue to receive the \$1 million in private funding match. The dollar for dollar private matching funds will continue to be available in FY2017. Community members have requested \$1.9 million for this program for FY2018.

<u>Diverse Educator Recruitment</u> - Although there has been a slight increase in numbers of people of color entering the teaching force, nationally and in Illinois, the teaching force is overwhelming white and female. In 2015, 83% of teachers were white and 77% were female. Dedicated programming focused on the recruitment and retention of ethnically diverse teacher candidates has been shown to be a seminal experience for youngsters when choosing teaching as a profession. Staff has requested \$700,000 in funding for minority recruitment and mentoring programs which support students in middle and high school to take appropriate coursework and begin career exploration into the teaching field.

<u>Teacher of the Year</u> – Each year ISBE honors outstanding teachers through the "Those Who Excel" program and identifies a Teacher of the Year who serves as an ambassador for the teaching profession. Staff have requested \$130,000 to fund the travel expenses, salary, benefits, substitute costs, Space Camp, and the Next Step Conference.

<u>School Support Services</u> – No funds were appropriated for this line in FY2016. The Board requested \$5 million for Lowest Performing Schools in FY2017. The enacted budget included \$1 million in appropriation. Funding will support the bottom 20% of schools as they implement strategies and interventions that support strong leadership, effective teachers, use of time,

effective instruction, use of data, school environment, and family and community engagement. The Superintendent may request \$5 million for FY2018. Within NCLB, states were required to identify the lowest 20% of priority districts and focus schools and provide services to them. In December 2015, the reauthorization of ESEA occurred. The result of this reauthorization was the Every Students Succeeds Act (ESSA). Both ESSA and NCLB require the identification of schools that are underperforming. Within ESSA, Illinois is required to identify the lowest 5% of schools for comprehensive services as well as those schools with one or more underperforming subgroups for targeted services.

<u>Performance Evaluations</u> – The school code requires the implementation of teacher evaluation systems. This work is to be done in consultation with the Performance Evaluation Advisory Council (PEAC). In order to continue the work of PEAC, staff have requested \$200,000 in funding that will be used to fund a contract with an entity to provide facilitation services to the PEAC and to provide meeting space and necessary travel reimbursement to those stakeholders who may need assistance in order to attend the required meetings.

<u>National Board Certification</u> – The FY2017 appropriation for National Board Certification is \$1 million. The funds provide for support of teachers and school counselors seeking National Board Certification with priority given to educators in schools on Early Academic Warning or Watch status or who serve in schools with 50% or more low-income students. Educators have requested flat funding for FY2018.

Other Statewide District Categorical Assistance

<u>School District Consolidation Incentives</u> - Preliminary estimates for FY2018 indicate that \$3.6 million is required to fund incentives for school district reorganization through consolidations or annexations. Included in the preliminary estimate is funding for School District Reorganization Feasibility Studies. A final estimate of the appropriation needed to fund the obligation will be included in the Superintendent's Recommendation.

District Interventions

Educators, community members and district volunteers have requested supplemental funding for the two ISBE intervention school districts, East St Louis SD 189 and North Chicago CUSD 187. Both academic and fiscal improvements have been made in both school districts, however both districts remain encumbered with debt service payments as a result of decisions made prior to state intervention. These debt service payments require that funding intended for providing opportunities for children in need be utilized for debt service. The Superintendent may recommend \$6,560,200 in funding for district interventions.

Student Health and Safety Initiatives

<u>Truant Alternative and Optional Education</u> - The FY2017 budget included an appropriation for this program that was over 42.7% less than the FY2009 appropriation. It should be noted that Public Act 99-0456 may increase the demand for these services. The Act requires school officials to limit expulsions and suspensions to the greatest extent possible. Educators and students have requested that the line be funded at \$14,500,000 which amounts to an increase over FY2017 of \$3,000,000 or 26%.

<u>Alternative Learning/Regional Safe Schools</u> – Between FY2009 and FY2017, funding for this program was reduced by 66%. Educators and students have requested funding of \$11,300,000 which amounts to an increase over FY2017 of \$5,000,000 or 79%.

<u>Homeless Education</u> - Staff have requested \$3 million for the program. The number of homeless students as reported by districts was 53,733 in FY2016. Funding will provide assistance, support services, outreach and advocacy needed for homeless students to remain in school and have equal access to the same free, appropriate public education as provided to other children and youth.

<u>Educator Misconduct</u> – FY2016 funding for this program was not appropriated. The Board requested \$250,000 in funding for the Educator Misconduct Investigations program in FY2017 to support the investigation and adjudication of educator misconduct complaints. The FY2017 appropriation amounted to \$179,900. Staff is requesting \$250,000 in FY2018.

Focus on the Community

<u>Healthy Community Incentive Fund</u> – The Board recommended a \$15 million dollar appropriation in FY2017 to enable school districts to take a lead role in developing cross-sector partnerships as centers of collective impact. Community members have requested \$15 million for FY2018.

<u>After School Matters</u> – Community members have requested \$2.4 million for After School Matters. The After School Matters program provides programming to high school students using the apprenticeship model to engage the students in learning skills in arts, communications, science, sports and technology.

<u>Southwest Organizing Project</u> – The Board recommended \$2 million funding in FY2017. The enacted budget included \$1.5 million for the Southwest Organizing Project. The funding supports the Parent Mentoring Program under which community based organizations partner with local schools to recruit and train parents to assist teachers in the classroom. Educators and parents have requested \$2 million for FY2018.

Operations Budget

The FY2016 enacted budget did not include a general funds administration appropriation. The GRF Administration appropriation of \$22.7 million for FY2017, which was \$721,500 less than the Board's request, included language allowing its use for both FY2017 and FY2016 costs. Staff have requested supplemental funding for FY2017. The FY2017 administration budget amounted to 0.3% of the Board's total General Funds budget.

Staff are currently developing a FY2018 budget request for the Agency Operations Budget that will be included in the Superintendent's recommendation that will be presented in January.

Other Funding Commitments

Any reductions in the FY2018 ISBE budget should consider the effect of Federal Maintenance of Fiscal Effort (MOFE) requirements that leverage federal funding. These include the Child Nutrition Programs, Mandated Categorical Special Education Reimbursements and Career and Technical Education. Also, certain programs such as the Tax Equivalent Grant are required by statute.

The Child Nutrition programs have two MOFE requirements. The first is a matching requirement for the use of administrative funds. The level of funds required for the administrative match is \$221,414. The second match is for the payment (reimbursement to schools) for meals served. The Illinois Free Lunch and Breakfast funds are used to maintain the required MOFE. The level of funds required for the reimbursement match is approximately \$9 million.

The MOFE related to the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act requires a state not to reduce the amount of its financial support for special education and related services for children with disabilities, or reduce funds otherwise made available due to the excess cost of educating children with disabilities, below that amount of support for the preceding fiscal year. If it does, the allocation of funds to a state may be reduced in the subsequent fiscal year by the same amount by which the State fails to meet the requirement. This calculation is reliant upon appropriations received by the Illinois Department of Juvenile Justice and Illinois Department of Rehabilitation Services.

Funding for the Early Childhood Block Grant and the Free-Reduced Lunch Program is included in the state match portion used by the Department of Human Services to secure federal Temporary Assistance to Needy Families funding.

In accordance with the School Code (105 ILCS 5/18-4.4) ISBE is required to provide Tax Equivalent Grants to make up for lost property tax revenues due to state property ownership in the Chaney-Monge School District 88. Without changes in Illinois statute, this funding need will remain in the Fiscal Year 2018 ISBE Budget.

Federal Funding

Staff is developing a budget request which will provide sufficient spending authority to allow for disbursement of all federal grant funds, including those carried over from previous grant years.

Next Steps

Staff will present the Superintendent's FY2018 budget recommendation for consideration by the Board at its January meeting based upon feedback from the Board. Once the Board gives final approval to the FY2018 Budget Recommendation, that recommendation will be forwarded to the Governor and the General Assembly.

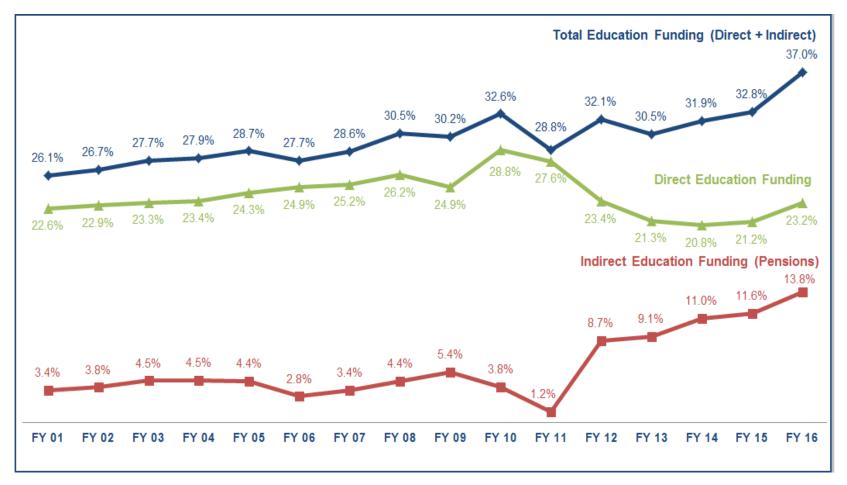

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Illinois State Board of Education Meeting 100 Randolph St. Chicago, IL November 18, 2016

ROLL CALL Curt Bradshaw called the meeting to order at 9:10 a.m. Dr. Tony Smith was in attendance and a quorum was present.

Assessment for Teachers (PPAT) Assessment as an alternative to edTPA.

Curt Bradshaw welcomed Regional Superintendents Jodie Scott of ROE #33 and Mark Jontry of ROE #17.

John Sanders announced his resignation from the Board due to his recent appointment as a circuit judge to the First Judicial Circuit effective December 1.

Kevin O'Mara, superintendent of School District #217, and Dr. David Schuler, regional superintendent for ROE #214, gave a presentation on their proposal for the Readiness Standards for College and Career Readiness. They discussed the idea of a framework and multiple pathways for students to become both college and career ready and provided feedback to the Board on the development of the college and career readiness framework. There were questions and discussion among Board members.

CONSENT AGENDA

Lula Ford moved that the State Board of Education approve the consent agenda as stated. Melinda LaBarre seconded the motion and it passed unanimously with a roll call vote.

Following questions and discussion among Board members and ISBE staff, the following motions were approved by action taken in the consent agenda motion.

Approval of Minutes

The State Board of Education approves the minutes for the October 20, 2016, Board meeting.

Rules for Initial Review

Part 1 (Public Schools Evaluation, Recognition or Supervision)

Students receiving this certification must complete eight globally focused courses, participate in at least one globally focused service learning activity or experience, participate in a global collaboration or dialogue, and complete and pass the Global Scholar Capstone Performance-Base Assessment. Globally focused courses must address world issues, perspectives, concerns, or culture throughout the duration of the course. Examples of globally focused courses include world languages; world geography; literature of another country, region, or culture; and international agriscience or agriculture. Other courses may qualify if they meet the listed criteria. Eligible service learning opportunities must be approved by the Global Scholar Committee and must be tied to the student's coursework and align with the Illinois Learning Standards. The global collaboration/dialogue must allow the student to demonstrate his/her ability to effectively communicate with peers whose culture is significantly different. These dialogues may take place person to person, through virtual means, or as part of the service learning experience. Finally, the Global

Scholar Capstone Performance-Base Assessment requires the student to report on a question addressing a global issue or concern, indicate a research-based investigation, develop research-based conclusions and a proposal to address the global issue, communicate with at least two people impacted by the issue or with an expert on that issue, create an artifact (e.g., video, painting, presentation) demonstrating his/her research, take action to affect change relating to the issue or concern, and reflect on his/her entire experience. The assessment will be evaluated on 11 criteria, including the development of the global question/issue, the student's ability to gather information from global stakeholder groups, whether the research the student gathered was sufficient to answer his/her global question, and how the student engaged stakeholders to present his/her findings.

In addition, the proposed rulemaking establishes notification deadlines for participating schools to report on their intent to participate to the State Board of Education. The proposed rulemaking also establish standards for the school district's Global Scholar Committee and for scoring the student's assessments. The proposed rulemaking requires school districts to submit an annual report to the State Board no later than 30 days after the end of the school year. School districts must make information regarding the Global Scholar Certificate available on their websites. Surveys must be distributed to students and educators participating in the Global Scholar Certificate program to evaluate the program as a whole.

The State Board of Education hereby authorizes the State Superintendent to authorize solicitation of public comment on the proposed rulemaking for Public Schools Evaluation, Recognition and Supervision (23 Illinois Administrative Code 1), including publication of the proposed amendments in the *Illinois Register*.

Part 1 (Public Schools Evaluation, Recognition or Supervision)

The proposed administrative rules establish the standards for applying for the Pilot Program. All applications must include:

- the cover packet with all the information in Section 20 of the Act;
- a narrative providing a general description of the school district's plan for implementing the Pilot Program addressing the statutory requirements; and
- a section detailing how the program will be monitored and evaluated.

Applications will be evaluated using the following criteria for review:

- strength of local commitment (20 points);
- prior professional development and stakeholder engagement (20 points);
- quality of proposed plan (50 points [project goals, 10 points; project narrative, 25 points; evaluation, 15 points]); and
- diversity points (10 points [school district type, up to 2 points; school district size, up to 2 points; geographical location, up to 2 points; plan approach, up to 4 points]).

The State Superintendent will notify approved school districts no later than 45 days after the close of the application period. Participating school districts must submit reports to the State Board assessing the implementation of the program along with any recommendations for modifications.

Finally, pursuant to Section 25(d) of the Act, the State Superintendent may remove a participating school district from the Pilot Program. The State Superintendent will consider the school district's failure to abide by the conditions submitted in its application when deciding to remove a school district:

The State Board of Education hereby authorizes the State Superintendent to authorize the solicitation of public comment on the proposed rulemaking for Public Schools Evaluation, Recognition and Supervision (23 Illinois Administrative Code 1).

Rules for Adoption

Part 1 (Public Schools Evaluation, Recognition or Supervision)

This rulemaking will provide a more general website address to access the FitnessGram testing protocols and, when applicable, the Brockport Physical Fitness Testing protocols all schools are required to use to assess the physical fitness levels of students. This rulemaking also extends the deadline from May 1 to June 30 for schools to report data. Schools voiced concern to staff that a May 1 reporting deadline means assessments would need to be taken by early April in order to report to districts so that districts in turn had time to report to ISBE by May 1. Pushing the due date back to June 30 not only allows schools more time to assess closer to the end of school year and the end of instructional period but also aligns with when schools are required to report related physical health data, such as dental and vision data, in IWAS.

Program staff determined that calculating "Needs Improvement/High Risk" for aerobic capacity is not part of the free version in FitnessGram. This language is being removed from the proposed rulemaking in keeping with the task force's intent that districts should not incur costs with this physical fitness assessment.

The State Superintendent recommends that the State Board of Education adopts the proposed rulemaking for Public Schools Evaluation, Recognition or Supervision (23 Illinois Administrative Code 1) amending the Brockport Physical Fitness Test Manual web address, extending the date to report data to ISBE to June 30, and removing the proposed reporting requirement for "Needs Improvement/High Risk" for aerobic capacity.

Further, the Board authorizes the State Superintendent of Education to make technical and nonsubstantive changes as the State Superintendent may deem necessary in response to suggestions or objections of the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules.

The State Superintendent will consider the school district's failure to abide by the conditions submitted in its application when deciding to remove a school district: The Superintendent recommends that the State Board of Education adopt the emergency rulemaking for Public Schools Evaluation, Recognition and Supervision (23 Illinois Administrative Code 1).

Part 650 (Charter Schools)

The proposed amendments are technical amendments clarifying the State Superintendent does not certify material modifications to charter agreement. This rulemaking removes the word "revision" from the text.

The State Board of Education hereby authorizes the State Superintendent to adopt the proposed rulemaking for Charter Schools (23 Illinois Administrative Code 650), removing "revision" from the text.

Further, the Board authorizes the State Superintendent of Education to make technical and nonsubstantive changes as the State Superintendent may deem necessary in response to suggestions or objections of the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules.

Contracts and Grants

Praxis Performance Assessment for Teachers (PPAT) Assessment

The Educator Effectiveness Division requests the Board to authorize the State Superintendent to enter into a sole source contract with Educational Testing Service for the purpose of administering the Praxis Performance Assessment for Teachers (PPAT[™]) assessment.

The State Board of Education hereby authorizes the State Superintendent to enter into a sole source contract with Educational Testing Service for the purpose of administering PPAT.

USDA Foods Warehousing and Distribution

The Nutrition and Wellness Division requests the Board to authorize the State Superintendent to release a Request for Sealed Proposal (RFSP) and award a contract to the lowest cost responsible offeror with the expertise in the handling, delivery, and storage of food commodities. The total award will not exceed \$2.5 million for one year or a maximum of \$12.5 million over a five-year period covering activities from July 2017 – June 2022.

The State Board of Education hereby authorizes the State Superintendent to release an RFSP and award to the highest scored responsible offeror for the purpose of entering into a contract for the handling, storage, and delivery of U.S. Department of Agriculture food commodities. The contract would be a five-year term beginning in July 2017 and ending in June 2022. Funding would be up to \$2.5 million for each year contingent upon a sufficient appropriation for a maximum total not to exceed \$12.5 million.

Education Purchasing Program

Pursuant to Section 28A-10 of the School Code [105 ILCS 5/28A-10], the Illinois State Board of Education is required to establish an education purchasing program (EPP). The administrative rules governing the EPP further provide for the creation of an EPP and the establishment of the process by which ISBE will certify education purchasing contracts. Under the program, the State Board shall designate itself or another entity to act as a state education purchasing entity to form and designate statewide education master contracts and to certify education purchasing contracts for key categories identified and defined by the State Board. The state education purchasing entity shall provide master contract and education purchasing contract information and pricing to school districts. The Fiscal Support Services Division requests the Board to authorize the State Superintendent to release a RFSP and award a contract to the highest qualified responsible offeror with the expertise and experience of providing various supplies and services contracts to educational entities. The award will not have any cost to the State Board of Education. Educational entities, including school districts, Regional Offices of Education, and charter schools, may purchase supplies, materials,

equipment, or services without the necessity of engaging in bid solicitation at the local level from the contracts that have been certified by the State Board of Education. The initial term of this contract will be for five years with an optional five-year renewal period.

The State Board of Education hereby authorizes the State Superintendent to release a RFSP and award to the highest qualified responsible offeror with the expertise and experience of providing various supplies and services contracts to educational entities for the purpose of entering into a contract. The contract would be an initial term of five years. An optional five-year renewal term may be exercised after the initial term.

Purpose of Agenda Item

The Title Grant Administration Division requests authorization from the State Superintendent to redirect unused 2015 Title I funds and enter into an agreement with the College Board to pay Advanced Placement (AP) test fees for low-income students. This will allow approximately 34,000 AP tests to be taken at a fee of \$53. Normal test fee is \$92. The College Board will receive a grant of \$1.8 million in total for the May 2017 test fees.

<u>Relationship to the State Board's Strategic Plan and Implications for the Agency and</u> <u>School Districts</u>

This proposal aligns with Goal 1 of the Board's goals.

- Goal 1: Every child in each public school system in the State of Illinois deserves to attend a system wherein . . .
 - Ninety percent or more of ninth-grade students are on track to graduate with their cohort.
 - Ninety percent or more of students graduate from high school ready for college and career.

Background Information

Federal fiscal year 2017 funds were allocated to cover the cost of AP exams in May 2016 as part of the transition from No Child Left Behind to the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). Further, as part of ESSA, the traditional AP Test Fee Program was eliminated effective with the May 2017 test. This has created a gap in funding as the May 2017 exam occurs two months prior to when districts typically receive federal funds in July. This gap has made it necessary to identify an alternative funding source to ensure that all low-income students are able to access and complete AP exams.

Past practice has allowed ISBE to reallocate unused Title I dollars to districts. In this case, due to the gap in funding for the May 2017 exams as well as the elimination of the AP Test Fee Program, \$1.8 million is being requested for a grant to the College Board to ensure that low-income students have access to these exams.

Title I AP Test Fee Program funding will enable ISBE to continue to ensure that eligible lowincome students will have access to AP exams in spring 2017. ISBE considers the participation of these students to be a significant step toward improving their educational opportunities and potentially increasing achievement. Moreover, the participation of Illinois in the Lead Higher Initiative supports the work of ISBE and local districts to increase access to educational opportunities through participation in AP offerings.

Financial Background

Each year, approximately \$5 million in Title I funding gets returned to the state from districts in excess carryover or unallocated dollars. ISBE annually reallocates those dollars using various parameters to the districts. This year, ISBE would like to use \$1.8 million of Title I reallocation funding to cover the cost of AP fees for low-income students.

Section 4107 of ESSA authorizes Local Education Agencies to use FY 2017 Student Support and Academic Enrichment Grant funds to cover a portion of each AP exam taken by low-income students in school years 2016-17 and 2017-18.

Budget Implications: State support is critical because funding for low-income students to take AP tests is limited to the discretion of districts as well as to the funds available to districts for this opportunity.

Purpose of Agenda Item

The Center for School Improvement requests that the Board review and act upon the Governor's recommendation for an appointment to the State Charter School Commission (hereinafter also referred to as the "Commission").

Relationship to/Implications for the State Board's Strategic Plan

The Commission is responsible for authorizing high-quality charter schools throughout Illinois, particularly schools designed to expand opportunities for at-risk students. The Commission is empowered to consider the appeals of proposals that have been denied and charter agreements that have been revoked or not renewed by a local school board, approve quality charter school applications and deny weak or inadequate applications, monitor the performance and legal compliance of charter schools authorized by the Commission, and determine whether each charter school authorized by the Commission merits renewal, nonrenewal, or revocation. The performance of these responsibilities directly relates to all three goals of the State Board's Strategic Plan.

Expected Outcome(s) of Agenda Item

It is expected the Board will make one appointment to the State Charter School Commission to fill a vacant seat due to a commissioner's resignation with a term that expires October 31, 2018.

Background Information

Members of the State Charter School Commission are to collectively possess strong experience and expertise in public and nonprofit governance, management and finance, public school leadership, higher education, assessments, curriculum and instruction, and public education law. In addition, all members of the Commission must have demonstrated understanding of and a commitment to public education, including without limitation charter schooling. At least three members must have past experience with urban charter schools.

As required by Article 27A-7.5 of the *School Code*, the State Board of Education appointed the initial nine members of the State Charter School Commission at its September 28, 2011, Board meeting. To establish staggered terms of office, terms of office were set as follows: (i) the initial term of office for three Commission members was four years and thereafter shall be four years; (ii) the initial term of office for another three members was three years and thereafter shall be four years and thereafter shall be four years. The Commission currently has two vacancies due to the

resignations of Commissioners Sylvia Sykes on February 9, 2016, and Aneesh Sohoni on November 11, 2016. In accordance with the staggered terms of office, Commissioner Sykes' term would have expired on October 31, 2018, and Commissioner Sohoni's term would have expired on October 31, 2018.

In the case of term expiration, the statute requires the Governor to propose a slate of candidates to the State Board 60 days prior to the end of the term, with final appointments made by the State Board from such slate. For any other Commission vacancy, such as a commissioner's resignation, the statute requires the State Board to appoint a member for the remaining portion of the term. The State Superintendent has received two candidates from the Governor's Office (see Governor's Office Recommendation) to replace the vacancies left by Commissioners Sykes and Sohoni. Since the recommendation was received, one of the candidates -- Shanti M. Elangovan -- has declined due to new employment. The following recommendation is being made:

• Lisa A. Schuchart, senior talent consultant, self-employed

The Governor's Office is in the process of identifying a potential candidate to replace the vacancy left by Commissioner Sohoni.

Purpose of Agenda Item

The purpose of this item is to provide a summary of the agency's rulemaking activities that are anticipated in the last six months of fiscal year 2017. A report summarizing the anticipated activity for the first six months of the current fiscal year was presented at the June Board meeting. No action is needed.

Background Information

The rulemaking activities of the agency are summarized on a six-month basis and published in the *Illinois Register* to elicit public comment, as is required pursuant to Section 5-60 of Illinois Administrative Procedure Act [5 ILCS 100]. This report, in a chart format, summarizes the rulemakings published in the *Illinois Register* in the order in which they will be presented to the Board for its initial review and authorization to release the proposals for public comment. Additionally, estimated dates of Board adoption and anticipated effective dates are provided.

Please note that the dates presented for the Board's initial review are merely estimates. Competing Board priorities, complexity of rulemakings, progress of legislation, and other unanticipated circumstances may delay a rulemaking's drafting or cause it to be tabled.

Rulemaking Activities Anticipated for the Remainder of FY 2017

The chart below presents a summary of all rulemaking activities that are anticipated for the Board's initial review in the last six months of FY 2017. These are organized in chronological order of presentation to the Board. "DIBR" stands for "Date of Initial Board Review," i.e., the month in which the State Board will authorize the initiation of the given rulemaking. All Part numbers refer to Title 23 of the Illinois Administrative Code unless otherwise noted.

Also included in the chart for the Board's planning purposes are any rulemakings that the Board will consider for adoption in the last six months of FY 2017 that were initially reviewed earlier in FY 2017.
