Upcoming Free WIDA Workshops

 ELD Standards in Action: Differentiation Workshop (Dynamic Differentiation for Linguistically Diverse Students)—1 day workshop
 October 6, 2015 (Champaign area); OR

October 20, 2015 (LaSalle/Peru area)

English language learners need instruction that is differentiated for their diverse proficiency levels. Participants will collaborate on how to customize instruction for ELLs utilizing WIDA tools while taking academic language into consideration. This workshop is appropriate for classroom teachers, English language specialists, administrators, curriculum development specialists, and support staff who are familiar with WIDA Standards.

Participants will be able to:

- Define what language differentiation means in the instruction and assessment of ELLs
- Describe how scaffolds and supports engage ELLs at various levels in the language and content of a lesson
- Describe how content, product, process, and environment are taken into account for language differentiation
- Describe the relationship between proficiency level and domain in differentiation

2) ELD Standards in Action: Unit Planning—2 day workshop October 7-8, 2015 (Springfield area); OR

October 21-22, 2015 (Chicago area)

Participants will utilize resources from the WIDA ELD Standards Framework to plan units of instruction which integrate content and language standards. In school teams, participants will engage in identifying the academic language demands embedded in state content standards, planning and designing a custom unit of instruction, identifying ways to support and differentiate for language development; and planning and designing methods for formative language assessment. Teams will have ample opportunities for developing materials; therefore participants are encouraged to bring curriculum materials and student ACCESS for ELLs scores.

Participants will be able to:

- Discuss how to identify the academic language demands of content standards (e.g. CCSS, NGSS)
- Explain how to integrate content standards and the WIDA ELD Standards when planning instruction and assessment
- Formulate a plan for instruction which includes learning goals for both content and language
- Formulate a plan for assessment for content learning and language development

Department of Justice Releases Maps of Individuals with Limited English Proficiency (LEP) This month marked 15th anniversary of Executive Order 13166, "Improving Access to Services for Persons with Limited English Proficiency," requiring federal programs and activities to provide

meaningful access to limited English proficient (LEP) individuals. In honor of this anniversary, the Department of Justice's Civil Rights Division released several mapping resources that help identify the concentration of LEP populations at national, state, judicial district, and county levels: The "Language Map App," allows users to view and download data on languages spoken by LEP populations, using an interactive map. Printable maps and other federal language mapping tools are available at lep.gov/maps.
