FARM TO SCHOOL GRANTS

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) announced the official release of the fiscal year (FY) 2024 Farm to School Grant Program Request for Applications (RFA). You can get started on an application at https://www.fns.usda.gov/f2s/farm-school-grant-program.

The USDA will award up to \$12 million in competitive grants to eligible entities through the grant program this fiscal year. Each grant will help implement farm to school programming that increases access to local food in eligible schools, connects children with agriculture for better health, and

Preparing for an Administrative Review

The <u>list of School Food Authorities Tentatively Selected for School Year 2023-24 Administrative Reviews</u> is now available on the ISBE <u>Monitoring and Review Information webpage</u>.

The Administrative Review is an assessment conducted by the Illinois States Board of Education (ISBE) of the School Food Authority's (SFA) administration of the NSLP and SBP, and other School Nutrition Programs. The objectives of the Administrative Review are to determine whether the SFA meets program requirements, provide technical assistance, secure any needed corrective action, and assess fiscal action, if applicable.

Important P-EBT Announcements

The U.S. Department of Agriculture authorized administrative funding to assist with the administrative costs associated with the administration of the School Year 2022-23 P-EBT benefits. These funds were vouchered on Sept. 27 to eligible sponsors.

ATTENTION ELIGIBLE P-EBT SCHOOL STAFF: The Illinois Department of Human Services P-EBT team may reach to eligible P-EBT schools to ensure that all eligible stude receive the correct amount of P-EBT benefits through the end of the Public Health Emergency, when P-EBT expire

For documentation of this funding, please access the FRIS inquiry system, payment report. The disbursement is listed under program code 4210, sub code BT. The funding amount per eligible sponsor is \$653 for less than 1,000 P-EBT eligible children, \$3,256 for 1,001-5,000, and \$6,180 for more than 5,000.

ATTENTION ELIGIBLE P-EBT SCHOOL STAFF: The Illinois Department of Human Services P-EBT team may reach out to eligible P-EBT schools to ensure that all eligible students receive the correct amount of P-EBT benefits through the end of the Public Health Emergency, when P-EBT expired. Data cleanup is ongoing for School Year 2021-22 and School Year 2022-23. We encourage eligible schools to work directly with the DHS P-EBT team to ensure accurate program benefits for all eligible students.
