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Grant Funds Available to Support School Breakfast Programs!

ISBE released a Request for Proposals (RFP) for School Breakfast Program (SBP) Expansion Grants. ISBE will award up to \$187,000 (\$10,000 per district with at least one qualifying school) for the purpose of increasing school breakfast participation. A "qualifying school(s)" is a school participating in NSLP that served 40 percent or more of its lunches to students eligible for free or reduced price in school year 2011-2012. Priority will be given to those SFAs with qualifying schools in which in October 2012, had at least 75 percent of the students eligible for free or reduced price school lunches under the NSLP, at least 60 percent of students participating in the lunch program, and less than 20 percent of students participating in the breakfast program. Deadline to apply is February 14, 2014. The SBP Expansion Grant RFP is posted at http://www.isbe.net/funding_opps/htmls/rfp.htm.

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Equipment Grant Funds Available to Support School Meals!

Illinois, one of six states selected by the USDA, will receive \$876,609 to issue another round of National School Lunch Program (NSLP) Equipment Assistance Grants. Priority will be given to high need schools where 50 percent or more of the enrolled students are eligible for free or reduced price meals as well as to schools that did not receive a previous NSLP Equipment Assistance grant award. 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Paid Lunch Equity: School Year (SY) 2014-2015 Calculations

Under the Paid Lunch Equity (PLE) requirement, School Food Authorities (SFAs) participating in the National School Lunch Program are to ensure sufficient funds are provided to the nonprofit school food service account for meals served to students not eligible for free or reduced price meals. There are three ways to meet this requirement:

- 1) increase prices charged for "paid" lunches,
- 2) contribute non-federal funds to the non-profit food service account, or
- 3) combination of increasing paid lunch prices and contributing non-federal funds.

SFAs must annually review their paid lunch revenue to assure compliance with the paid lunch equity requirement. When the average paid lunch price is less than the difference between the free and paid Federal reimbursement rates, the SFA must determine how they will meet the requirement—by increasing their average paid lunch price or providing funds from non-Federal sources. Therefore, for SY 2014-2015, SFAs which on average charged less than \$2.65 for paid lunches in SY 2013-2014 are required to complete the PLE Calculator to determine their new paid lunch price and/or amount to contribute.

FY2014 National School Lunch Program (NSLP) Free and Reduced-price Meal Eligibility data is now posted at <u>http://www.isbe.net/nutrition/htmls/eligibility_listings.htm</u>. This data is pulled directly from October 2013 claims submitted by NSLP sponsors. For Community Eligible Provision (CEP) schools, the data posted is the individual site CEP percentage.

If you feel there is an error with a non-CEP, the school and/or district must resubmit the free and reduced eligibility counts under "Eligibles" section and/or the enrollment count under "Statistics" section of the October 2014 claim in WINS (refer to screenshot below). SY15 Annual Order Period for USDA Foods is Approaching

The Illinois Commodity System (ICS) will be accepting orders beginning **February 15, 2014** for next school year. The order will need to be completed by **March 15, 2014**. Schools that choose to divert USDA Foods to processors should watch the ICS message board on **March 22, 2014** for important news regarding processors that are getting trucks. Orders placed with processors that do not get a truck can be changed to those processors that are getting trucks from **March 22 through March 30, 2014**. If you placed an order with a processor that didn't get a truck, that order will be deleted and your entitlement will be adjusted accordingly.

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Final Rule on Elimination of the Maximums for Grains and Meats and Allowance of Frozen Fruit with Added Sugar in the School-Based Child Nutrition Programs

On January 2, 2014, the United States Department of Agriculture published a Final Rule in the Federal Register that makes permanent the flexibility that State agencies should consider any SFA compliant with the daily and weekly ranges for grain and meat/meat alternates if documentation is compliant with the daily and weekly minimums. In addition, this final rule allows frozen fruit with added sugar to be offered within the meal pattern. Under both flexibilities, the meal pattern still requires the menu to be in compliance with the nutrient standards including the minimum and maximum calories, saturated fat and trans fat for SY2013-2014. Beginning with SY2014-2015, the sodium standard is required. This Final Rule is effective March 4, 2014. Guidance materials will be updated in the near future to reflect this permanent change. 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New Food Handler Training Requirement in Illinois

In Illinois, anyone meeting the definition of a food employee/food handler will need to have food handler training. Food employee/handler means an individual working with unpackaged food, food equipment or utensils, or food-contact surfaces. All food handlers working in a non-restaurant (nursing homes, licensed day care homes and facilities, hospitals, <u>schools</u>, long-term care facilities and retail food stores) will need to have training by July 1, 2016. New employees have 30 days from date of employment to obtain training. Those food handlers working in schools, nursing homes, licensed day care home and facilities, hospitals and long-term care facilities will need to receive training every 3 years.

Anyone can teach food handler training courses. It is important to remember, it is not who is teaching the training, but that you receive the appropriate training based on whether you work in a restaurant or non-restaurant. Food handlers working in non-restaurants can take any food handler training course that has been registered and approved by the Illinois Department of

Public Health (IDPH). Non-restaurant food handler training is not transferable between employers.

All food handlers working in a restaurant will need to have training by July 1, 2014. *"Restaurant" means any business that is primarily engaged in the sale of ready-to-eat food for immediate consumption. Where "primarily engaged" means having sales of ready-to-eat food for immediate consumption comprising of at least 51% of the total sales, excluding the sale of liquor, as defined in Section 3 of the Food Handling Regulation Enforcement Act. For the purposes of this definition, restaurants would include concessions and other food service establishments where food is intended for immediate or on-site consumption.*

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Changes to the Illinois Food Service Sanitation Manager Certification (FSSMC) Program

This year will bring many changes to the Illinois Food Service Sanitation Manager Certification (FSSMC) Program.

January 1, 2014: The FSSMC exam provided by the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) was eliminated and IDPH Regional Offices no longer offer exams at their locations. Anyone wishing to take a course and/or exam should contact an Illinois approved instructor and can be found on the Department's website <u>http://dph.illinois.gov/fssmccourses</u>.

July 1, 2014: Training hour requirement is reduced from 15 hours to 8 hours, inclusive of exam. The new 8 hour syllabus (7 hours of training and 1 hour for exam) has been proposed and is being reviewed by the Board of Health. The new syllabus will be provided to instructors via the web portal once it is approved.

Refresher courses also end on July 1, 2014 and anyone wishing to recertify will need to take an 8 hour course and exam. Anyone with a FSSMC expiring on or after November 1, 2014 will need to verify with their instructor that they are eligible to take a refresher. Instructors have a "Refresher Course Eligibility Chart" for reference.

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Discretionary Elimination of Reduced Price Charges in the School Meal Programs

The USDA wishes to remind schools that they may use funds from nonprofit school food service account to lower or eliminate reduced price student meal charges.

At the discretion of the School Food Authorities (SFA), participating schools and institutions that are not operating a special provision may offer meals at no cost to students who would otherwise qualify for reduced price benefits. The expenditures associated with covering the reduced price student payments may be funded from the nonprofit food service account. Schools electing to take advantage of this flexibility continue to receive Federal reimbursement based on meals claimed by students in the reduced price category. Only paid students will be charged for meals. SFAs are permitted to implement this option selectively between the Programs (National School Lunch and School Breakfast) and serving sites they operate.

Alternatively, SFAs might consider decreasing the reduced price charge rather than eliminating it entirely, or decreasing it incrementally to better ensure the integrity of the nonprofit school food service account. Lowering or eliminating the reduced price charge will lessen or remove any financial barriers to access that these students might experience. SFAs are advised to conduct a thorough analysis of their current and projected operating costs to ensure that they are able to maintain operations and meal quality without the revenue generated from charging students for reduced price meals.
