#### Help Fight Hunger This Summer—Utilize the Summer Food Service Program in Your Community

Are there children in your community who will go hungry this summer? Children from low-income families are eligible to receive free or reduced-price meals during the school year through the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs. But those programs end when school ends for the summer. The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) helps fill the hunger gap.

Illinois, among other states, has not participated in this program as fully as possible. During summer 2005, Illinois had 115 sponsors and 1,424 sites that participated in SFSP. However, the federal reimbursement dollars declined approximately 10 percent from summer 2004, which means there were less meals served this past summer.

Who can be a sponsor?

- · School food authorities
- · Local government entities
- · Private nonprofit organizations
- Colleges that participate in the National Youth Sports Program
- · Non-profit residential camps

SFSP is the single largest federal resource available for local sponsors who want to combine a feeding program with a summer activity program. The above type of organizations may apply to The Illinois State Board of Education, who administers SFSP, to sponsor the program. All sponsors receive training before starting the program to learn how to plan, operate, and monitor a successful food service program.

Why not take advantage of this valuable resource to provide nutritious meals to children in your community? In addition to becoming a sponsor, you can partner with sponsors in your community to *adopt* a site.

#### Batch Files

For sponsors who submit site claims using a batch file please note the

batch file format has been updated to include fields for the area eligible Snack Enrollment and claim contact information (name, phone number, etc.). Please review the instructions/ layout for the batch files on our website and update your formats as necessary.

Useful Reminders:

- The federal fiscal (FY) year runs October through September, so be sure you are on the correct fiscal year when submitting claims. For example, September 2005 claims are in FY2005 and October 2005 claims are in FY2006.
- It is recommended claims be submitted by the 10<sup>th</sup> of each month. We process claims for payment each week, so the sooner you submit your claim, the sooner you will receive reimbursement. Do NOT wait until the last day to submit claims. If you run into problems with the claim or your computer, you may not have time to get the claim submitted by the due date. Claims must be submitted no later than 60 calendar days after the end of the claiming month in order to be paid. Below is a chart detailing when claims are due each month.

#### Action for Healthy Kids Reports Free to Download

Action for Healthy Kids (AFHK) recently posted two reports related to school wellness practices and nutrition and physical activity. A brief summary of each report is below and full reports are available at www.actionforhealthykids.org.

The Learning Connection: The Value of Improving Nutrition and Physical Activity in Our School—Action for Healthy Kids' exclusive landmark report documents how the excessive rise in poor nutrition, inactivity, and weight problems is adversely affecting academic achievement and possibly costing schools millions of dollars each year. The report calls on schools to work with partners to take immediate action to address the issue, and points to current best practices in schools, school districts, and states.

An Action for Healthy Kids Report: Parents' Views on School Wellness Practices—AFHK conducted a national survey with parents of school-aged children to learn the views parents have on the issues of nutrition and physical activity. A gap exists between what parents believe is happening and what is actually happening with nutrition and physical activity in schools.

# **Top Ten Places Germs Lurk in Schools**

The National Sanitation Foundation (NSF) has released a list of the top ten places where germs lurk in two Michigan schools and the results may surprise you. It was **not** on student's hands.

Bacterial samples were collected directly from actual classrooms and cafeterias. The scientific report indicates a classroom drinking water fountain spigot contains over 2 million colony forming units (CFUs) while a student's hands contained 1,500.
