WHAT'S INSIDE

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Dear Colleagues:

The biggest controversy of my time as superintendent/chief executive officer at Elgin District U-46 happened just two years into my tenure, and it concerned a transgender student. Early in the 2016-17 school year, we found ourselves working to meet the requests of several of our transgender students, one of whom requested access to locker room facilities that matched their gender identity. With the well-being of all students top of mind, we made arrangements with the transgender student's family for their child to change clothes in a private stall, and we ensured the locker room would continue to be supervised by an adult. We made plans to provide an alternative changing location for any other student who felt uncomfortable, had

conversations with the staff, and provided professional development for employees at that school. I also notified all our board members.

What we did not do was put the question up for a vote. There was simply no reason to do so. We already had a policy that provided equal opportunities for all students, and it aligned with state and federal laws. Board meetings became a bit more heated for a short time, but looking back, I take much pride in the fact that the educators at U-46 stayed true to our mission to stand up for and actively include all kids.

June is Pride Month – the time we celebrate how much wiser and happier society has become by providing equal rights for LGBTQIA+ people. I feel like we've made a giant step forward in the years since our 2016 locker room controversy. For example, an art and design class at Homewood-Flossmoor High School developed community-based art projects, presented the proposals to village officials, then implemented the options officials chose. They are honoring Pride month by yarn bombing trees with colors from the LGBTQIA+ flag and stenciling messages on sidewalks like "Humankind. Be both."

June is also the month in which we celebrate Juneteenth, the holiday that marks the day slavery was finally abolished – June 19, 1865. Yes, the Emancipation Proclamation had been signed almost three years earlier, but that news had been withheld from enslaved people in Texas. It wasn't until Union troops arrived on Galveston Island that enslaved people found out they were officially free. What a wonderful historical moment to celebrate.

I'm embarrassed to admit that, until recently, I was woefully unaware of Juneteenth. I learned about it in 2020 when, like many people, I was moved by the murder of George Floyd to begin educating myself more deeply about the social history of our nation. Discovering that I'd had a blind spot about such a major moment in history makes me realize that there are undoubtedly many more. We don't know what we don't know. None of us do.

And that's precisely the purpose of holidays and heritage months: to bring awareness to and give each of us the opportunity to learn more about the contributions, struggles, and rich histories of our fellow Americans. As educators, we are – by definition – accustomed to the role of teaching. But we must also remain open and committed to continuing to learn.

POSTSECONDARY SUPPORT AT DISTRICT U-46

The mission of School District U-46 in Elgin is to "be a great place for all students to learn, all teachers to teach, and all employees to work. All means all." With six high schools and nearly 12,000 high school students, achieving this goal of equity is no small task. The district partnered with OneGoal to advance postsecondary outcomes and to increase college and career readiness for its students.

District leaders at U-46 evaluated their postsecondary advising and preparation program and found that the percentage of students attending college was not meeting district goals. In fact, a survey of students showed that one in five disagreed that all students are encouraged to go to college. A survey of teachers found that a majority reported they did not think postsecondary was part of their work.

OneGoal has identified seven focus areas related to a district's postsecondary practices. Each district working with OneGoal selects 1-2 areas for improvement. U-46 had the opportunity to work with OneGoal through ISBE's partnership, funded by federal pandemic relief funds, and selected Continuous Improvement Cycles and Adult Capacity Building as its areas of focus.

Seeing an increase in the number of students completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid and more students with a documented postsecondary plan have been big wins for the district. Lead Counselor Alexa Charsha-Hahn also points to a larger cultural shift in the district since it began partnering with OneGoal: "The conversations that counselors are having with students has changed, and the language we're using has helped us translate the options available to our students in really meaningful ways."

DEADLINE EXTENDED! FY 2024 EARLY CHILDHOOD BLOCK GRANT APPLICATIONS DUE JUNE 30

The FY 2024 Early Childhood Block Grant application deadline has been extended to **4 p.m. June 30**. The FY 2024 state budget includes an additional \$75 million to expand access to preschool across the state. The application prioritizes providers in identified preschool deserts (/Pages/ECBG-Preschool-Deserts.aspx) where low-income children lack sufficient access to publicly funded preschool. FISCAL YEAR 2023 SITE-BASED EXPENDITURE REPORTING: SUBMISSION DATES AND GUIDANCE HIGHLIGHTS WEBINAR

The FY 2023 Site-Based Expenditure Reporting submission window will run **July 3 – Aug. 17**. An updated reporting guidance document (/Documents/FY23-SBER-Guidance.pdf) is available on the ISBE Site-Based Expenditure webpage. The reporting guidance reflects only minor changes from last year's FY 2022 guidance. Changes primarily concern enhancements to the IWAS reporting system and edits to improve clarity and support accurate reporting. The designated Reporting Entities remain the same and will follow similar reporting rules.

District leaders are invited to register for the FY 2023 Site-Based Expenditure Reporting Guidance Highlights webinar (https://register.gotowebinar.com/register/1511267067905391456), which will take place at **1:30 p.m. June 22**. This webinar will provide key information about the FY 2023 reporting window, including dates, approaches to submissions, IWAS enhancement, and highlights from the 2023 guidance.

ISBE is also aware of a new federal requirement to report school finance information, known as the School-Level Finance Survey. We are assessing this new requirement and will provide a brief update during the webinar.

FY 2024 School District/Joint Agreement Budget forms must be submitted to ISBE no later than Oct. 31.

Section 17-1 (105 ILCS 5/17-1) of the School Code requires school districts/joint agreements to electronically submit their adopted annual budget to ISBE and requires school districts that adopt an unbalanced budget in the operating funds to complete a Deficit Reduction Plan to balance the budget within three years. School districts that have unbalanced operating funds for their FY 2023 Annual Financial Report are required to submit a Deficit Reduction Plan as well.

New submission process: Please submit the FY 2024 budgets to ISBE via IWAS (https://apps.isbe.net/iwas/asp/login.asp?js=true).

All FY 2023 amended budgets will still need to be submitted via ISBE Attachment Manager (https://sec1.isbe.net/attachmgr/default.aspx).

RESEARCH & EVALUATION

IAR, SAT, AND DLM-AA NOW AVAILABLE ON MY DATA DASHBOARD

We are excited about the recent release of new My Data Dashboard screens, which focus on the Illinois Assessment for Readiness (IAR), SAT, and Dynamic Learning Maps Alternate Assessment (DLM-AA). The new screens include historical data from school year 2018-19 to SY 2021-22 and will be updated with SY 2022-23 data after the release of the 2023 Illinois Report Card this fall.

Each screen provides extensive information not previously available from ISBE systems (securely and within Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act and Children's Online Privacy Protection Rule guidelines for the protection of students' rights to privacy).

- New metrics visualization gives users the ability to use and understand IAR, SAT, and DLM-AA data that are reported publicly at a more detailed level.
- Business rules are presented on screen for each metric, including explanations of how each are calculated, using references to *your local* data in the explanation.
- · Public Illinois Report Card data are displayed and connected directly to a student-level breakdown of those data.
- Student data is being presented for the first time by *student cohort* as well as by school year and grade level, allowing for more accurate program analysis.
- Complete student rosters allow for quick and flexible analysis of student group performance, dependent on the availability of active students within the district/school for a particular metric, including the ability to sort and filter by proficiency level at the student level.
- Data can be seen via cohort, trend, and snapshot, as well as a detailed filterable roster allowing users to analyze and dissect data at a nuanced level.
- There are additional historical data and data at all performance levels.

My Data Dashboard demonstrates ISBE's commitment the continuing development of tools that provide local districts with the resources necessary to make effective choices for the benefit of students statewide. Additional assessment reporting screens – including ACCESS and the Illinois Science Assessment – will be coming later this year as we empower you with the best information the agency has available to support your local instructional and operational decision-making.

The Parent Engagement Institute (PEI) (https://www.parentengagement.institute/mission), a partnership between Palenque LSNA (https://www.palenquelsna.org/) and the Southwest Organizing Project (https://www.swopchicago.org/), is looking for community organizations and school partnerships in Illinois to apply to start the Parent Mentor Program in their local public schools. PEI anticipates the average grant amount

Parent mentors help address persistent equity gaps in their own children's schools by volunteering in classrooms for two hours/day for at least 200 hours. The parent mentors access weekly professional development on instructional practices, mentoring from a teacher, leadership and career opportunities, and stipends. Parent mentors support each other within their cohort to pursue their dreams and unite the school community for long-term change.

The presentation then reviews best practices for the types of visuals teachers should include in their classrooms taking into account differences in factors such as race, ethnicity, gender, religion, body type, and abilities. The presentation ends with resources for teachers to increase diverse representation in their classroom content, as well as a personal call to action to 1) continuously increase their exposure to different types of people, and 2) keep an open mind to recognize and address their own biases.

The Illinois School Counselor Association (ISCA) named Lisa Delgadillo, a school counselor at Hibbard Elementary School in Chicago Public School District 299, the 2023 Illinois School Counselor of the Year. The ISCA School Counselor of the Year award recognizes full-time school counselors who have demonstrated leadership, collaborated and built relationships with all members of the school community, and advocated for the school counseling profession.

Delgadillo started work at Hibbard Elementary in 2021 and immediately demonstrated her leadership and ability to build relationships within and outside the school community. She has led numerous professional development sessions for Hibbard teachers, including trainings on how to implement Calm Classroom to mediate and de-escalate disputes and disruptive behaviors. She has also led outreach to families, working with students and family members to find resources they need outside the classroom, including clothing, living essentials and therapy resources. Prior to joining Hibbard, Delgadillo was a school counselor at Nobel Elementary School, where she partnered with Communities in Schools, a national organization dedicated to connecting schools with community resources to help students succeed in school and after graduation.
