College & Career Readiness

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With the annual Illinois State Fair (https://statefair.illinois.gov/) kicking off in Springfield this week, I am reminded that summer will soon turn into fall as the 2023-24 school year begins for our thousands of schools statewide. To spread some excitement about all things education in Illinois, ISBE will host a booth from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. daily throughout the fair Aug. 10-20 in the Governor's Tent.

Our booth, which will align to this year's Governor's Tent theme of "Growing a Bright Future in Illinois," aims to engage students, parents, and all school community members by offering resources and summer learning materials that are

sure to excite lifelong learners of every age. Some of the materials available at the booth include:

- Illinois Fair & Festivals Educator's Guide: The Illinois Fairs & Festivals Educator's Guide (https://app.air.inc/a/c0xLTav6l) contains more than 20 lessons that educators or parents/guardians can use to connect fair and festival activities with academic standards and career-related skills. - Educator Recognition Opportunities: ISBE recognizes outstanding educators through awards programs that rely on nominations and recommendations. DR. SANDERS TO JOIN GOLDIE HAWN AT AASA'S MENTAL HEALTH EVENT

State Superintendent of Education Dr. Tony Sanders will join actress Goldie Hawn at the upcoming Learning 2025 Network and Mental Health Cohort Combined Event, which is being sponsored by AASA, The School Superintendents Association. The kickoff event (https://us02web.zoom.us/meeting/register/tZUrdu-vqTkrEtWd_Sj9eM8BQg6hD0E326Lt#/registration), scheduled for **3 p.m. Aug. 14**, will feature a keynote address from Hawn, who established MindUP (https://mindup.org/) to help children all over the world develop the mental fitness necessary to thrive in school and throughout their lives. Dr. Sanders will participate in a panel discussion with the actress following her keynote. The event will also feature additional resources and a superintendent panel. The Learning 2025 Network is an AASA initiative calling for holistic redesign of the public school system by 2025. The proposal is grounded in the foundational work of the AASA Learning 2025 National Commission on Student-Centered, Equity-Focused Education. The mission of the Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) Cohort (https://www.aasa.org/professional-learning/event/2023/08/14/default-calendar/social-and-emotional-learning-cohort) is to support school district leaders as they develop and scale systemic SEL implementation plans in order to promote culturally responsive, identity-safe, and equitable classroom and school communities that best support students' social and emotional well-being, sense of connection to school, and full engagement in learning. TARGETING SOCIAL EMOTIONAL LEARNING THROUGH THE REACH INITIATIVE AT COWHERD MIDDLE SCHOOL

Cowherd Middle School in Aurora saw an opportunity amid the challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic in January 2021 to implement the Resilience Education to Advance Community Healing (REACH) Statewide Initiative. A dedicated team of 16 staff members led by Rachel Jenkins, the school's social worker, took on the task of introducing REACH to the wider Cowherd community, including students and parents.

The Cowherd REACH team began by utilizing the REACH Learning and Resource Hub, engaging with prerecorded webinars at their own pace. They then met regularly as a group to share their experiences and discuss strategies, effectively disseminating valuable insights throughout the school. The team used the Trauma Responsive Schools Implementation Assessment to better understand where to focus their efforts. The results of the assessment highlighted the need for targeted support for students and emphasized the importance of wellness within the school environment.

As a result of their targeted approach and external opportunities, Cowherd Middle School experienced a transformation in its approach to socialemotional learning. The school now emphasizes a common language supported by a mood meter in every classroom and the cafeteria, allowing everyone to address complex emotions effectively. Jenkins and her team knew that there needed to be dedicated spaces for students-- and staff -to engage in these lessons and conversations. Social-emotional learning time was built into morning schedules during which students have dedicated time for lessons about managing emotions, identifying feelings, and developing strategies to cope. There are also opportunities during various staff meetings for REACH team members to share lessons from REACH materials and help teachers who were experiencing toxic stress.

Jenkins and her team did not have to do this work alone. REACH coaches provided support as well as lessons to the larger school community. As the social worker, Jenkins was grateful to have someone to share the responsibility of bringing others along. "Sometimes, in the school environment you get stuck on the day-to-day things, and it is nice to have someone on the outside who can help reiterate the importance of this work," she said.

NEW REACH LEARNING AND RESOURCE HUB SERIES: ADVANCING RACIAL JUSTICE AND EDUCATIONAL EQUITY

A new resource is available to support schools in addressing the trauma, racism, and equity. In June 2023, the Center for Childhood Resilience conducted one-on-one interviews and a panel discussion with leaders from Illinois school districts to gain insights into their perspectives and lived experiences in advancing racial justice and educational equity within schools. As part of this Advancing Racial Justice and Educational Equity in Schools learning series, the Center for Childhood Resilience has launched several online courses to support school or district teams to initiate conversations, assess their environment, and ignite their journey toward equity and racial justice.

The online courses include downloadable guides and resources that can be incorporated into all-school professional development sessions and team meetings. They offer free Professional Educator License credit hours and continuing education credits for licensed social workers, professional counselors, and psychologists in Illinois.

SY 2023-24 LETTER OF INTENT AND APPLICATION FOR APPROVED ALTERNATE CLIMATE SURVEY

All Illinois public schools, including alternative schools that fall under a district's domain, are required to participate in a school learning conditions survey every year. To fulfill this requirement, ISBE provides the 5Essentials Survey (/Pages/5Essentials-Survey.aspx) free of charge as a tool to inform all stakeholders about the school's learning environment and to guide improvement.

However, a school district may elect to use an alternate survey of learning conditions. The approved alternate surveys for school year 2023-24 are Cognia and the Comprehensive School Climate Survey. Any district that wishes to administer an approved alternate survey must complete a letter of intent and application and email it to 5essentials@isbe.net (mailto:5essentials@isbe.net) by **Sept. 15**. Failure to submit the signed letter of intent and application to ISBE will result in the district being required to use the 5Essentials Survey.

ILLINOIS JOINS THE EXPANDING COMPUTING EDUCATION PATHWAYS ALLIANCE

We are excited to announce that Illinois is one of the seven new member states accepted into the Expanding Computing Education Pathways (ECEP) Alliance, which increases the ECEP membership to 29 states and the territory of Puerto Rico. Joining this alliance is another step for Illinois to move computer science forward.

The new states will join a network of state leaders working to untangle the complex web of factors that produce inequitable outcomes for marginalized students. States will analyze their data to identify specific student populations that have not been included in computing pathways, explore their state's educational ecosystems and policies to determine the root causes of disparities in access and participation in computer science education, and identify equity-explicit policies to address systemic barriers to broadening participation in computing.
