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One year ago, ISBE adopted our Strategic Plan (/Documents/ISBE-Strategic-Plan.pdf) and included in the plan a new tool to help districts improve equity for all students. I am excited to introduce you to the Equity Journey Continuum (/Documents/Equity-Journey-Continuum-5Ws.pdf), which will allow you to view your district's data through the lens of equity, revealing any gaps in student achievement or access to opportunities, and mapping a path toward better academic outcomes.

In January, all districts will be able to preview their Equity Journey Continuum data before it appears as a new graphic element on the 2022 Illinois Report Card. You can find more information on this fact sheet (/Documents/Equity-Journey-Continuum-5Ws.pdf) and watch for more in the weeks ahead.

Equity is not just about race. Even in districts where most students share a common ethnic background, there's still tremendous diversity: of income, learning styles, life goals, religion, gender, and family dynamics. The goal of equity is to ensure that our school system recognizes and values these differences that students bring to the classroom, meets them where they are, and provides them the specific supports they need to succeed.

I want to highlight one incredible example of equity from East St. Louis District 189. You can hear about it firsthand in the latest episode of our ISBE podcast (/podcast). In the 2019-20 school year, the district lost four middle school students to gun violence. In response, Dr. Tiffany Gholson, director of Parent and Student Support Services, created a team of social workers to respond on-scene, alongside police, to any traumatic incident involving youth, day or night. Her team works in cooperation with state and local law enforcement to intervene with victims, families, friends, witnesses, and perpetrators. This community partnership not only provides supports to students outside of school but also brings a trauma-informed approach inside the classroom. The goal is better academic, social, and life outcomes for students impacted by violence.

Equity will look different in each school community. In one, it may be providing mentors to girls taking STEM classes. In another, it may be adding preschool seats to serve more English Learners. In another, it may be implementing restorative justice to reduce suspensions and expulsions.

Equity Journey Continuum can help inform each district's own unique equity journey, serving as a beacon to illuminate areas where districts may need to increase access, add resources, or seek supports to ensure all students can achieve success. Ultimately, creating a more equitable school culture will benefit all students, all schools, and all communities.

ISBE ANNOUNCES NOFO/RFP - FY 2022 ADVANCED PLACEMENT COURSE IMPLEMENTATION - COLLEGE AND CAREER SUCCESS FOR ALL STUDENTS PROGRAM - ROUND TWO

This grant is to provide funding to eligible school districts to implement or expand Advanced Placement (AP) programs designed to offer rigorous course work necessary for all students to succeed in postsecondary education or in the workplace. Training for teachers and administrators is necessary to build capacity within schools to offer AP courses.

Eligible applicants include public school districts if they have one or more schools serving any of the Grades 6 through 12 where 40 percent or more of the students are from low-income families (i.e., eligible to receive free or reduced-price meals under the School Breakfast and Lunch Program [105 ILCS 125]). Public university laboratory schools approved by the State Board of Education, area career centers, and charter schools are eligible to apply on the same basis as school districts.

ISBE SEEKING PUBLIC COMMENT – 2021-22 ALTERNATE ASSESSMENT 1 PERCENT THRESHOLD PARTICIPATION RATE WAIVER REQUEST

Title 1 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA), as amended by the Every Student Succeeds Act of 2015 (ESSA) [ESEA §111(b)(2)(D) and 34 CFR 200.6(c) and (d)], modifies the provision that students with the most significant cognitive disabilities may participate in alternate assessments based on alternate academic achievement standards (alternate assessments). ESSA places a 1 percent threshold on the number of students who may participate in alternate assessments. States that anticipate exceeding the 1 percent threshold must submit a waiver request to the U.S. Department of Education (ED).

ISBE anticipates exceeding the 1 percent threshold for participation in the alternate assessment for school year 2021-22 and plans to submit a waiver request to ED (/Documents/2021-22-1-Percent-Threshold-Waiver-Request.pdf).

FUNDING FOR STUDENTS EXPERIENCING HOUSING INSECURITY

ISBE has announced \$38 million in federal funding to identify and support students experiencing housing insecurity, including \$33 million from the American Rescue Plan Homeless Children and Youth Part II grant. The funding will bolster schools' efforts to identify students in temporary living situations and provide them with services.

Per federal guidance, LEAs allocated less than \$5,000 in funding as stipulated by the formula are not eligible for the subgrant on their own.
