Women's History Month provides us with an opportunity to focus on the stories of women and girls like Cynthia. Women have overcome adversity, challenged naysayers, and contributed to our communities in extraordinary ways. Too often, though, textbooks overlook the accomplishments of women and literature fails to feature women and girls as protagonists. March encourages us to think critically about curricula to ensure that all students can recognize themselves in what they read and learn. When our students do not see themselves in history lessons, it makes it harder for them to believe that their voices are important and that they, too, can make history. When our students do not see their peers reflected in the books they read, it is also more difficult for them to see their peers as equals and as leaders. I am excited to see schools across the state using this month as an opportunity to highlight achievements of women and to reflect on how they can do more to empower the girls in their schools. In Aurora, a group of students at Metea Valley High School were invited to a <a href="Women's History Workshop">Women's History Workshop</a> to connect with and learn from women in diverse professions. # **GATA Grantee Registration Portal Open**

The grantee prequalification registration portal is now active for fiscal year 2018, and may be accessed directly on the Grant Accountability and Transparency Act (GATA) website at <a href="https://www.illinois.gov/sites/GATA/Grantee/Pages/default.aspx">www.illinois.gov/sites/GATA/Grantee/Pages/default.aspx</a>. All grantees must complete the registration process and be qualified to do business with the state of Illinois.

To be qualified to **apply** for a fiscal year 2018 grant award, an entity must complete the following three steps:

# 1. Authentication (New for fiscal year 2018) and Registration

The Grantee Portal utilizes the Illinois.gov
Authentication Portal. A personal or business email
address is required to establish an account.
Authentication verifies the relationship between an
individual and the organization they represent.
Authentication is performed once for each individual
associated with a registration. If you don't have an
Illinois.gov account, click the "Create a new account"
link below the "Sign in" button. For help with the
Illinois.gov Authentication Portal please visit
www.illinois.gov/sites/accounts/Pages/default.aspx.

Once your Illinois.gov account is created, you must return to the Grantee Portal log-in screen and enter

your user name and password to continue. The system will then ask for your organization's DUNS number. If the DUNS number for your organization is on record with GATA from the previous year, the system will associate you with your organization. The process may require the approval of the primary GATA system registrant for your organization.

If the DUNS number that you enter is not found in the GATA system, the system will invite you to create a new grantee account for the entity related to that DUNS number. Please confirm that you entered the correct DUNS number before creating a new account. Creation of a new grantee account is accomplished by providing your organization's:

- DUNS number, (click <u>HERE</u> to view instructions on obtaining a DUNS number);
- FEIN;
- Organization type;
- Secretary of State ID (NOTE: the following types of organizations have been deemed EXEMPT from this requirement: school districts, colleges, universities, regional offices of education, special education joint agreements and education for employment consortiums);
- Organization name
- Address.

### 2. Grantee Pre-qualification

All entities must be qualified to do business with the State of Illinois. To be qualified for a grant award, an entity must:

- Be registered in the GATA Grantee Portal system as described above;
- Have a valid DUNS number, (click <u>HERE</u> to view instructions on obtaining a DUNS number);
- Have a current SAM.gov account, (click <u>HERE</u> to view instructions on obtaining a SAM Cage Code);
- Not be on the Federal Excluded Parties List, (click <u>HERE</u> to verify utilizing the Quick Search);
- Be in Good Standing with the Illinois Secretary of State, as applicable) (click <u>HERE</u> to verify). (NOTE: the following types of organizations have been deemed EXEMPT

from this requirement: school districts, colleges, universities, regional offices of education, special education joint agreements and education for employment consortiums.;

- Not be on the Illinois Stop Payment list;
- Not be on the Dept. of Healthcare and Family Services Provider Sanctions list.

# **3. Fiscal and Administrative Risk Assessment** (ICQ)

Entities must complete a fiscal year 2018 Internal Controls Questionnaire (ICQ) as the Fiscal and Administrative Risk Assessment. The ICQ is completed once, annually for each fiscal year. All state agencies will utilize the results of the ICQ. The entity can access the ICQ from the grantee portal. The portal provides access to prior year ICQ responses for those entities that received grants in FY 2017 and the FY 2018 ICQ template that must be completed prior to making application for an FY 2018 grant. The ICQ should be completed by someone with financial or accounting experience.

The status of compliance with each of the requirements described above is displayed in the Grantee Portal for each registered entity.

The new Breakfast After the Bell law goes into effect in the 2017-18 school year. Under the law, breakfast is to be provided after the instructional day has officially begun for every public school in which at least 70 percent of the students are eligible for free or reduced-price meals.

School Breakfast Grants will support schools implementing or preparing to implement a Breakfast After the Bell delivery model (Breakfast in the Classroom, Grab 'N' Go, or Second Chance Breakfast) with the purchase of approved equipment, supplies, or materials in an effort to increase student participation in school breakfast. Maximum request amount is \$5,000. The deadline to apply is March 22.

# Mumps Outbreak Reminds Parents to Check Children's Immunization Records

The Illinois Department of Public Health and Lake County Health Department have confirmed an outbreak of mumps in some Lake County schools.

When an outbreak of mumps is declared, susceptible contacts may be excluded from school until the outbreak is over. "Susceptible contacts" may include students who were not immunized against mumps, whether the reason for not obtaining the vaccine is medical or religious.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) describes mumps as a contagious disease caused by a virus. It typically starts with a few days of fever, headache, muscle aches, tiredness, and loss of appetite, followed by swollen salivary glands.

The Lake County cases come as the U.S. is in the midst of one of the largest mumps surges in decades, with schools and college campuses in many states contending with outbreaks.

The best way to protect children from mumps is with the measles-mumps-rubella (MMR) vaccine. Parents are advised to check their children's vaccination records to assure they have received at least two doses of the MMR.

# Youth Risk Behavior Survey Gets Underway in Selected High Schools

The 2017 administration of the Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS) is underway in selected Illinois high schools. The survey, coordinated by ISBE with direction from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) is given to a small number of high school students in schools selected by random sample to represent the Illinois high school population.

ISBE supports the YRBS program and thanks the school officials who have already agreed to allow trained surveyors to give the surveys to the student sample. Surveys are underway this month at those schools. No student is required to take the survey if he or she objects.

# National Board Certification Opportunity for Administrator Leaders

There are currently 47 National Board Professional Development Schools in Illinois led by administrator leaders. The National Board Resource Center (NBRC) is expanding this program to include an additional 25 schools/districts to take part in this opportunity during the 2017-2018 school year.

Members of the National Board Professional Development Schools will spend a year or more fostering personal and professional growth as they build collegial relationships. This program is school based and includes several research-based instructional strategies which focus on implementing effective teaching approaches that nurture critical thinking. Participants support each other in completing the National Board components, collaborate on adapting curriculum to the Illinois Learning Standards, and articulate teaching practices aligned with the Danielson Framework for Teaching while relating these topics to the school's goals. Teachers expand leadership skills which are critical to serving the needs of students, schools and the teaching profession. The overall focus of the National Board Professional Development School program is to impact teaching and learning.
