Message From State Superintendent Tony Smith, Ph.D.

Hello,

The Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) will meet Wednesday via video conference in Chicago, Springfield, and Marion. The <u>agenda</u> includes an update on the 5Essentials Survey, an online statewide survey to collect feedback on learning conditions and environments at each school. The presentation will include an overview of trend data and district feedback on the survey as well as valuable information on how the survey process will evolve during the upcoming school year.

The 5Essentials Survey is a diagnostic tool that provides schools with fine-grained data on five leading indicators for school improvement: Effective Leaders, Collaborative Teachers, Involved Families, Supportive Environment, and Ambitious Instruction. The 5Essentials collects feedback

from teachers, students, and parents and all district schools are required to participate in the survey at least every other year. This year was ISBE's fourth administration of the survey, which took place from Jan. 11 to March 11.



For the 2016-17 school year, we are moving the 5Essentials administration window up earlier in the school year to extend from Nov. 16 to Jan. 16, 2017. ISBE made this decision in response to feedback from a subcommittee I assembled of

district superintendents and representatives from state education and educator organizations, who felt the previous survey window was difficult to manage along with spring statewide assessments. The adjusted administration dates should prove more convenient for districts while still giving respondents enough time to provide informed responses on conditions for the school year to that point. Superintendents' voices have been critical in our efforts to improve the survey process, and I appreciate those of you who have shared your input.

The next survey will also once again give all educators and students in the state a unique log-in to take the survey. This rostering process improves the validity and accuracy of responses. Additional details about how to submit your rosters via the Employment Information System will be forthcoming.

The 5Essentials provides valuable data that can help schools continually assess their progress and build positive relationships within their communities. I encourage you all to listen to Wednesday's presentation and think of how this tool can help shape and evaluate your school improvement efforts. State Funding and Forecasting

Projections for General State Aid by District Now Available Online

The Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) has released figures for the fiscal year 2017 General State Aid (GSA) forecast revised for spring with new data. The files are posted at

www.isbe.net/funding/html/gsa.htm#fy17 and show how much state aid each school district in Illinois will receive under the Governor's plan to fully fund education to the foundation level.

The forecast reflects district estimates of average daily attendance and preliminary Department of Human Services service numbers for the low-income portion of GSA.

The files include a geographic summary of the number of districts gaining or losing funds and counts of the data that changed, causing declines in claims. Each district that loses funds experienced at least one of the following: 1. increased local wealth; 2. decreased attendance; 3. a decrease in the three-year average of low-income students; and/or 4. a decrease in the proportion of low-income students.

Preliminary forecast variables and a template for individual district forecasts are also available at this link. Using the data to complete the template allows districts that are not switching formula types to determine how much of the change in forecast GSA claim is attributable to the different data elements used in calculations.

The tour is the first opportunity to provide input on ESSA. ISBE will also engage stakeholders throughout the process until full implementation takes place in 2017-18.

Special Education Services

Early Intervention 27-Month List Now Available in New Electronic Format

ISBE's Special Education Services and Early Childhood divisions are pleased to announce that the provision of the 27-month list to districts is now available in electronic format. This new process will be available online in the Student Information System (SIS) via IWAS, located at www.isbe.net.

The 27-month list notifies districts of children in the Early Intervention program who will be turning 3 years old and may be eligible for special education services in the public school. The list assists districts in ensuring that any eligible children have Individualized Education Program (IEP) services in place by their third birthday.

Previously, the lists were mailed to staff in either a district or special education cooperative. With the online system, staff members who wish to access the report must contact personnel within the district/entity that have access to SIS. Once logged into SIS, access the "Reports" link. The "Early Intervention to Early Childhood Special Education Transition" report is

located under the Early Learning category. This report will include all students between 27 and 37 months of age who have been reported from the Department of Human Services and will be refreshed/updated at the beginning of each month.

The online system will reduce costs, paper consumption, and the amount of time needed to provide the lists. It will also allow districts and their special education cooperatives to access the lists for simultaneous viewing. Illinois Department of Transportation

Illinois Transportation Enhancement Program Applications Available

On Dec. 4, 2015, a new transportation bill, Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act or "FAST Act," was signed into law. The act is the first federal law in more than 10 years to provide long-term funding certainty for surface transportation. The FAST Act eliminated the MAP-21 Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) and replaced it with a set-aside of Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) program funding for transportation alternatives authorized under Section 1109 of the FAST Act (23 U.S.C. 133(h)). This new STBG program set-aside provides funding for the Illinois Transportation Enhancement Program (ITEP).

The ITEP provides funding for community-based projects that expand travel choices and enhance the transportation experience by improving the cultural, historic, aesthetic, and environmental aspects of our transportation infrastructure. It is designed to promote and develop alternative transportation options, including bike and pedestrian travel, along with streetscape beautification.

The federal funds are awarded competitively, and projects must be related to surface transportation. Eligible applicants include all entities that were eligible to apply for TAP funds. Any local or state government with taxing authority is also eligible to apply. In addition, the FAST Act allows nonprofit

entities responsible for the administration of local transportation safety programs to apply.

Approximately \$29 million is available to award for selected projects, with the maximum award per project capped at \$2 million. IDOT will accept applications for the 2016 ITEP Cycle from May 2 to June 17.

School Health Issues

FBI Drug Prevention Resource Available for High Schools

The FBI has created a documentary that illustrates the toll of opiate addiction. The film, called "Chasing the Dragon," can be downloaded for free at www.fbi.gov/ChasingTheDragon. The documentary targets high school students and is designed to send a message of deterrence to young people.

The 45-minute film, made in cooperation with the Drug Enforcement Administration, also includes interviews with medical and law enforcement professionals, who talk about the effects of addiction and the unique aspects of the opiate epidemic in the United States. "This epidemic does not discriminate. All across this country, it is taking good people from good homes and leading them down a trail that often ends in pain and sadness," FBI Director James Comey said. "This film may be difficult to watch, but we hope it educates our students and young adults about the tragic consequences that come with abusing these drugs and that it will cause people to think twice before becoming its next victim."

Substance Use Resources Available

Optional Alternative Evaluation Dismissal Process Training Requirements

Senate Bill 7 established a new section of the School Code, Section 24-16.5, that creates the Optional Alternative Evaluation Dismissal (OAED) process. The OAED process may be utilized on or after a school district's Performance Evaluation Reform Act (PERA) Implementation Date and is designed to further streamline the hearing procedure for the dismissal of tenured teachers related to performance. This dismissal process may be used only after a "teacher has failed to complete a remediation plan with a rating equal to or better than a proficient rating. . . [and] the unsatisfactory performance rating evaluation that preceded remediation resulted from a PERA evaluation." [105 ILCS 5/24-16.5].

The statute prescribes that only "PERA-trained board members" may participate in the vote on whether to retain or dismiss a teacher when the district uses the OAED process. Board members seeking to be trained on PERA for the purposes of the OAED process must complete training offered by an entity approved by ISBE. Note: Only board members in districts that will be using the OAED process must be PERA trained.

Guidance on Developing and Submitting the Quality School Options Grant RFP

Final EIS Deadline for Federal Requirements Approaching

This notice is to remind districts that the final deadline to submit data for Employment Information System (EIS) employment, position records, and non-certified aggregated FTE counts to comply with federal reporting requirements is April 15.

As covered in the October webinar "Introduction to 2016 EIS: New Features and Updates" (available at www.isbe.net/eis/html/archived-meetings.htm#eis-basics), certain data elements have been enhanced or introduced, in accordance with federal law. A brief explanation of these changes includes:

- Clarification on entering district superintendents and principals
- Adjusted FTE minimum
- New single salary model to allow for multiple positions and work locations
- Position codes have been added or removed as needed
- Capability to generate IEIN numbers has been removed
