In other good news, the U.S. Department of Education (ED) has announced that Carl Schurz High School in Chicago is one of 10 prize winners in the CTE (Career and Technical Education) Makeover Challenge. The challenge asked high schools to design a "makerspace" – defined by ED as "an environment or facility that provides resources, materials, and equipment for students to conceive, create, and collaborate through making" – that could be shared with other educators to foster and improve career and technical education skills for the 21st century. The prize winners were selected from 640 schools from all 50 states and Washington, D.C.

Carl Schurz will receive \$20,000 and a share of in-kind prizes to build or renovate its makerspace. The school and its fellow honorees will also create a video tour of its makerspace and an online portfolio that will be featured in the CTE Makerspace Showcase at the World Maker Faire in New York City in

## CDC Releases Data on Youth Risk Behaviors

Priority health-risk behaviors contribute to the leading causes of morbidity and mortality among youth and adults. The Youth Risk Behavior Surveillance System (YRBSS) monitors six categories of priority health behaviors among youth and young adults: 1. behaviors that contribute to unintentional injuries and violence; 2. tobacco use; 3. alcohol and other drug use; 4. sexual behaviors related to unintended pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections, including human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) infection; 5. unhealthy dietary behaviors; and 6. physical inactivity.

Many high school students engage in behaviors that place them at risk for the leading causes of morbidity and mortality. YRBSS data collected from a random sample of Illinois high school students is used widely to compare the prevalence of health behaviors among subpopulations of students; assess trends in health behaviors over time; monitor progress toward achieving 21 national health objectives for Healthy People 2020 and one of the 26 leading health indicators; provide comparable state and large urban school district data; and help develop and evaluate school and community policies, programs, and practices designed to decrease health-risk behaviors and improve health outcomes among youth.

# FAQ Available About New Application and Award Requirements Under GATA

The Grant Accountability and Transparency Act (GATA) includes development of a new grants management system that will be implemented in all state agencies beginning in fiscal year 2017. This new system will require significant changes to the grant-making process at the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) and across state government, including the application process for school districts and other grantees.

GATA adopts the federal uniform guidance (2 CFR 200 "super circular") for all grants and develops supplemental rules for areas not addressed by the federal regulations. The goal is to improve outcomes by becoming more performance-focused while increasing accountability, transparency, and efficiency across state government and the grantee community through the application of standardized processes.

GATA will primarily apply to "traditional" grants (e.g., Early Childhood, Truant Alternative and Optional Education Program, Title I, and Individuals with Disabilities Act) and Requests for Proposals. It will NOT apply to General State Aid or Mandated Categoricals (e.g., Transportation, Special Education).

One of the new regulations requires grantees to be prequalified prior to receiving an award for fiscal year 2017. Please watch the ISBE site and the GATA site for further instructions as they become available.

The requirements for prequalification include the possession of a Commercial and Government Entity (CAGE) Code, a System for Award Management (SAM) user account, and a Dun & Bradstreet data universal number system (DUNS) number in order to receive federal funding. If you are uncertain if your district has active numbers, please contact your business office to ensure compliance. You may also register for these numbers at the following websites:

Please note that there is no fee to register for a CAGE Code.

Implementation of GATA across state government will be an evolving process with additional

instructions and technological improvements anticipated over the coming months, so your patience is appreciated.

#### **Guidance for 1 Percent Exception**

The new guidance document for the 1 percent exception is posted at <a href="www.isbe.net/spec-ed/html/exception\_cap.htm">www.isbe.net/spec-ed/html/exception\_cap.htm</a>. For this year, the exception to the 1 percent does not require districts to submit an application. Rather, ISBE will use the data collected to determine those districts that qualify for the 1 percent exception based on the following criteria:

- Districts with percentages of students assessed for the Dynamic Learning Maps Alternate Assessment (DLM-AA) that range from 1 to 2.4 percent will not be required to submit any documentation. Their approval will be based on the number of students assessed for the Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers (PARCC) exam compared to the number assessed for DLM.
- Districts with percentages of students assessed for DLM-AA that range from 2.5 to 2.9 percent will be required to submit a letter of explanation. ISBE will send districts in this range a letter requesting an explanation and the due date for that letter. The approval will be based on the explanation provided and meeting the deadline for submission of the documentation.
- Districts with percentages of students assessed for DLM-AA that exceed 3 percent will be required to submit a letter of explanation and an individualized education program (IEP) for review. ISBE will send districts in this range a letter requesting an explanation and IEPs with a due date for the requested documentation. The approval will be based on the explanation, the IEPs, and meeting the deadline for submission of the documentation.

# 2015-16 Student Health Data – Vision System Now Open

The 2015-16 Student Health Data - Vision system is now open in IWAS. As mandated by Section 5/27-9.1 of the School Code, vision data must be submitted for all eligible schools serving kindergarten and/or any students enrolled for the first time in an Illinois school as of Oct. 15, 2015. This data must be submitted by 11:59 p.m. June 30.

**Please note:** Schools that are not the home school for any student should log into the system and select the "No Student Data to Report" option. This option may also be selected by home schools that do not serve kindergarten students and/or had no students in grades 1 through 12 enrolling for the first time in an Illinois school.

Ensure all contact information, address, and grades served are up to date in the Entity Profile System (EPS) in IWAS. ## Reminder: 2015-16 Dental Data Collection Due June 30

As mandated by Section 5/27-8.1 of the School Code, student dental data must be submitted on or before **June 30**.

Public school districts may enter the data for each of their schools or approve school IWAS users to enter the data. Regardless of who enters data, it is the responsibility of the nonpublic school administrator/public school district administrator to review the accuracy of entered data and submit the finished data to ISBE by the deadline.

Again, note that **all dental data** must be submitted for all schools serving any combination of kindergarten, grade 2, and/or grade 6 students (enrolled as of May 15) by **June 30**.
