As you know, ISBE releases the 2016 Report Card to the public at the end of the month, on Oct. 31 – in a little over two weeks! Our data, assessments, and communications teams are conducting a webinar both in the morning and afternoon on Oct. 13 to prepare school and district administrators to answer questions from media and stakeholders. The webinar will provide a brief orientation to the data available in the 2016 Illinois Report Card, as well as provide strategies for analyzing, contextualizing, and communicating this data to stakeholders and media. I encourage you to register and attend.

Another bit of housekeeping: Last week I told you about a survey regarding assessments to comply with Public Act 99-590. That survey was sent to all superintendents on Thursday, Oct. 6. Additionally, there are several districts I'd like to recognize this week for their transformative work.

J. Sterling Morton High School District 201 was featured in <u>District Administration magazine</u> for achieving a higher graduation rate and increased student performance. The piece highlights the district's new grading system, community engagement efforts, and leadership among medium-sized school districts in expanding access to Advanced Placement (AP) courses while improving AP exam performance. Earlier this year, the district was named a <u>College Board Advanced Placement ® District</u> of the Year.

Cicero School District 99 has been working to improve student performance in reading and comprehension through more focused professional development for teachers. The district has received support from the <u>Illinois Center for School Improvement</u> (Illinois CSI) to pilot differentiated small-group reading instruction to assist English language learners. It has also implemented a classroom walk-through process to provide teachers with meaningful feedback. In the first semester of the program, the district saw a 4.75 percent increase in the number of students who were meeting or exceeding grade-level proficiency in reading. Thank you all for continuing to do outstanding work for Illinois students.

Those Who Excel

Meet Illinois Teacher of the Year Finalist Elizabeth Mendoza of District 201

Elizabeth Mendoza, a Spanish teacher at J.S. Morton East High School in District 201, may only be in her fifth year of teaching, but her achievements rival that of a seasoned veteran. For the past two years, 100 percent of Elizabeth's Advanced



Placement (AP) Spanish students have earned 3s or higher on the AP exam. Elizabeth has not only embraced the district's mission of "every student succeeds," she has made it her personal mantra. The lead teacher of her department wrote this about Elizabeth: "In her four short years in teaching, she has come up with outstanding lessons, managed to form strong connections with her students, instilled a strong sense of admiration from her students, furthered her studies, and accomplished goals that other teachers dream of accomplishing."

Elizabeth says she was inspired to become a teacher by her experiences with her teachers. She drew inspiration from both the good and the not-so-good teachers she had throughout her years as a student. Elizabeth's sixth-grade teacher was her first role model. The teacher encouraged her students to believe that they could go on to college. Her love for teaching and her students showed in everything she did. That teacher became Elizabeth's first mentor and she taught her that good teachers truly care about helping their students succeed in the classroom -- and in life. She also learned how an indifferent teacher could harm struggling students. Those examples, and many others, help Elizabeth focus every day to be the best teacher she can be.

Today Elizabeth is the teacher inspiring students. She is described as a "powerful force that drives students to do their best." Her students are drawn to her warmth, her empathy, and her bubbly personality. They seek her out before and after school and she is always available to them. One of her students firmly believes that "nine out of 10" students would say Elizabeth is their favorite teacher. The prime example of her influence and inspiration on her students can be seen in the student who claims Elizabeth has inspired her to become a teacher and says this about her: "She's a rare type of teacher, the one that you create a bond with and can go to for absolutely anything -- the type of teacher I aspire to be."

Elizabeth is one of our 10 finalists for Illinois Teacher of the Year, which we will name at the Those Who Excel banquet in Normal on Oct. 22.

Applications will be accepted through Dec. 1. The loans will be awarded on a first-come, first-served

Adding Optional District Voice Information

On this year's Report Card, districts will have an opportunity to add a district voice to their 5Essentials Survey results. The district voice will provide principals and superintendents an opportunity to provide some local context and explain how the district is utilizing the results. Principals can enter the information into their MyIIRC school site after the release of the 2016 Illinois Report Card on Oct. 31. This change developed out of the 5Essentials Focus Group. The district voice could include areas described below:

- 1. Provide a local context for the school results.
- 2. Explain the changes made in the district/school over the last year.
- 3. Principals can describe how they are addressing culture and climate in the school.
- Talk about how the data is being utilized for school improvement planning and organizational growth.
- 5. Express how the school and district are engaging parents and the community on the topic of culture and climate.
- 6. What are the next steps for improving school culture and climate in the district/school?

Funding and Disbursements

Final 2015-16 IDEA Room and Board Claim Payment Information

The 2015-16 Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) Room and Board program is now complete and all claims were reimbursed at 100 percent. As a reminder, claims were paid at 90 percent during the 2015-16 school year to assure sufficient funding was available to pay all claims equally. After all claims for the fiscal year were received, an assessment of the availability of Room and Board funds was performed and a final payment was made. There was sufficient funding available this year to pay all claims for the additional 10 percent due. The final 2015-16 school year voucher was processed by ISBE on Sept. 28 and released by the Office of the Comptroller on Sept. 30.

2016-17 School Year: The projected increase of claims and available IDEA funds for the 2016-17 school year is estimated at a proration of approximately 95 percent; therefore, to avoid potential overpayment, submitted monthly claims will be paid at 90 percent during the year. Final claims and proration will be calculated and paid after all claims are finalized in September 2017.

Special Education Summer School State Aid Claim Due Nov. 1

The Special Education Summer School claim authorized under Section 18-4.3 is statutorily required to be received at SBE **on or before Nov. 1**. Claims are for eligible students educated in 2016 summer programs and must be filed electronically via ISBE's Web Application Security System (IWAS). No claims will be accepted or honored after the statutory date.

Eligibility requirements for pupils claimed for summer school are:

- (1) the pupil must be enrolled in one or more courses offered for at least 60 clock hours in the summer session:
- (2) the pupil must be eligible pursuant to the requirements for continued summer school services per his or her Individualized Education Program;
- (3) there shall not be a tuition charge to families to insure a "free, appropriate public education."

2015-16 (FY 2017) Annual Claim for Pupil Transportation Reimbursement – Correction Period Now Open

All local education entities are hereby notified that the review and amendment (if needed) process is now open and will end at midnight on Nov. 14. All revisions to the Pupil Transportation Reimbursement Claim must be completed and transmitted on or before midnight on Nov. 14. No revisions will be accepted after this date in order to close the claim file and schedule the three remaining quarterly payments.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR <u>REVIEWING</u> THE CLAIM

- 1. Log into IWAS.
- 2. Click on "System Listing" on the IWAS homepage.

- 3. Select "Pupil Transportation Claim Reimbursement System" under the "Annual Claims" heading.
- 4. Click on "Claim Review" under the "Reimbursement Claim" heading on the homepage. Do not click on "Revise Claim" button unless you need to make revisions.
- 5. The claim will be loaded to the screen in readonly format. Carefully review each line on the claim for possible revisions. If you entered transportation assets on the Depreciation Schedule, don't forget to click on the "Depreciation Schedule" button at the bottom of the screen and review the depreciation schedule data for possible revisions.

If you do not have any revisions, you do not need to do anything. Your claim will remain as originally submitted by the statutory Aug. 15 due date.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR REVISING THE CLAIM

If you have reviewed the claim and found that revisions are needed to the depreciation schedule and/or the pupil transportation reimbursement claim:

- 1. Click on the "Revise Claim" link under the "Reimbursement Claim" heading on the homepage.
- 2. You may enter notes in the "Your Comments" text box to help you remember why revisions were needed. Click on the "Revise Claim" button at the bottom of the screen to proceed with revisions to the depreciation schedule (if needed) and the pupil transportation reimbursement claim.
- 3. Note that all links for the reimbursement claim are open and may be revised as needed. The "Depreciation Schedule Summary" link under the "Depreciation Schedule" heading has been changed to "Calculate Depreciation Allowance." If you made any changes to transportation assets after the August submit date, you must click on this link and update the Depreciation Schedule.
- 4. After all revisions have been made, click on the "Review & Submit Claim." All revised claims must be resubmitted to ISBE through the proper channels (Document Author to the District Superintendent and District Superintendent to ISBE).

NO REVISIONS TO THE CLAIM WILL BE ACCEPTED AFTER MIDNIGHT ON MONDAY, NOV. 14, 2016.

Warning About Halloween Colored Contacts

The Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation (IDFPR) is reminding the public that purchasing colored contact lenses from anyone other than a licensed eye care professional or pharmacist is dangerous. The health risk is serious and most of the customers seeking cosmetic contact lenses are teens and young adults. IDFPR is partnering with ISBE and the Department of Public Health to alert teachers, administrators, and health care professionals in every school district and county in the state about the serious health and vision problems facing young people and warning signs to look for in their students and patients.

Nutrition and Wellness Programs

Breakfast After the Bell Mandate Grant Funding Available; Apply by Nov. 18

Eating breakfast at school has been proven to reduce tardiness, absenteeism, and visits to the nurse, while improving test scores. Unfortunately, less than half of eligible Illinois students currently have access to school breakfast. Illinois ranks 40th in the nation in the ratio of school lunch participants who also eat breakfast. With school breakfast we can ensure that all children start the day with the nutrition they need to reach their full potential.

Public Act 99-0850 requires every public school in which at least 70 percent of the students were eligible for free or reduced-price lunches in October of the preceding year to operate a Breakfast After the Bell program. Breakfast After the Bell means breakfast is provided to children after the instructional day has officially begun and does not prohibit schools from also providing breakfast before the instructional day begins. Schools may choose whatever delivery model that best suits the students. Typical options include:

- **Breakfast in the Classroom:** Food is delivered (by staff, students, or volunteers) to each classroom after school begins and students are permitted to eat breakfast in the classroom.
- **Grab and Go Breakfast:** Students pick up bagged or boxed breakfast from carts or specified areas and are permitted to eat in either designated areas or the classroom.
- **Second-Chance Breakfast:** An extended passing or breakfast period is offered in the cafeteria, following the first or second period of the day.
- Other options include serving breakfast during an early recess or outdoor lesson. Schools and districts have great flexibility in serving breakfast after the bell as long as it is offered to all students after the instructional day has begun.

FUNDING: State reimbursement to offset a portion of the cost of the meal is available if a site serves a reimbursable meal to a student eligible for a free meal and the site is enrolled in the Illinois Free Breakfast and Lunch Programs. Both state and federal reimbursement is available if a site enrolls in the National School Lunch Program, and/or School Breakfast Program.

Grant funding is also available for new and expanding Breakfast After the Bell programs statewide. The next **No Kid Hungry Illinois Breakfast Grant deadline is Nov. 18.** Grants are available for up to \$5,000 each that will help schools purchase approved equipment and materials and institute initiatives facilitating alternative breakfast models, such as Breakfast in the Classroom or Grab and Go Breakfast. To apply, visit grants.nokidhungry.org. The application is easy. You will need to create an account – when prompted, enter the access code: ILBREAKFAST2017.

Final EIS Deadline for Employment/Position Data Approaching

This notice is to remind districts that the final deadline to submit data for Employment Information System (EIS) employment, position records, and noncertified aggregated full time equivalent (FTE) counts is **Nov. 1** to align with new 5Essentials reporting requirements.

Certain data elements have been enhanced or introduced, in accordance with federal law. This was covered in the September webinar "<u>Introduction to 2017 EIS: New Features and Updates.</u>"

Again, the final deadline for 2016-17 employment, position records, and noncertified employee aggregated FTE counts is **Nov. 1.** Please submit the data using IWAS or batch files.

2016-17 Unfilled Positions Survey Now Available for Data Entry in IWAS

The 2016-17 Unfilled Positions Survey is now available in IWAS for data entry. The deadline for completing the survey and submitting it to ISBE is **Nov. 10**. Districts are to report the number of budgeted positions they were unable to fill as of Oct. 3, 2016. All districts that hire staff are required to complete the survey, even districts that did not have any unfilled positions.

To avoid duplicating unfilled positions reported by public school districts, other reporting entities (e.g., special education cooperatives) should only report their unfilled employee positions.

Federal and State Monitoring

NCLB/ESSA Monitoring Instrument and Title I Comparability

The FY 2017 No Child Left Behind/Every Student Succeeds Act (NCLB/ESSA) Monitoring Instrument is available for completion and submission in IWAS. The due date is **Nov. 30**.

All districts receiving NCLB/ESSA funding are required to submit the document every year. As before, the previous year's information will be imported to the document, and the district should ensure its accuracy before submitting. You may be able to see that some questions have been omitted in line with the new ESSA guidance while a new question or two has been added. Each "Comment/Proof Indicator" box will need to have a comment that identifies the documents that support your answers or clarifies your "yes," "no," or "N/A" response. You will not be able to submit the form without providing an answer in each box.

The FY 2017 NCLB/ESSA Title I Comparability analysis is also available for completion and submission in IWAS.

A new resource has been developed to help you get answers to frequently asked questions. It is titled "NCLB/ESSA Title I Comparability Frequently Asked Questions/Answers and Common Errors." This document can be located along with other useful tools for completing your comparability analysis on our website.

Districts that are "exempt" will continue to select the "Exempt" radio button and then "Submit." Their submittal requirements will have been met when the superintendent submits it.

An updated "Comparability User's Guide" for FY 2017 is located on the menu bar of the comparability application and on our <u>Federal and State Monitoring</u> website.

All districts receiving Title I funds must complete the document. Failure to comply will result in frozen program funds and a recovery of expenditures of Title I funds in buildings where they are determined to be non-comparable.

School Business Services

Deadline Set to Submit Limitation of Administrative Costs Worksheets

Section 17-1.5 of the School Code requires school districts to limit the growth of "administrative" expenditures to a maximum of 5 percent from one fiscal year to the next. School districts must file the Limitation of Administrative Costs Worksheet with ISBE's School Business Services Division by Nov. 15.

A blank Limitation of Administrative Costs Worksheet is available at

www.isbe.net/sfms/AdminCaps/AdminCaps.htm.

Additionally, the Limitation of Administrative Costs Worksheet is included in the Illinois School District Annual Financial Report - June 30, 2016 (ISBE 50-35). If a completed Limitation of Administrative Costs Worksheet is submitted along with the school district's Annual Financial Report, a separate worksheet does not have to be submitted. Please note that the worksheet included in the School District Budget Form July 1, 2016 - June 30, 2017 (ISBE 50-36) is a working document for local use only and will not be accepted for official submission of the Limitation of Administrative Costs Worksheet.

Submitted Limitation of Administrative Costs Worksheets will be reviewed to ensure figures match to the district's submitted School District Budget Form July 1, 2016 - June 30, 2017 (ISBE 50-36) and the district's submitted Annual Financial Report - June 30, 2016 (ISBE 50-35). Inaccurate Limitation of Administrative Costs Worksheets will be returned to districts for correction.

Districts exceeding the limitation may amend their budgets prior to June 30, 2017, to become in compliance with the limitation. Districts unable to amend their budgets would have to waive the limitation in order to become in compliance. School districts with administrative expenditures in the 25th percentile or below (4th quartile) may waive the limitation following a public hearing and with the affirmative vote of at least two-thirds of the members of the school board. Any district waiving the limitation shall notify ISBE within 45 days of such action. If a school district that is ineligible to waive the limitation by board action exceeds the limitation solely because of circumstances beyond the control of the district and the district has exhausted all available and reasonable remedies to comply with the limitation, the district may request a waiver from the General Assembly pursuant to Section 2-3.25g of the School Code. Procedures for requesting a waiver in accordance with Section 2-3.25g of the School Code are available at www.isbe.net/isbewaivers/default.htm.

FY 2017 School District Budget/Joint Agreement Forms must be submitted to ISBE no later than **Oct. 31**. The School Code Section 17-1 (105 ILCS 5/17-1) requires school districts/joint agreements to electronically submit the adopted annual budget to ISBE; it also requires school districts who adopt an unbalanced budget in the operating funds to complete a Deficit Reduction Plan to balance the budget within three years.

Please submit the amended budgets to ISBE through the Attachment Manager to School Finance Reports.

Reorganization Feasibility Studies

ISBE is now accepting agreements for FY 2017 School District Reorganization Feasibility Studies. Feasibility studies are a tool to be used by school districts wanting to investigate the advantages and/or disadvantages of reorganization options. The school board of each district involved in a feasibility study must approve, by board resolution, the initiation of the study. The districts involved will submit a proposed agreement with an independent contractor(s) to their Regional Office of Education (ROE) or Intermediate Service Center (ISC) in Cook County. The ROE or ISC, as applicable, will submit the agreement to ISBE for approval.

ISBE shall set the final state allotment for each study after review of the submitted study agreement. Funding shall be contingent on factors such as the number of districts involved in the study, the combined student enrollment of districts involved in the study, multiple studies with the same district or districts, new study versus update of a prior state-funded study, etc. Any

study cost above the state funding will be the responsibility of the participating districts. In order to receive reorganization feasibility study funds in FY 2017, agreements must be approved by the ROE or ISC and ISBE, and studies must be completed, approved for payment by the ROE or ISC, and submitted to ISBE no later than June 30, 2017.

Annual Financial Report

School District/Joint Agreements must submit the **Annual Financial Report (ISBE Form 50-35)** to the Regional Office of Education by no later than **Oct. 14** and at ISBE by no later than **Nov. 15.** This excludes those districts/joint agreements with approved extensions until **Dec. 15. Regional superintendents** must approve all extensions and forward all approved extensions for their districts to ISBE by mail or <u>finance1@isbe.net</u>. As per statute, regional superintendents cannot approve extensions past Dec. 15.

2016-17 Nonpublic Registration, Enrollment, and Staff Report in IWAS

The *Nonpublic Registration, Enrollment and Staff Report* for the 2016-17 school year is available in IWAS through Nov. 15. A *User Guide* is available for reference and can be accessed within the report in IWAS.

Nonpublic school registration is voluntary and annual. Nonpublic schools that have registered with ISBE at least once in the past and wish to retain or regain their registered status must submit their data online via IWAS. All eligible schools should also receive IWAS inbox messages regarding the *Nonpublic Registration*, *Enrollment and Staff Report*. Please check your IWAS inbox for reminders and updates.

This is also the time of year for schools to complete the *Student Health Data—Immunization Report* for the 2016-17 school year. This report becomes available on Oct.17 in IWAS. More information about immunization data may be requested from Dr. Marjurie Ribeiro at mribeiro@isbe.net.

Similarly, registered schools that are also currently recognized are reminded of the need to renew their recognized status through the *Nonpublic School Application for Recognition and Calendar*, which is also available in IWAS. Nonpublic schools seeking recognition must re-register AND submit their immunization data before they can apply for recognition. Grant Accountability & Transparency Act

FY 2017 Indirect Cost Rates

In accordance with a Delegation Agreement between the U.S. Department of Education and ISBE, and pursuant to its authority under the Grant Accountability and Transparency Act (GATA) and administrative rules, the Governor's Office of Management and Budget has granted ISBE an exception to the federal Uniform Guidance and GATA regarding the determination of indirect cost rates that may be utilized by all grantees that receive a state award or federal pass-through award for grant programs administered by ISBE.

Local Education Agencies (LEAs) may utilize either the restricted indirect cost rate the LEA negotiates annually with ISBE (school districts) or the statewide average indirect cost rate calculated by ISBE (Regional Offices of Education, Intermediate Service Centers, special education cooperatives, area vocational centers, charter schools, and university laboratory schools approved by ISBE). These LEAs will also utilize the ISBE-established restricted indirect cost rates for state and federally funded grant programs administered by other state agencies. Therefore, LEAs

do not need to take any further action in order to establish or utilize an indirect cost rate for any state or federally funded grant program administered by any state agency

Not-for-profit agencies, community/faith-based organizations, and for-profit entities may utilize the statewide average indirect cost rate calculated by ISBE for all state and federal grant programs administered by ISBE. Colleges and universities will be restricted to a maximum indirect cost rate of 8 percent or other indirect cost rate calculated by their cognizant federal agency, whichever is less, for state and federal grants administered by ISBE. However, these entities must negotiate a separate indirect cost rate or select another indirect cost rate option through the State of Illinois Centralized Indirect Cost Rate System (linked below) in order to claim an indirect cost reimbursement for state and federally funded grant programs administered by other state agencies.

Notice of State Award and Grant Agreement Pages in eGMS

All FY 2017 state and federal grants in the electronic Grants Management System will incorporate the new Notice of State Award (NOSA) and Grant Agreement pages. Specific conditions are reflected in the NOSA as a result of the Fiscal Internal Control Questionnaire (ICQ) and Program Risk Assessment grantee responses. Per the requirements of GATA, please be advised that a required component prior to FY 2017 grant execution is grantee acceptance of the specific award conditions as well as the terms, conditions, assurances, and grant exhibits in the Grant Agreement.

IMPORTANT: ISBE is currently reviewing the specific conditions assigned to grantees as a result of the responses from the ICQ and Program Risk Assessments. ISBE is meeting with other state agencies to discuss the appropriate course of action to

implement specific conditions in the NOSA, including evaluation of grantee risk and the necessity of imposing additional specific award conditions. Your organization will be kept advised of the decisions, adoption of administrative rules, and ISBE's implementation plan in this regard. Depending on the specific condition, you will be notified how you can provide evidence of your organization's corrective actions to ISBE or your state cognizant agency according to the timeframe indicated in the NOSA. Grantees completing their GATA registration should have received an automated notification to complete the ICQ. Separately, each grantee was also required to login via the ISBE IWAS portal and complete the Programmatic Risk Assessment. If specific conditions are not present in the NOSA section, this indicates that either the ICQ and/or Program Risk Assessment has not been submitted and/or approved.
