Earlier this week, President Obama announced that the nation's four-year high school graduation rate has reached a record 83.2 percent. I am proud to say that Illinois' 2014-15 graduation rate is above this national average at 85.6 percent. Educators, students, and families have continued to work together to ensure that more of our students are graduating from high school. A high school diploma remains vital not only for students who plan to go on to college but also for students who plan to enter the workforce. As you will see when the Report Card is released at the end of the month, Illinois also tracks students' five-year graduation rate-- and this year will be the first year that we share data on six- and seven-year graduation rates.

Congratulations to Stillman Valley High School and Urbana High School for receiving Silver Recognition from the Schools of Opportunity Project! The project, a program of the National Education Policy Center, recognizes 20 schools from across the country for their commitment to research-based practices focused on closing gaps in opportunity in order to ensure every student has a chance to succeed. Stillman stands out because of its extensive academic and career-based course offerings and for working hard to meet diverse student needs without compromising rigor or

Those Who Excel

Meet Illinois Teacher of the Year Finalist Anthony Zarate of Brighton Park Elementary

Anthony Zarate initially planned to become a nurse. His family is deeply rooted in nursing and the medical field so it seemed only natural to expect Anthony to follow suit. At least it felt natural to everyone but Anthony! He felt a strong pull toward becoming a teacher, but his family and



friends felt he had too much potential to become a teacher. He entered college and struggled through the nursing program his freshman and sophomore years. Anthony said he "had no passion" for the subject so it became incredibly difficult. A friend told him about a summer opportunity for students to teach urban youth in Philadelphia so Anthony took a chance. His experiences in Philadelphia were difficult and trying, but Anthony found his passion and he never looked back.

Today Anthony is in his fourth year of teaching English language arts at Chicago's Brighton Park Elementary, a UNO Charter School Network school. The school's director says Anthony transforms students, teachers, and the entire school with his enthusiasm and passion for teaching: "As we determine future goals, we frequently turn to Mr. Zarate's room as a proof point of what's possible." Anthony uses "fight for your spot" as the motto of his classroom and students buy into it. He makes sure they understand that he has high expectations and he holds himself to equally high expectations. Students and teachers alike respect him and genuinely believe in themselves because he encourages them to believe in themselves.

One of his students said his initial impression of Anthony was that he wasn't going to be a good teacher because he was way too young. The student initially went out of his way to be difficult and cause problems in the class, but Anthony didn't back down or give up. After two years, Anthony offered to be a mentor to the student and the results were amazing. The student began earning straight A's and held the highest GPA in his class for quite a while: "He has had a huge impact on my education. He mentors me and other students and pushes us to be successful. He always worked hard to help me even when I was extremely difficult and disrespectful. He never gave up on me."

Anthony is one of our 10 finalists for Illinois Teacher of the Year, which we will name at the Those Who Excel banquet in Normal on Oct. 22.

Every Student Succeeds Act

Supplement not Supplant Regulations

On Sept. 6, the U.S. Department of Education posted notice of proposed rulemaking regarding <u>supplement</u> <u>not supplant regulations</u>. The intention of these rules is admirable, but the methodology will not help – and may, in fact, hurt – the students the proposed regulations are intended to benefit. Quality, types, and amount of resources are not considered compared to dollars spent. There is a lack of flexibility or consideration for state and local control that is in contrast to the intention of the Every Student Succeeds Act.

It is CRITICAL that the U.S. Department of Education hear from districts on the impact of these proposed regulations. We've crafted a template letter that you can use to include your individual details and then submit via www.regulations.gov by Nov. 7. Adding Optional District Voice Information

On this year's Report Card, districts will have an opportunity to add a district voice to their 5Essentials Survey results. The district voice will provide principals and superintendents an opportunity to provide some local context and explain how the district is utilizing the results. Principals can enter the information into their MyIIRC school site after the release of the 2016 Illinois Report Card on Oct. 31. This change developed out of the 5Essentials Focus Group. The district voice could include areas described below:

- 1. Provide a local context for the school results.
- 2. Explain the changes made in the district/school over the last year.
- 3. Principals can describe how they are addressing culture and climate in the school.
- 4. Talk about how the data is being utilized for school improvement planning and organizational growth.
- 5. Express how the school and district are engaging parents and the community on the topic of culture and climate.
- 6. What are the next steps for improving school culture and climate in the district/school?

Funding and Disbursements

2015-16 Regular Transportation Reimbursement – Equalized Assessed Valuation Correction

Please be advised that ISBE has determined that the Equalized Assessed Valuation (EAV) figure utilized for the initial 2015-16 Regular Transportation claims payment in September was in error.

ISBE incorrectly processed the 2014 Original EAV for the September payment instead of the 2014 Adjusted EAV. The correct 2014 Adjusted EAV will be used to compute final reimbursement for all 2015-16 Regular Transportation claims when they are finalized in December. All remaining quarterly payments processed in December, March, and June will be adjusted to correct each district's claim using the 2014 Adjusted EAV.

EAV does not result in an overall increase for some
districts due to the fact that the estimated statewide
proration decreased from 71.6 percent to 71.5 percent.

ISBE until Nov. 14.

Final 2015-16 IDEA Room and Board Claim Payment Information

The 2015-16 Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) Room and Board program is now complete and all claims were reimbursed at 100 percent. As a reminder, claims were paid at 90 percent during the 2015-16 school year to assure sufficient funding was available to pay all claims equally. After all claims for the fiscal year were received, an assessment of the availability of Room and Board funds was performed and a final payment was made. There was sufficient funding available this year to pay all claims for the additional 10 percent due. The final 2015-16 school year voucher was processed by ISBE on Sept. 28 and released by the Office of the Comptroller on Sept. 30.

2016-17 School Year: The projected increase of claims and available IDEA funds for the 2016-17 school year is estimated at a proration of approximately 95 percent; therefore, to avoid potential overpayment, submitted monthly claims will be paid at 90 percent during the year. Final claims and proration will be calculated and paid after all claims are finalized in September 2017.

Special Education Summer School State Aid Claim Due Nov. 1

The Special Education Summer School claim authorized under Section 18-4.3 is statutorily required to be received by ISBE **on or before Nov. 1**. Claims are for eligible students educated in 2016 summer programs and must be filed electronically via ISBE's Web Application Security System (IWAS). No claims will be accepted or honored after the statutory date.

Eligibility requirements for pupils claimed for summer school are:

- (1) the pupil must be enrolled in one or more courses offered for at least 60 clock hours in the summer session;
- (2) the pupil must be eligible pursuant to the requirements for continued summer school services per his or her Individualized Education Program;
- (3) there shall not be a tuition charge to families to ensure a "free, appropriate public education."

2015-16 (FY 2017) Annual Claim for Pupil Transportation Reimbursement – Correction Period Now Open

All local education entities are hereby notified that the review and amendment (if needed) process is now open and will end at midnight on Nov. 14. All revisions to the Pupil Transportation Reimbursement Claim must be completed and transmitted on or before midnight on Nov. 14. No revisions will be accepted after this date in order to close the claim file and schedule the three remaining quarterly payments.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR <u>REVIEWING</u> THE CLAIM

- 1. Log into IWAS.
- 2. Click on "System Listing" on the IWAS homepage.
- 3. Select "Pupil Transportation Claim Reimbursement System" under the "Annual Claims" heading.
- 4. Click on "Claim Review" under the "Reimbursement Claim" heading on the homepage. Do not click on "Revise Claim" button unless you need to make revisions.
- 5. The claim will be loaded to the screen in readonly format. Carefully review each line on the claim for possible revisions. If you entered transportation assets on the Depreciation Schedule, don't forget to click on the "Depreciation Schedule" button at the bottom of the screen and review the depreciation schedule data for possible revisions.

If you do not have any revisions, you do not need to do anything. Your claim will remain as originally submitted by the statutory Aug. 15 due date.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR REVISING THE CLAIM

If you have reviewed the claim and found that revisions are needed to the depreciation schedule and/or the pupil transportation reimbursement claim:

- 1. Click on the "Revise Claim" link under the "Reimbursement Claim" heading on the homepage.
- 2. You may enter notes in the "Your Comments" text box to help you remember why revisions were needed. Click on the "Revise Claim" button at the bottom of the screen to proceed with revisions to the depreciation schedule (if needed) and the pupil transportation reimbursement claim.
- 3. Note that all links for the reimbursement claim are open and may be revised as needed. The "Depreciation Schedule Summary" link under the "Depreciation Schedule" heading has been changed to "Calculate Depreciation Allowance." If you made any changes to transportation assets after the August submit date, you must click on this link and update the Depreciation Schedule.
- 4. After all revisions have been made, click on the "Review & Submit Claim." All revised claims must be resubmitted to ISBE through the proper channels (Document Author to the District Superintendent and District Superintendent to ISBE).

NO REVISIONS TO THE CLAIM WILL BE ACCEPTED AFTER MIDNIGHT ON MONDAY, NOV. 14, 2016.

School Health Issues

Illinois Certificate of Religious Exemption Form Update

As you are aware, the Illinois Department of Public Health updated its "Illinois Certificate of Religious Exemption to Required Immunizations and/or Examinations Form" last year. This form now reflects changes to Illinois law made by Public Act 99-0249,

which amends Section 27-8.1 of the School Code (105 ILCS 27-8.1). Section 27-8.1 requires the Certificate of Religion Exemption, created by the Department of Public Health, to be signed by a student's health care provider and submitted to the local school authority prior to the student entering kindergarten, sixth grade, and ninth grade.

This law does not require the certificate to be completed annually. Districts may, at their discretion for the purposes of consistent record keeping, request that students and families use this form to document religious exemptions to immunizations and/or examinations on an annual basis, but the fully completed form is only mandatory at the grade levels required by statute.

Therefore, a student should not be excluded from school because his/her form was not completed and submitted in grades other than kindergarten, sixth grade, and ninth grade.

Review/Procurement/Resource Management Training workshops scheduled across the state. The workshops are free and will be presented by Illinois State Board of Education Nutrition and Wellness Programs Division staff.

Breakfast After the Bell Mandate Grant Funding Available; Apply by Nov. 18

Eating breakfast at school has been proven to reduce tardiness, absenteeism, and visits to the nurse, while improving test scores. Unfortunately, less than half of eligible Illinois students currently have access to school breakfast. Illinois ranks 40th in the nation in the ratio of school lunch participants who also eat breakfast. By serving school breakfast, we can ensure that all children start the day with the nutrition they need to reach their full potential.

Public Act 99-0850 requires every public school in which at least 70 percent of the students were eligible for free or reduced-price lunches in October of the preceding year to operate a Breakfast After the Bell program. Breakfast After the Bell means breakfast is provided to children after the instructional day has officially begun and does not prohibit schools from also providing breakfast before the instructional day begins. Schools may choose whatever delivery model that best suits the students. Typical options include:

- Breakfast in the Classroom: Food is delivered (by staff, students, or volunteers) to each classroom after school begins and students are permitted to eat breakfast in the classroom.
- Grab and Go Breakfast: Students pick up bagged or boxed breakfast from carts or specified areas and are permitted to eat in either designated areas or the classroom.
- **Second-Chance Breakfast:** An extended passing or breakfast period is offered in the cafeteria, following the first or second period of the day.
- Other options include serving breakfast during an early recess or outdoor lesson. Schools and

districts have great flexibility in serving breakfast after the bell as long as it is offered to all students after the instructional day has begun.

FUNDING: State reimbursement to offset a portion of the cost of the meal is available if a site serves a reimbursable meal to a student eligible for a free meal and the site is enrolled in the Illinois Free Breakfast and Lunch Programs. Both state and federal reimbursement is available if a site enrolls in the National School Lunch Program and/or School Breakfast Program.

Grant funding is also available for new and expanding Breakfast After the Bell programs statewide. The next **No Kid Hungry Illinois Breakfast Grant deadline is Nov. 18**. Grants are available for up to \$5,000 each that will help schools purchase approved equipment and materials and institute initiatives facilitating alternative breakfast models, such as Breakfast in the Classroom or Grab and Go Breakfast. To apply, visit grants.nokidhungry.org. The application is easy. You will need to create an account – when prompted, enter the access code: ILBREAKFAST2017.

2016-17 Immunization/Health Exam and Eve Exam Data Collection

Immunization/Health Examination Data

The Student Health Immunization System is open for data entry through Nov. 15. The data must be submitted online using IWAS. Once logged into IWAS, the "Student Health Data – Immunization" link will appear on the System Listing page under "Annual."

As mandated by Section 5/27-8.1 of the School Code, immunization/health examination data must be submitted for all Illinois schools in grades <u>PreK-12</u> by **11:59 p.m. Nov. 15**.

A report must be submitted for every eligible school, without exception. Schools that are not the home school for any student should submit the report by selecting the option that declares they have no data to report. All eligible schools should receive IWAS inbox messages regarding the Student Health Data - Immunization Data Collection. Please check your IWAS inbox for reminders and updates.

Eye Examination Data

The Student Health Vision System is open for data entry through June 30, 2017. The data must be submitted online in this timeframe using IWAS. Once logged into IWAS, the "Student Health Data – Immunization" link will appear on the System Listing page under "Annual."

A report must be submitted for every eligible school, without exception. Schools that are not the home school for any student should submit the report by

selecting the option that declares they have no data to report. This option may also be selected by home schools that do not serve kindergarten students and had no students in grades 1-12 enrolling for the first time in an Illinois school. All eligible schools should receive IWAS inbox messages regarding Student Health Data -Vision Data Collection. Please check your IWAS inbox for reminders and updates.

Certain data elements have been enhanced or introduced, in accordance with federal law. This was covered in the September webinar "<u>Introduction to</u> 2017 EIS: New Features and Updates."

Again, the final deadline for 2016-17 employment, position records, and noncertified employee aggregated FTE counts is **Nov. 1.** Please submit the data using IWAS or batch files.

NCLB/ESSA Monitoring Instrument and Title I Comparability

The FY 2017 No Child Left Behind/Every Student Succeeds Act (NCLB/ESSA) Monitoring Instrument is available for completion and submission in IWAS. The due date is **Nov. 30**.

All districts receiving NCLB/ESSA funding are required to submit the document every year. As before, the previous year's information will be

imported to the document, and the district should ensure its accuracy before submitting. You may be able to see that some questions have been omitted in line with the new ESSA guidance while a new question or two has been added. Each "Comment/Proof Indicator" box will need to have a comment that identifies the documents that support your answers or clarifies your "yes," "no," or "N/A" response. You will not be able to submit the form without providing an answer in each box.

There is a sample list of comments or proof indicators for each question on the Federal and State Monitoring website at www.isbe.net/ea/pdf/proof-indicators.pdf. The FY 2017 NCLB/ESSA Title I Comparability analysis is also available for completion and submission in IWAS.

A new resource has been developed to help you get answers to frequently asked questions. It is titled "NCLB/ESSA Title I Comparability Frequently Asked Questions/Answers and Common Errors." This document can be located along with other useful tools for completing your comparability analysis on our website.

Districts that are "exempt" will continue to select the "Exempt" radio button and then "Submit." Their submittal requirements will have been met when the superintendent submits it.

An updated "Comparability User's Guide" for FY 2017 is located on the menu bar of the comparability application and on our <u>Federal and State Monitoring</u> website.

All districts receiving Title I funds must complete the document. Failure to comply will result in frozen program funds and a recovery of expenditures of Title I funds in buildings where they are determined to be non-comparable.

Deadline Set to Submit Limitation of Administrative Costs Worksheets

Section 17-1.5 of the School Code requires school districts to limit the growth of "administrative" expenditures to a maximum of 5 percent from one fiscal year to the next. School districts must file the Limitation of Administrative Costs Worksheet with ISBE's School Business Services Division by Nov. 15.

A blank Limitation of Administrative Costs Worksheet is available at

www.isbe.net/sfms/AdminCaps/AdminCaps.htm.

Additionally, the Limitation of Administrative Costs Worksheet is included in the Illinois School District Annual Financial Report - June 30, 2016 (ISBE 50-35). If a completed Limitation of Administrative Costs Worksheet is submitted along with the school district's Annual Financial Report, a separate worksheet does not have to be submitted. Please note that the worksheet included in the School District Budget Form July 1, 2016 - June 30, 2017 (ISBE 50-36) is a working document for local use only and will not be accepted for official submission of the Limitation of Administrative Costs Worksheet.

Submitted Limitation of Administrative Costs Worksheets will be reviewed to ensure figures match to the district's submitted School District Budget Form July 1, 2016 - June 30, 2017 (ISBE 50-36) and the district's submitted Annual Financial Report - June 30, 2016 (ISBE 50-35). Inaccurate Limitation of Administrative Costs Worksheets will be returned to districts for correction.

Districts exceeding the limitation may amend their budgets prior to June 30, 2017, to become in compliance with the limitation. Districts unable to amend their budgets would have to waive the limitation in order to become in compliance. School districts with administrative expenditures in the 25th percentile or below (4th quartile) may waive the limitation following a public hearing and with the affirmative vote of at least two-thirds of the members of the school board. Any district waiving the limitation shall notify ISBE within 45 days of such action. If a school district that is ineligible to waive the limitation by board action exceeds the limitation solely because

of circumstances beyond the control of the district and the district has exhausted all available and reasonable remedies to comply with the limitation, the district may request a waiver from the General Assembly pursuant to Section 2-3.25g of the School Code. Procedures for requesting a waiver in accordance with Section 2-3.25g of the School Code are available at www.isbe.net/isbewaivers/default.htm.

Grant Accountability & Transparency Act FY 2017 Indirect Cost Rates

In accordance with a Delegation Agreement between the U.S. Department of Education and ISBE, and pursuant to its authority under the Grant Accountability and Transparency Act (GATA) and administrative rules, the Governor's Office of Management and Budget has granted ISBE an exception to the federal Uniform Guidance and GATA regarding the determination of indirect cost rates that may be utilized by all grantees that receive a state award or federal pass-through award for grant programs administered by ISBE.

Local Education Agencies (LEAs) may utilize either the restricted indirect cost rate the LEA negotiates annually with ISBE (school districts) or the statewide average indirect cost rate calculated by ISBE (Regional Offices of Education, Intermediate Service Centers, special education cooperatives, area vocational centers, charter schools, and university laboratory schools approved by ISBE). These LEAs will also utilize the ISBE-established restricted indirect cost rates for state and federally funded grant programs administered by other state agencies. Therefore, LEAs do not need to take any further action in order to establish or utilize an indirect cost rate for any state or federally funded grant program administered by any state agency

Not-for-profit agencies, community/faith-based organizations, and for-profit entities may utilize the statewide average indirect cost rate calculated by ISBE

for all state and federal grant programs administered by ISBE. Colleges and universities will be restricted to a maximum indirect cost rate of 8 percent or other indirect cost rate calculated by their cognizant federal agency, whichever is less, for state and federal grants administered by ISBE. However, these entities must negotiate a separate indirect cost rate or select another indirect cost rate option through the State of Illinois Centralized Indirect Cost Rate System (linked below) in order to claim an indirect cost reimbursement for state and federally funded grant programs administered by other state agencies.

Notice of State Award and Grant Agreement Pages in eGMS

All FY 2017 state and federal grants in the electronic Grants Management System will incorporate the new Notice of State Award (NOSA) and Grant Agreement pages. Specific conditions are reflected in the NOSA as a result of the Fiscal Internal Control Questionnaire (ICQ) and Program Risk Assessment grantee responses. Per the requirements of GATA, please be advised that a required component prior to FY 2017 grant execution is grantee acceptance of the specific award conditions as well as the terms, conditions, assurances, and grant exhibits in the Grant Agreement.

IMPORTANT: ISBE is currently reviewing the specific conditions assigned to grantees as a result of the responses from the ICQ and Program Risk Assessments. ISBE is meeting with other state agencies to discuss the appropriate course of action to implement specific conditions in the NOSA, including evaluation of grantee risk and the necessity of imposing additional specific award conditions. Your organization will be kept advised of the decisions, adoption of administrative rules, and ISBE's implementation plan in this regard. Depending on the specific condition, you will be notified how you can provide evidence of your organization's corrective

actions to ISBE or your state cognizant agency according to the timeframe indicated in the NOSA. If you have questions regarding the specific conditions and ISBE's implementation plan, please contact your grant consultant. All other inquiries can be directed to GATA@isbe.net.

Grantees completing their GATA registration should have received an automated notification to complete the ICQ. Separately, each grantee was also required to login via the ISBE IWAS portal and complete the Programmatic Risk Assessment. The completion status of these important steps can be accessed at www.isbe.net/GATA/pdf/gata-grantee-status-report.pdf. If specific conditions are not present in the NOSA section, this indicates that either the ICQ and/or Program Risk Assessment has not been submitted and/or approved.
