

MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

January 16, 2018



Hello,

As states across the nation, including Illinois, face increasing challenges recruiting and retaining educators, I believe we have to prioritize support, mentorship, and professional learning for our teachers. Title II funding is the only federal money focused specifically on teacher improvement and growth – and a bill approved by the U.S. House of Representatives puts Title II funding at risk. The bill would eliminate more than \$2 billion in federal funding for teacher development. Tennessee Commissioner of Education Candice McQueen and I highlighted the importance of Title II funding to support educators in a [piece](http://hechingerreport.org/opinion-eliminating-funding-supports-educators-thats-no-way-cut-federal-budget/) (<http://hechingerreport.org/opinion-eliminating-funding-supports-educators-thats-no-way-cut-federal-budget/>) we put out last week. We have to do a better job of caring for our teachers if we hope to turn the tide on the national teacher shortage and, in turn, improve student outcomes. We urge Congress to maintain this critical funding to ensure all students are supported by highly prepared and effective teachers.

Please reach out and share your stories about how these funds help staff and students and please add your advocacy to the national conversation.

As educators, we all know that children are situated differently and need different supports to meet the same high expectations. The adequacy target in the evidence-based funding (EBF) formula gives us common language to describe the core of what all of our children deserve. For the first time, we can have a common conversation about how close or how far the state is from providing each district the resources to meet all students' needs. EBF also creates a distribution system in which each district's allocation depends on the needs of all 852 school districts. ISBE is moving ahead quickly to understand where all 852 districts are situated against their individual adequacy targets. This is the baseline year of the new formula, so the process begins with verifying each district's enrollment numbers for the past three years. A number of districts still have not submitted their enrollment verification through IWAS. PLEASE PRIORITIZE THIS WORK. If the information we have isn't verified and accurate, then the records ISBE currently has will become a permanent part of the formula for future years. While ISBE was working to implement the new EBF law, we found that the adequacy targets of many school districts would unfairly include local resources that those districts are not able to access – to the sum of \$37.8 million. This was not the intent of the legislature, according to the sponsors of the legislation. To correct this drafting error, ISBE requested that the changes be included in SB 444. That trailer bill was approved by the General Assembly and ISBE requested that the Governor sign it as soon as possible. The Governor issued

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an amendatory veto to SB 444 last week. If the changes included in SB 444 are not enacted, a number of school districts will see a reduction in funding. ISBE is continuing to gather and clean the data needed to distribute tier funding as we wait for the General Assembly to act on this amendatory veto.

Another update from D.C. that's important to share is that the U.S. Department of Education recently completed its peer review of PARCC. PARCC is now the first and only large-scale summative accountability assessment to fully meet federal assessment guidelines. This is an extraordinary moment for Illinois, as our state remains committed to using the highest-quality assessment design. Illinois educators were instrumental in establishing PARCC as the highest-quality assessment and they are critical in leading the future assessment development. Science assessment is the field that presents the most opportunity for innovation. Illinois is rich in educators, administrators, legislators, and communities that value high-quality science education supported by a high-quality science assessment. The PARCC recognition highlights the deep capacity Illinois has to lead the country in creating accountability assessments that also meet the needs of students, educators, and families. The evolution of the Illinois Science Assessment requires thoughtful partnership with the amazing people we have here in Illinois and the investment of the time required to create something of the highest quality.

Tomorrow, the State Board will consider ISBE's fiscal year 2019 budget request. This year's budget request -- informed by testimony from community members across the state, with direction provided by the Board in December -- is an advocacy document that requests doubling the state's investment in education. The budget recommendation reflects the state's constitutional mandate to assume the primary responsibility for financing the system of public education. ISBE believes "primary responsibility" constitutes ensuring that every district can meet at least 90 percent of its individual Adequacy Target through a combination of state and local funding, with federal funds on average supplying the remaining 10 percent of adequacy. The children in Illinois' schools today can't wait for another opportunity for a quality education. A better social and economic future for the state depends on providing all children with the quality education they deserve today.

School District Annual Financial Report Review Process

All district superintendents should have received an email broadcast asking them to review their preliminary Financial Profile Report and verify the Operating Expense per Pupil (OEPP)/Per Capita Tuition on Charge (PCTC) and 9-month ADA.

District administrators may submit comments regarding their district's finances that will be published along with their Financial Profile Report (500 characters max). The comments must be submitted no later than Feb. 6.

The email included links to the memorandum, instructions, and definitions to assist with the review process. These documents are also available in IWAS (<https://sec1.isbe.net/iwas/asp/login.asp?js=true>) and on the School District Financial Profile Score & OEPP/PCTC Verification Information webpage. (</Pages/Financial-Profile-Score.aspx>)

The email broadcast and Superintendent's Weekly Message will be the only notices sent to the district. If you have not received the email, please contact ISBE at (217) 785-8779. If you have given another person authority to review these reports, please forward the email to them.

The financial profile designation will be approved and publicly released by ISBE, so it is crucial that districts review their financial profile data and score. Any district that wishes to include comments that support the Financial Profile Report may do so directly in IWAS (<https://sec1.isbe.net/iwas/asp/login.asp?js=true>) beneath the report.

Comments are optional, but they are encouraged. This is an opportunity for districts to explain significant financial circumstances.

Please note that once the Feb. 15 deadline passes, changes to the 2017 Annual Financial Report data are not permitted.

The financial profile scores will be adjusted to reflect any mandated categorical aid payments due to school districts that were not paid by June 30, 2016, and not included in their FY 2017 Annual Financial Report.

School Year 2016-17 Statewide Physical Fitness Assessment Data Released

Schools annually assessed the physical fitness level of students in grades 3-12 as of school year 2016-17, per [Public Act 98-0859](#)  (<http://www.ilga.gov/legislation/publicacts/98/PDF/098-0859.pdf>) and subsequent Rules [Part 1, Section 1.425](#) (<ftp://www.ilga.gov/JCAR/AdminCode/023/023000010D04250R.html>). This requirement is an effort to assess whether or not schools are meeting [State Goal 20](#)  (/Documents/Goals-19-24-and-Perf-Descrip.pdf), which encourages students to achieve and maintain a health-enhancing level of physical fitness. Fitness testing that is based upon continual self-assessment can help students identify their fitness levels and set goals for improvement. Gathering this data also enables parents and schools to better understand the health trends within their region and encourage enhancements in a school's physical education program.

Deadline Reminder: NSLP Equipment Assistance Grants RFPs Due Feb. 2

More than \$1.365 million will be awarded to school food authorities (SFAs) in FY 2018 for the replacement, renovation, or purchase of kitchen equipment that will allow SFAs to serve healthier meals that meet the updated meal patterns, with emphasis on more fruits and vegetables in school meals; improve food safety; and expand access.

ISBE is required to competitively award these equipment assistance grants to eligible SFAs participating in the National School Lunch Program. Higher priority must be given to high-need schools in which 50 percent or more of the enrolled students are eligible for free or reduced-price meals.

The FY 2018 NSLP Equipment Assistance Grant RFP is available on the Equipment Assistant Grants page (</Pages/Equipment-Grants.aspx>). The deadline to apply is Feb. 2.

Illinois REALTORS® Bicentennial Essay Contest

Free Birth Records for People Experiencing Homelessness

A new state law, [Public Act 100-0506](http://www.ilga.gov/legislation/publicacts/100/PDF/100-0506.pdf) (<http://www.ilga.gov/legislation/publicacts/100/PDF/100-0506.pdf>), requiring that free birth certificates be provided for people experiencing homelessness took effect January 1, 2018. “Homeless person” means an individual who meets the McKinney-Vento definition of “homeless” (42 U.S.C. 11302) or an individual residing in any of the following living situations: individuals who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence, including children and youths who are sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing; economic hardship or a similar reason; are living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, or camping grounds due to the lack of alternative adequate accommodations; are living in emergency or transitional shelters; are abandoned in hospitals; children and youths (https://www.law.cornell.edu/definitions/uscode.php?width=840&height=800&iframe=true&def_id=42-USC-115168979-996844513&term_occur=73&term_src=title:42:chapter:119:subchapter:VI:part:B:section:11434a) who have a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings; children and youths (https://www.law.cornell.edu/definitions/uscode.php?width=840&height=800&iframe=true&def_id=42-USC-115168979-996844513&term_occur=74&term_src=title:42:chapter:119:subchapter:VI:part:B:section:11434a) who are living in cars, parks, public spaces, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train [stations](https://www.law.cornell.edu/definitions/uscode.php?width=840&height=800&iframe=true&def_id=42-USC-1897135820-717284077&term_occur=17&term_src=title:42:chapter:119:subchapter:VI:part:B:section:11434a) (https://www.law.cornell.edu/definitions/uscode.php?width=840&height=800&iframe=true&def_id=42-USC-1897135820-717284077&term_occur=17&term_src=title:42:chapter:119:subchapter:VI:part:B:section:11434a), or similar settings; and migratory children who meet the previous living situations. Children and youths who have been displaced from their homes because of a natural disaster would also meet the definition.

The new law requires that a service provider sign a statement verifying the applicant's homeless status. Public school homeless liaisons or school social workers are among the service providers who may sign a statement. Individuals who are homeless must not be charged for this verification. The McKinney-Vento Act requires schools to enroll students experiencing homelessness immediately, even if the student is unable to provide documents that are typically required for enrollment (such as previous academic records, records of immunizations and other required health records, proof of residency, proof of guardianship, birth certificates, or other documentation); has missed application or enrollment deadlines during a period of homelessness; or has outstanding fees. (Section 722(g)(3)(C)(i); see also 722(g)(1)(H))

CDC Research Grants for Preventing Violence and Violence-Related Injury Now Available

The CDC intends to commit up to \$1.05 million in FY 2018 to support up to three awards. The agency is soliciting investigator-initiated research that will help expand and advance knowledge about what works to prevent violence by rigorously evaluating primary prevention strategies in any of three areas. The Letter of Intent is due Feb. 9 and applications are due March 26 .

GRANT ACCOUNTABILITY TRANSPARENCY ACT

First Quarter FY 2018 Grantee Periodic Performance Reports Past Due

The federal Uniform Guidance and GATA to a large extent are based on risk management and performance improvement. Both of these purposes are served by increased communication and collaboration between grantors and grantees. In recognition of this, both the Uniform Guidance and GATA require periodic performance reporting by grant recipients.

Another goal of GATA is to increase efficiencies by establishing uniform, standard non-redundant processes for the administration of grants. To this end, the Governor's Office of Management and Budget's GATA Unit has developed standard templates and protocols for the submission of periodic performance reports.

Periodic performance reports are required for all FY 2018 grants administered by the State of Illinois unless specifically exempted. Exempted ISBE programs include Evidence-Based Funding, Mandated Category, and Drivers Education.

The reports include information on the accomplishment of deliverables described in the grant, the status of performance measures, and the alignment of accomplishments to date with spending to date.

ISBE is implementing the periodic performance reporting requirement through an IWAS-based system that incorporates the required information fields. The new Grant Periodic Reporting System became available on Thursday, October 26, 2017. Most grant recipients are required to report quarterly. Some will be required to report monthly due to findings of elevated programmatic risk.

Due to the delay in the implementation of the reporting system, the initial FY 2018 reporting period for all ISBE grantees will have a report date of October 31, 2017, and should include all activity from July 1, 2017, through October 31, 2017.

Following this initial reporting period, all reporting periods will be based on calendar quarters or months. Quarterly reports are due within 30 days after the end of the reporting period. Monthly reports are due within 20 days following the end of the month covered by the report.

NOTE: This performance reporting is in addition to the regular fiscal reporting done through the Electronic Expenditure Reporting system.
