### Message From State Superintendent Tony Smith, Ph.D.

Hello,

When students leave our schools, they should leave with the keys to open multiple doors, any of which can lead to a successful future. The State Board of Education has made it a priority for students to graduate high school ready for college and career. In recognition of Career and Technical Education Month® (CTE Month) this February, I would like to celebrate the role CTE plays in equipping students with the skills they need to thrive in college and career in the 21st century.

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Illinois is home to incredible CTE programs that help our

students gain the knowledge and skills they need to achieve career success in a myriad of fields. Districts have collaborated with each other and with community partners to enhance the opportunities available to Illinois students. This #CTEMonth, I would like to highlight a partnership between Kewanee High School's Foods Class, the Henry/Stark County Health Department, and a local McDonald's Restaurant that has enabled students to participate in a food handler certification class through the health department. More than 40 students passed the class and obtained a food handler license, which employees must have to work in a food establishment. The owners of the local McDonald's generously funded this endeavor. This collaboration will benefit students with increased employment opportunities, both as they seek high school employment and as they progress in their careers.



I also had the opportunity to visit the <u>Technology Center of DuPage</u> (TCD) earlier this month. It was exciting to watch students demonstrate their skills and hear them share their career plans and goals. TCD's mission is "to provide an education environment that supports and encourages individual learning styles, develops occupational skills and professionalism, promotes academic growth, and assists students in discovering their potential." TCD offers training in career pathway clusters such as architecture and construction, health science, hospitality and tourism, and information technology. On TCD's campus, students

are provided with work-based learning opportunities in a restaurant, bistro, and deli; an automotive repair shop; a full-service salon; a print shop; and a preschool.

The value of CTE is clear – and it is important that students across Illinois have access to resources to help them explore their future paths. Our new College and Career Readiness Student Resources page shares a variety of tools students can use as they embark on their journey to college and career. One of these resources is the free Illinois Reality Check mobile app from the Illinois Department of Employment Security and the Illinois Department of Innovation and Technology. Reality Check helps users learn about the educational requirements and salary ranges of different occupations, and evaluate possible career options. The app poses questions such as "Where do you want to live?" and "What will you use for transportation?", summarizes the monthly cost of a user's selections, and generates a list of occupations that have the potential to meet this total. Finally, I would like to update you on the status of the Illinois Science Assessment (ISA). On March 1, third- through eighth-graders and some high school students will begin taking the assessment. Though many Illinois students took the ISA for the first time in 2016, budgetary uncertainty at the state level delayed the start of the scoring process. ISBE expects schools to have spring 2016 assessment results in summer 2017. The delayed results will not affect individual students' learning or their prospects for success when they take the ISA this spring. The Illinois Science Assessment 2017 Webinar on Friday at 11 a.m. will review ISA, highlight system enhancements, and demonstrate ISA systems. Register for the webinar here.

# Summer Food Service Program Information Sessions for New Sponsors and Sites

The program is for non-profit sponsors or meal sites eligible by school data or census. If you know of schools or community organizations interested in participating, please refer them to the 2017 Summer Meals Information Session document for the information session schedule. These sessions provide information only. For training on the program, organizations must attend one of the SFSP New Sponsor Training Workshops.

Please remember that any school that operates a summer program in a building with a 50 percent or greater free and reduced-price percentage in the National School Lunch Program must serve a breakfast and/or a lunch to students in attendance.

These schools must also open their doors to children 18 and younger in the community to participate in the Seamless Summer Option or in Summer Meals, unless the regional superintendent has granted a waiver.

### IDPH and ISBE Working to Issue Guidance on P.A. 099-0922 Lead In Water Testing

On Jan. 17, Governor Rauner signed Senate Bill 550 into law (Public Act 099-0922). The Act aims to reduce children's exposure to lead by requiring each school that serves pre-K through grade 5 students to test its water for lead. The Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) is mandated to administer these requirements and to provide guidance on risk management and mitigation of lead in water, and education about lead poisoning. The Act states that IDPH will publish guidance for schools on its website within 90 days from Jan. 17. IDPH is currently creating an informational pamphlet that will soon be distributed to districts and posted on both the IDPH and ISBE's Nutrition and Wellness websites. ### New Census Estimates Released for FY 2018 Title I Low Income

The U.S. Department of Education has released the Small Area Income and Poverty Estimates (SAIPE) for income year 2015. These estimates will be used to calculate FY 2018 Title I allocations. A file of 2015 Poverty Data by Local Education Agency (LEA) is provided in an alphabetical listing of LEAs, Poverty Count, 5-17 Population, Poverty Percentage, and Total Population at <a href="https://www.isbe.net/Pages/New-Census-Estimates-Released.aspx">https://www.isbe.net/Pages/New-Census-Estimates-Released.aspx</a>

LEAs can use this data to determine their potential eligibility for Basic, Concentration, Targeted and Education Finance Incentive grants (EFIG).

**Basic Grant eligibility**: An LEA must have at least 10 poverty children and the number of poverty children must be greater than 2 percent of the LEA population of children ages 5-17.

Concentration Grant eligibility: An LEA must have at least 6,500 poverty children or the number of those children exceeds 15 percent of the total 5-17 population.

**Targeted Grant and EFIG qualifications**: An LEA must have at least 10 poverty children and that number must be at least 5 percent of the 5-17 population.

The following link to the Census Bureau, <a href="https://www.census.gov/did/www/saipe/index.html">www.census.gov/did/www/saipe/index.html</a>, provides various aspects of the SAIPE count, including the data sources and methodology used to prepare these data. We will be using the 2015 data to calculate school year 2017-18 Title I, Part A allocations because they are the most recent available data.

Superintendents, business managers, and Title I directors should carefully examine the data for their LEA as this will be the first indication as to whether your LEA may be gaining or losing in eligibility for Title I funds in FY 2018. ISBE neither controls nor generates the data. The challenge period for the 2015 estimates ends March 13, 2017. Refer to the Census Bureau link at

Note that this preliminary data does not include other non-census information, such as foster, neglected, or delinquent counts that may be used to calculate Title I allocations.
