Message from State Superintendent Christopher A. Koch

Last week, the President signed the federal stimulus package or the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA), which is aimed toward investing federal dollars into the economy and spurring the desperately needed financial recovery in our country. The ARRA could mean an additional \$9 billion in funding for Illinois, with up to \$3 billion earmarked specifically for education purposes.

While this is good news for Illinois schools, we all need to proceed with caution. The stimulus is only intended to last two years, so we will need to be very careful with how we plan to use these funds. In addition, how the 'maintenance of effort' and 'supplement not supplant' provisions will work under the ARRA is complex. In our initial reading of the bill, it appears that these would still apply for local districts in most, if not all cases. We expect to receive additional guidance on these issues within the next several weeks from the U.S. Department of Education.

We have set up a page on our Web site to provide more information on the stimulus, including an analysis of 'maintenance of effort' and 'supplement not supplant' issues prepared by the Council of Chief State School Officers. We will update this site as new information becomes available. It also includes links to the federal and Illinois recovery Web sites. You can access the Illinois State Board Education recovery page at http://www.isbe.net/arra/default.htm.

Additionally, I want you to know that we are preparing to transmit additional federal funds to you as they become available. However, I'm not sure that they will be coming as quickly as I have seen portrayed in some media articles. Currently, only the additional McKinney-Vento funding under the ARRA has specific timelines for distribution, which would be sometime later this spring. The federal government has said it wants to get these funds moving as quickly as possible. But realistically, I would not anticipate schools seeing these additional funds until the 2009-2010 school year.

Finally, next week marks the beginning of the regular testing window for the Illinois Standards Achievement Test (ISAT). Online sample tests are currently up and running and you may access additional ISAT specific information at http://www.isbe.net/assessment/isat.htm. The dates for the administration of the Illinois Alternate Assessment (IAA) are March 9-27 and you may access IAA specific information at http://www.isbe.net/assessment/iaa.htm. Prairie State Achievement Examination (PSAE) specific information may be accessed at http://www.isbe.net/assessment/psae.htm, with test dates on April 22-23 and makeup dates are May 6-7.

Thank you for your dedication to doing everything possible to prepare your students for success on the Illinois assessments.

Special Education

Special Education Class Size for 2009-2010 and Beyond

In conjunction with the revised federal regulations under the 2004 reauthorization of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement Act, the state special education rules (23 Illinois Administrative Code 226; http://www.isbe.net/rules/archive/pdfs/226ark.pdf) were revised in 2007.

As part of that rulemaking process, ISBE afforded interested parties a public comment period that far exceeded the required length. After review of the amendments by the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules, the revised version became effective on **June 28, 2007.**

Section 226.730(b) of the rules (full text available at the link provided) sets forth the requirements for determining special education class size for the 2009-2010 school year and beyond. As a result of numerous questions directed to ISBE regarding the new class size requirements, we have developed a guidance document that is available on the ISBE website at http://www.isbe.net/spec-ed/pdfs/guidance-09-01.pdf.

The guidance document discusses factors such as the age and educational needs of students that must be considered in the formation of special education classes and the process for determining class size, including examples. Important Information on Rulers for ISAT Mathematics Tests at Grades 4 – 8

All students taking the Illinois Standards Achievement Test (ISAT) mathematics test are provided with rulers from Pearson for use with all three sessions of the test.

The markings on this year's Grade 4-8 testing rulers are different from what was provided in the previously released sample materials. The testing rulers have increments to the 1/4 inch and 1/2 cm.

Should you want your students to participate in practice activities with a similar ruler, we have a PDF file with updated rulers on the ISBE student assessment website at: www.isbe.net/assessment/isat.htm.

Please remember that because of differences in printers, you should verify the accuracy of the rulers copied from this PDF file.

Do not use the rulers in your shipment of ISAT testing materials for practice with your students. These rulers should be used only with the actual ISAT mathematics test

Staff will be contacting you by e-mail if your request is missing any required components, such as copies of your public notices or a description of your public hearing. Remember, requests cannot be processed until they are complete.

Truants' Alternative and Optional Education Program RFP Released

The Truants' Alternative and Optional Education Program (TAOEP) FY 2010 Request for Proposals (RFP) has been released. Eligible applicants are public school districts, Regional Offices of Education, community colleges districts, public university laboratory schools approved by the State Board of Education, charter schools and area vocational centers.

The purpose of these programs is to offer modified instructional programs or other services designed to prevent students from dropping out of school.

English Language Learning

Home Language Survey Updated

The Home Language Survey (HLS) is part of the enrollment process for all students newly enrolling in a school district. The HLS may appear on the enrollment form or on a separate form.

The HLS consists of two multi-part questions. The first multi-part question has been revised to read: "Is a language other than English spoken in your home?" If the answer is yes, the parent is then asked to identify what language is spoken.

The second multi-part question has not been changed. It reads: "Does your child speak a language other than English?" If the answer is yes, the parent is then asked to identify what language the child speaks. If the answer to either of the questions is "yes," the law requires the school to assess the child's English language proficiency.

Districts should update the wording on their HLS to match the new text. Districts may include additional questions, but the first two provided by the State Board must be worded exactly as posted on the English Language Learning (ELL) website.

The new English and Spanish versions of the Home Language Survey are posted on the ELL website at www.isbe.net/bilingual and are ready for district use. Versions in 39 additional languages should be available by the end of February and in time for early kindergarten registration this spring. Districts must complete the survey for every student who enrolls for the first time.

The survey is important to districts and the state because the information collected is used to count the students whose families speak a language other than English at home. It also helps to identify the students who need to be assessed for English language proficiency.

The SFSP is targeted to low-income areas where at least 50 percent of children qualify for free or reduced-price school meals. Children up to age 18 can eat free nutritious breakfasts, lunches or snacks at summer feeding sites operated by approved sponsors. Sponsors receive federal reimbursement for serving meals that meet USDA nutrition guidelines. Many sponsors also offer educational, enrichment or physical activities, or collaborate with others to do so.

If the responsibilities of sponsorship of the SFSP are not possible, you can still help by providing meals to other local sponsors, supervise a feeding site, or team up with a sponsor to provide any activity that makes summer fun. In any case, children win.

Two Illinois Schools Achieve HealthierUS School Challenge Award Silver Level Status

Kudos to Bushnell-Prairie City Elementary School in Bushnell, and Ridgeview Elementary School in Colfax, which are the first two schools in Illinois to achieve silver level status in the HealthierUS School Challenge (HUSSC) initiative.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food and Nutrition Service HUSSC silver level award recipients have demonstrated the following attributes:

- Are a Team Nutrition school.
- Offer reimbursable lunches that demonstrate healthy menu planning practices as well as principles of the Dietary Guidelines for Americans.
- Provide nutrition education to students and the opportunity for physical education.
- Maintain an average daily participation of 70 percent or greater.
- Adhere to FNS established guidelines for foods served and sold in school outside of the National School Lunch Program.

Special recognition ceremonies are planned for **March 17**, at Colfax, and **May 5** at the Illinois School Wellness Conference in Decatur for Bushnell-Prairie City Elementary School. The schools will receive a plaque and banner from USDA representatives.

Teachers Can Now Apply for 2009 Earth Day in the Parks Program

Now is the time for Illinois teachers to submit applications to participate in the Earth Day in the Parks program sponsored by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) and the Illinois Conservation Foundation. The application deadline is **Saturday**, **February 28**.

Earth Day in the Parks is celebrated on a day in April and it gives students the opportunity to learn on location about the environment through hands-on activities. Fortynine Illinois state parks are participating in the 2009 events.

Students will spend approximately two hours at the park completing a natural resources stewardship activity, such as planting native trees and wildflowers, removing invasive exotic plant species or constructing wildlife habitat structures. Each teacher may apply to attend the event with his/her students at one of the participating parks. Nearly twice the number of parks are participating this year compared to last, which will give hundreds of students the opportunity to join in.
