# 1. Preschool Program Design

#### Overview:

#### **Social-Emotional Learning and Mental Wellness:**

- The <u>Pyramid Model for Supporting Social Emotional Competence</u> is an intervention and support framework early educators can use to promote young children's social and emotional development and prevent and address challenging behavior. The model uses a multi-tiered system of supports model, beginning with a universal level of supports to promote social-emotional competence for all children. <u>Training modules and resources</u> are free and accessible online.
- A <u>Reflective Practice Guide</u> from the Illinois Children's Mental Health Partnership supports programs in implementing a reflective approach in their work with children, families and staff.
- The <u>Early Childhood Knowledge and Learning Center</u> offers a set of early childhood mental health resources for programs.

## 2. Data-Driven Community Planning

#### Data:

#### **Community Partners:**

<u>Early Childhood Program Inventory</u>: The Illinois Early Childhood Program Inventory provides a brief profile of state-funded Illinois early childhood programs. This inventory is intended to help communities determine what resources they have in their community—what stakeholders to reach. This list includes state and federal programs that support Illinois' children (from birth through age 8) and their families.

  - Child Care: There are 16 Child Care Resource and Referral (CCR&R) providers throughout Illinois that serve as a point of contact for applying for child care assistance and can help families find a child care provider. Each county has an assigned CCR&R; click on this <u>link</u> to find your local CCR&R.
  - Early Intervention: There are Child and Family Connections (CFC) providers throughout Illinois that serve
    as a point of contact for Early Intervention and the Local Interagency Councils that bring together local
    stakeholders around developmental screening. Each county has an assigned CFC; use the <a href="DHS Office">DHS Office</a>
    <a href="Locator">Locator</a>
    to find your local Early Intervention provider (CFC).</a>
  - O Head Start and Early Head Start: The Illinois Head Start State Collaboration Office (HSSCO) is the state point of contact for information about Illinois Early/Head Start. The HSSCO facilitates Early/Head Start collaboration, coordination and planning at the State and local levels in order to help develop a comprehensive system of early childhood services for low income families with young children.   - School Districts: Regional Offices of Education (ROEs) and the Cook County Intermediate Service Centers
    (ISCs) provide a variety of technical assistance and training services to school districts within their

# 4. Enrolling Priority Populations

### **Providing Comprehensive Services through Community Partnerships:**
